Franklin County Quilters Guild Wednesday, December 13, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 PM by President Laurel Schaap, after which she invited the members to partake in the pot luck dinner. There were a variety of dishes that were all enjoyed!

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Helen Bicknell and 2nd by Nanc Ekiert to accept both Treasurer's report and Minutes of the November 2023 meeting. No discussion, Motion carried.

<u>Membership</u> (<u>Penny LaRochelle</u>): Penny reported the guild currently has 54 paid members to date. A total of 26 members were in attendance.

Comfort quilts (Denise Chase):

- Denise had a request for quilts from Home Health. After realizing there were only two quilts available to donate, she sent out a request for more quilts and members dropped off several quilts.
- Denise is going to contact Spectrum Youth & Family Services to see if they are in need of quilts.
- Denise brought with her a few quilt kits for people to take for piecing or for quilting. Please sign them out so that Denise can keep track of the kits.
- Laurel Schaap read a letter from the Franklin County Rehab. The letter was a thank you for the quilts they had received for the residents. A picture was included of smiling residents with some of the quilts.

Quilt Show (Helen Short and Teri Brunelle):

- On April 6 & 7, 2024 with set-up on Friday, April 5.
- Teri reported that more donated items are needed for the guild to sell at the show. Also needed are vendors to sell their own quilt-related products at the quilt show boutique.
- Teri reminded members about the Challenge Quilt this year, "Something Blue". The description can be found on the FCQG website.
- Penny LaRochelle reported that there are 3 registered quilts. The deadline to register a quilt for the show is March 1, 2024. The form can be found here.
- April Walker handed out flyers for members to put up in public places in the area. John Rouleau asked when is a good time to post the flyers. It was decided any time after January 1st.
- There was a discussion regarding the weekend of the show: it is the same weekend leading up to the solar eclipse (happening that following Monday), so there should be a lot of visitors in the area. The train station and the two area hotels should get flyers.
- Nanc Ekiert reported that \$2,300 has been deposited from sponsors for the show. The deadline for becoming a sponsor is December 31, 2023.
- Gale Weld reported that there are 4 business vendors who will be at the show.

• Teri's son has volunteered to get the poles needed to hang the quilts.

2024 Raffle Quilt (Sharon Perry and Denise Chase):

- Sharon handed out raffle tickets to members, who are asked to sell at least two books of tickets (or 6 tickets). The tickets are 1 ticket for \$2 or 3 tickets (one book) for \$5.
- Tickets for the raffle quilt were sold recently at the Montgomery Craft Show, with a total of \$336 collected.
- Penny LaRochelle reminded members of the challenge to meet or exceed her goal of selling 99 tickets.
- A picture of the charity quilt is online.

2024 Charity Quilt (Laurel Schaap and Gale Weld):

- Two charity quilts are being made this year, one by Laurel and Gale (to be quilted by Gale) and the other by Denise Chase and Helen Short (to be quilted by Beverly Cook).
- Another request for a Charity Quilt came in the mail recently from Rock Steady Boxing in St. Albans, a group for people with Parkinson's. A discussion about supporting this group with a quilt included the facts that many Franklin County people benefit from this group and a former FCQG member started the St. Albans Rock Steady Boxing. Helen Bicknell and Lucie Fortin offered a quilt they had already finished as the 3rd Charity Quilt to benefit Rock Steady Boxing. The members agreed to accept the quilt, especially after seeing the wonderful work that Helen and Lucie put into it.

<u>Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry)</u>: The newsletter can be found online <u>here</u>. Each newsletter comes out at least 2 weeks prior to each meeting. Items for the next newsletter are due to Sharon by December 27th, which is the last Wednesday of the month.

23 in 2023 Challenge (Sharon Perry):

- Penny LaRochelle won the prize! Congratulations, Penny!

Block of the Month (Lucie Fortin):

QUILT TIPS

- Instead of cutting individual bias triangles, cut triangles out of squares. This is much more accurate and efficient. You can get 8 half-square triangles from 1 square!
- Pinning is time consuming and sometimes unreliable. By using water-soluble glue, you can line up your pieces precisely and quickly. When finished, just wash your quilt and the glue will be gone! You can use pressing sheets to iron fabrics together, which will also wash out afterwards.
- Cut some bias strips to bind your edges and help your needle grab the fabric. This helps your edges to look cleaner and prevent gathering.
- Scissors aren't always the best tool for cutting. Get a rotary cutter to make trimming quilts faster.

- Strip quilting: If you're feeling spontaneous, give strip quilting a try! Strip quilting requires no patterns and is a great way to use up some fabric scraps. Quilt as you go by sewing strips onto batting in your order of choice. Additionally, this is a great technique for creating ombre effects or landscapes!
- Spinning intersections: When sewing four-patch squares, the fabric can easily become bulky instead of lying flat. To remedy this, make a spinning intersection. Break the thread in the middle seam of the square and fold up. Press so that the seams are all rotating around the square in the same direction.



RECIPE CORNER

CREAMY WHITE CHILI

1 pound boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch cubes

1 medium onion, chopped

1½ teaspoons garlic powder

1 tablespoon canola oil

 $1 \text{ can } (14\frac{1}{2} \text{ ounces}) \text{ chicken broth}$

2 cans (4 ounces each) chopped green chiles

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon dried oregano

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper

1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 cup sour cream

½ cup heavy whipping cream

Optional: Tortilla chips, shredded cheddar cheese, and sliced seeded jalapeno pepper

In a large saucepan, sauté the chicken, onion and garlic powder in oil until chicken is no longer pink. Add the beans, broth, chiles and seasonings. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 30 minutes.

Remove from the heat; stir in sour cream and heavy cream. If desired, top with tortilla chips, cheese and jalapenos.

BEST EVER POTATO SOUP

6 bacon strips, diced

3 cups cubed peeled potatoes

1 small carrot, grated

½ cup chopped onion

1 tablespoon dried parsley flakes

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon pepper

½ teaspoon celery seed

 $1 \operatorname{can} (14\frac{1}{2} \operatorname{ounces}) \operatorname{chicken} \operatorname{broth}$

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

3 cups 2% milk

8 ounces Velveeta, cubed

2 green onions, thinly sliced, optional

In a large saucepan, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp, stirring occasionally; drain drippings. Add vegetables, seasonings and broth; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, until potatoes are tender, 10-15 minutes.

Mix flour and milk until smooth; stir into soup. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir until thickened, about 2 minutes. Stir in cheese until melted. If desired, serve with green onions.

CABBAGE SOUP

3 tablespoons olive oil

1 medium yellow onion, chopped

2 ribs celery, chopped

2 medium carrots, sliced into ¼-inch thick rounds

3 cloves garlic, minced

½ large green cabbage, or 1 small cabbage

1 teaspoon dried thyme

½ teaspoon ground cumin

½ teaspoon smoked paprika

3/4 teaspoon salt, or to taste

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon black pepper, or to taste

15 ounces canned diced tomatoes, with their juices

4 cups low sodium vegetable broth

15 ounce can white beans, or chickpeas, rinsed and drained

1 tablespoon lemon juice, or to taste

Heat the olive oil in a large Dutch oven or other heavy pot over medium heat. Once hot, add the onion, celery and carrots and cook, stirring occasionally, for 6 minutes.

Meanwhile, wash, dry, and core the cabbage. Slice the cabbage into pieces that are approximately ½ inch by 2 inches.

Add the garlic, cabbage, dried thyme, cumin, smoked paprika, salt and pepper to the pot. Cook, stirring often, for 3 minutes.

Add the diced tomatoes, vegetable broth and white beans. Stir. Increase the heat to medium-high and bring the soup to a boil. Then reduce the heat to a low simmer, cover the pot, and cook for 20-25 minutes, or until the vegetables are tender.

Turn off the heat and stir in the lemon juice. Taste and season with additional salt and pepper, if needed. Serve.

RECIPE NOTES: Leftover soup can be stored in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 3 days or in the freezer for up to 3 months..
