Minutes for General Membership Meeting Wednesday, December 18, 2024

The guild gathering began with a delicious Potluck at 6pm. The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm by Jean Anne Branch for our monthly in-person meeting. She greeted all members in attendance and spoke about Leo Buscaglia, also known as "Dr. Love" who was an American author, motivational speaker, and a professor in the Department of Special Education at the University of Southern California. Given that this is the "Season of Love", Jean Anne shared with the group one of his remarkable quotes about love.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Nanc Ekiert and seconded by April Walker to accept both Treasurer's Report and Minutes of the November 20th meeting. Motion carried.

Chair Reports:

<u>Membership</u> (Penny LaRochelle): Penny reported a total of 67 paid members with 35 present at the meeting.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase)

- Quilt kits to be quilted and kits to piece are available. Please sign out, and please sign in upon return.
- Please sign in any quilt you make from your own materials.
- Denise was given several 1 yard pieces of military fabric. She is suggesting they be used to make military comfort quilts. Each piece taken should be signed out.
- Request for suggestions on who might want to receive quilts. Several members shared ideas such as a newly established home in St. Albans for battered woman, nursing homes, cancer patients, contacting State Police or local Police Stations to distribute during fire call, VNA/Hospice on Main St. and perhaps Sleep in Heavenly Peace an organization that makes and donates beds to kids and toddlers in need.
- Kathy Katz volunteered to research whether a supply of quilts would be welcomed by Hospice.

Quilt Show (Mary King & Beth Mouser)

- Penny LaRochelle announced there are 36 quilt show entries. Ideally she would like to have 100 quilts for display. Penny drew name for the quilt show entry prize raffle. Winner: Carol Stanley. Quilt show entry forms available on the website under Quilt Show forms or here.
- Shirley Babcock, Volunteer Coordinator, thanked everybody who had signed up to volunteer at the show. She still needs more slots to be filled. Although guild member demonstrator position may sound intimidating, she reminded members it can be as simple as hand stitching. Demo slots are 2 hours.
- April Walker announced posters are available. They have a "new fresh design". She distributed 5-10 posters to each member in attendance with instruction to post along your travels such as rest stops, schools or other shops. Posters should be out by February 1st, and the latest March 1st. If you are traveling to a quilt shop, please contact April to let her know as she has postcards for distribution. This would save her from mailing postcards to shops to give out.

Mary Jane Rossi, Co-President, lead the rest of the meeting:

<u>2025 Raffle Quilt</u> (Laurel Schaap & Sharon Perry) Mary Jane Rossi spoke on behalf of Laurel and Sharon who were not present tonight.

- Penny LaRochelle will be collecting member's raffle ticket money (tickets and cash/check need to be in and envelope with member's name) tonight.
- For those members who have not picked up their tickets, Sharon Perry will be mailing then out to you.
- Sharon indicated with selling raffle tickets at 2 farmers' markets and 2 craft fairs, they have collected \$668 which includes some donations and sale of boutique items. Members' sales stand at \$307 with the grand total at \$975.

- Information was presented for consideration only. Further research will be conducted with discussion and vote deferred to the January meeting.



RECIPE CORNER

HOMEMADE BREAD

2 cups warm water (105-115 degrees)

1 tablespoons active dry yeast*

1/4 cup honey or sugar

2 teaspoons salt

2 tablespoons oil (canola or vegetable)

4 - 5 1/2 cups all-purpose or bread flour*

In a large bowl or stand mixer add the yeast, water and a pinch of the sugar or honey. Allow to rest for 5-10 minutes until foaming and bubbly. (This is called "proofing" the yeast, to make sure it is active. *If it doesn't foam, the yeast is no good, and you need to start over with fresh yeast.) Add remaining sugar or honey, salt, oil, and 3 cups of flour. Mix to combine.

Add another cup of flour and mix to combine. With the mixer running add more flour, ½ cup at a time, until the dough begins to pull away from the sides of the bowl. The dough should be smooth and elastic, and slightly stick to a clean finger, but not be overly sticky. Add a little more flour, if needed.

Mix the dough for 4-5 minutes on medium speed (or knead with your hands on a lightly floured surface, for 5-8 minutes).

Grease a large bowl with oil or cooking spray and place the dough inside, turning to coat. Cover with a dish towel or plastic wrap and allow to rise in a warm place* until doubled in size, about 1 ½ hours. Spray two 9x5" bread pans generously with cooking spray on all sides. (Optional: line the bottom of the pans with a small piece of parchment paper.)

Punch the dough down well to remove air bubbles. Divide into two equal portions. Shape each ball into long logs and place into greased loaf pans.

Cover pans with a lightweight, dry dish towel (or spray two pieces of plastic wrap generously with cooking spray and lay them gently over the pans). Allow dough to rise again for about 45 minutes to one hour, or until risen about 1 inch above the loaf pans. Gently removing covering.

Preheat oven to 350 F. Bake bread for about 30-33 minutes, or until golden brown on top. Give the top of a loaf a gentle tap; it should sound hollow.

Invert the loaves onto a wire cooling rack. Brush the tops with butter and allow to cool for at least 10 minutes before slicing.

Once cool, store in an airtight container or bag for 2-3 days at room temperature, or up to 5 days in the refrigerator.

ENGLISH TOASTING BREAD

2 packages active dry yeast (4½ teaspoons)

6 cups un-sifted flour

1 tablespoon sugar

2 teaspoons salt

2 cups milk

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1 egg, slightly beaten with enough water to make ½ cup

Preheat oven to 400°F. Coat 2 loaf pans with cooking spray and sprinkle with cornmeal.

Combine 3 cups flour, yeast, sugar, salt and soda in mixing bowl.

Heat milk to 120/130°F (about 2½ minutes in the microwave). Stir milk and egg/water mixture into dry mixture. Beat well. Add remaining flour to make a stiff dough. Stir, making sure to wet all the flour.

Spoon dough into 2 loaf pans. Sprinkle cornmeal on top of loaves. Let rise 45 minutes.

Bake for 25 minutes with oven rack one level below middle of the oven. Remove from pans to cool on a rack.

NO KNEAD BREAD

31/3 cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoon kosher salt (or 1½ teaspoon table salt)

1/4 teaspoon active dry yeast

1½ cups warm water

Mix all ingredients together until a sticky dough forms. Cover with plastic wrap and a towel and leave to rise in a warm place away from drafts. Let rise for a minimum of 12 hours up to 20 hours.

Flour a clean dry surface. Dump dough out and press out bubbles. Knead a few times by pressing down, folding over, turning and repeating. Form into a ball and dust with flour. Leave to rise a minimum of 2 hours until doubled in size.

When bread is nearly finished rising, preheat oven to 450 degrees. Place heavy lidded pot such as a Dutch oven in the oven to preheat on a rack between the middle and bottom. Carefully place dough into the heated pot, cover and cook for 30 minutes.

Remove lid and cook another 15 - 20 minutes or so until the dough is nicely browned and a good crust is formed.
