Comfort Quilts-Home Health would like 'Fidget Quilts' for their dementia patients. Fidget quilts feature large buttons tightly secured with button holes, zippers with large pulls, items of different textures sewn on, or other safe items that people can sit and fidget with to help calm them. Quilts were given to the St. Albans family that lost their home and plans are under way to give quilts to the couple who lost their children in a fire in Grand Isle. There is a need for more twin sized quilts.

Projects: There were 8 BOMs turned in and Natalie Good won them. Excerpt on <u>At Home Quilt Care</u> from the International Quilt Museum, University of Nebraska Lincoln:

"Quilts and other textile heirlooms and keepsakes are fragile pieces of history that link generations, inspiring and educating us about our shared past. Because textiles are subject to deterioration from environmental conditions, they require special care. There is little we can do to make them last forever, but taking simple preventive measures such as controlling the home environment (temperature, humidity, pests, and light) is the most important way to ensure that family quilts and other heirloom textiles last for generations.

Dim the Lights: All light fades and weakens textiles. Sunlight and fluorescent light are especially damaging because they emit high levels of ultraviolet radiation. Damage caused by light is cumulative and irreversible. Therefore, store textiles in darkness and dim the lights in areas where quilts and textile keepsakes are displayed. Keep the shades drawn on windows, reduce the number of lights and/or reduce the wattage of light bulbs, and turn off any artificial lights when not in a room.

Doing Your Part: Store quilts and family keepsakes in areas of the home where the environment is most stable. Avoid attics, basements, kitchens, laundry rooms and unheated spaces. Store textile items flat if possible, such as on a spare bed that is rarely used. If items must be folded, use acid-free tissue or muslin to cushion folds. Refold periodically to minimize the chance of permanent creases and fold lines."

QUILT TIPS

- Use page protectors and zipper pouches to store information about your quilts. Put a page about the quilt and the quilter in the page protector. Use the zipper pouch for photos of the quilt and pieces of the fabrics used. Store pages in a three-ring binder. If you want to show someone your project, don't take the whole book—just take the pages you need.
- When you take swatches of fabric to the quilt shop, put them in a baseball card holder. Any divided protective sheet will work, but the baseball card holders are stronger than others. They keep the swatches flat, and you can put a note in the pocket showing what you need to purchase. The sheet folds up easily to fit in your purse or tote.
- When using spray starch to stiffen fabric, spray the fabric, place it in a plastic bag, and let it sit for ten minutes to absorb the starch. When pressing, turn the iron temperature down a little to keep from scorching the fabric.
- At the home improvement store, buy a door security lens to use as a "reducing lens". Pin your patchwork to your design wall, step back, and view through the lens. The lens distances you from your work wrench, giving you a better idea of contrast and composition.
- Hot glue a flat refrigerator magnet, printed side down, to the inside of an empty candy mint tin. It makes a handy portable needle case for on-the-go projects!
- Put a small piece of self-adhesive hook-andloop tape on your seam ripper and opposite piece on your sewing machine. Your seam ripper is always close at hand and easy to find!
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!

MORE QUILT TIPS

- Do not prewash your fabric when piecing miniature quilts; the sizing in the fabric helps make it easier to piece.
- To piece together two curved patches (like a Drunkards Path block), it is easier to sew with the convex (outer) curved patch on the top.
- Using spray starch on the backing of your quilt is a popular trick to help the quilt move more easily through your machine when guilting using a domestic or sit-down machine.
- Select a busy print for the backing if you want your quilting stitches to be less visible on the back side.

QUILT SHOW: 86 DAYS AND COUNTING

The 2020 Quilt Show is less than 3 months away, and the planning and preparations continue behind the scenes. As the event draws near, we depend on all guild members to ensure

the quilt show is a huge success. Continue reading to see how you can help.

- We need QUILTS! It's all about the quilts!!! As of the December meeting, we only had 19 quilts registered, and we need many more to fill City Hall. Kay Benedict has once again volunteered as the Quilt Registration coordinator and she wants to have the quilts registered sooner rather than later. So let's help Kay out and get ALL the quilts registered well before the March 1st deadline. The quilt show chairs, along with Kay, challenge each guild member to enter at least one quilt in the show. But don't stop there; we need lots more quilts to fill up the auditorium at the City Hall. As a reminder, all quilts, including those in the Small/Miniature category, must have a sleeve sewn (not pinned) to the back. The sleeve must be at least 4" wide.
- We need volunteers!!! Bonnie Evans will soon begin asking for volunteers to fill the various positions at the quilt show. There are lots of jobs from which to choose. Be sure to bring your calendar to the guild meeting and sign up for a time that fits your schedule.
- We need donations!!! The Teacup Auction needs more items for the Teacup Auction table. Table runners/toppers, matching placemats and napkins, bags and totes, wall-hangings, quilt kits,

and gift baskets have all been popular sellers in the past. If you have an item to donate, bring it to the guild meeting. We also need **fat quarters** for the basket of FQs we use as a prize for the raffle. If you have any fat quarters, please bring them to the meeting too.

- We need your raffle tickets!!! Penny LaRochelle is the raffle ticket coordinator again this year. She asks that each member return the raffle tickets and money for the tickets in an envelope with the member's name written on the outside. Penny wants to be sure to properly credit the returned tickets and money to the correct member and avoid spending time tracking down unreturned tickets. As a reminder, each member is required to sell (or buy) two books of raffle tickets to remain a member in good standing.
