

President Laurel Schaap called the meeting to order and welcomed all to the zoom meeting at 6:30 p.m.

We immediately moved into the program with Gale Weld introducing Emily Taylor who presented us with a trunk show of her collage quilting collection. Krissy Kilburn won the door prize.

Following Emily's presentation, we moved into our regular meeting.

Sharon Perry moved to accept the Consent Agenda after a correction was noted in both the Treasurer's and Secretary's report. Penny LaRochelle seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Programs:

- Gale Weld stated that the February zoom meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 8, 2023, at 6:30 p.m. with the Adventure Quilter making a presentation.
- A workshop will be held on Saturday, February 11, at 8:30 a.m. This will be a Zoom workshop. Currently there are seven participants with room for up to 20 participants total. (More information available in the newsletter.)
- The March Guild meeting will be a live meeting, held on the third Wednesday of March. This meeting will be a slide presentation showing various members' sewing rooms.

Comfort Quilts:

- Denise Chase delivered 13 quilts to Home Health.
- Denise also indicated that she has a high school connection with Janet McCarthy who can give us information on students needing quilts.

<u>Quilt Show</u>:

- Helen Short reported that Denise still has raffle tickets for members to sell.
- Penny reported that there are currently 23 quilt entries: 8 bed quilts, 8 lap quilts, 2 wall hangings, 4 miniquilts, and 1 Challenge quilt.
- Helen indicated that members may enter as many quilts as they want.
- Jean Anne Branch has an updated list of volunteers and will be calling members after February 1 to recruit more volunteers.
- Helen stated that she hoped all members would display at least one quilt.
- Helen again described the Dresden Challenge Quilt.
- Membership:
- Penny reported that there are currently 55 members with 2 new members.
- It was noted that we had 35 members present in 31 locations plus two guests.

- Laurel stated that we need to start considering people to hold offices next year.

At this point we moved to Show and Tell which was cut short due to technical difficulties. January's show and tell will be rolled into February's slide show.

Beth Brault moved to adjourn meeting at 8:30 pm, followed by several seconds. Meeting adjourned.

Franklin County Quilters Guild Sugarhouse Ga 9 WEEKS AND COUNTING... UNTIL THE <u>2023 QUILT SHOW</u>

The 2023 Quilt Show is 9 weeks away, and the planning and preparations continue behind the scenes. As the event draws near, we depend on all guild members to ensure the quilt show is a huge success. Continue reading to see how you can help.

- We need QUILTS! It's all about the quilts!!! Penny LaRochelle has volunteered as the Quilt Registration coordinator and she wants to have the quilts registered sooner rather than later. So let's help Penny out and get ALL the quilts registered well before the March 1st deadline. The quilt registration form can be found <u>here</u>. The quilt show chairs, along with Penny, challenge each guild member to enter at least one quilt in the show. But don't stop there; we need lots more quilts to fill up the auditorium at the City Hall. As a reminder, <u>all quilts,</u> <u>including those in the Small/Miniature category</u>, must have a sleeve sewn (not pinned) to the back. The sleeve must be at least 4" wide.

- We need volunteers!!! Jean Anne Branch is in charge of getting volunteers for the quilt show. She began signups at the October meeting. As an English proverb says, "Many hands make light work." There are many jobs from which to choose. Be sure to take a look at the volunteer list found <u>here</u>. Take a look at your calendar and sign up for a time that fits your schedule. Contact Jean Anne, 802-891-6187 or jeanabranch@comcast.net, and let her know when you'd like to volunteer.

- We need your raffle tickets!!! Denise Chase is the raffle ticket coordinator this year. Denise asks that each member return the raffle tickets and money for the tickets in an envelope with the member's name written on the outside. Denise wants to be sure to properly credit the returned tickets and money to the correct member and avoid spending time tracking down unreturned tickets. As a reminder, to remain a member in good standing and eligible to take guild workshops, each member must sell 2 packets of tickets. The tickets are 1 ticket for \$2 or 3 tickets for \$5. Once sold members can bring their sold tickets and money to a guild meeting **OR** send the tickets and money (check(s) payable to FCQG) to Denise Chase, 55 Barlow Street, St Albans, VT 05478. Be sure to include your return address on the envelope so Denise can properly credit the ticket sales to your name. All raffle tickets and money must be returned by March 15th at the guild meeting.

2023 CHALLENGE QUILT

The 2023 Challenge Quilt will feature the Dresden Plate. An entire plate is not required. However, you must have a minimum of 4 sections of the plate. Those 4 sections do not have to be sewn together into a unit. Your plate sections do not have to be the same size nor made out of the same fabrics. The perimeter of your Challenge Quilt must be no more than 96 inches. <u>A sleeve for hanging is required</u>. Let your imagination run wild!

DID YOU MAKE THE 2021-2022 SUGARHOUSE SAMPLER MYSTERY QUILT?

Or are you currently working on one? The Quilt Show committee plans to have a <u>special display of members'</u> <u>completed Sugarhouse Sampler Mystery Quilts at the</u> <u>April 2023 quilt show</u>. If you haven't finished yours yet, there's still time to complete your sampler quilt and have it be part of this special display.

Please be sure to <u>register your Sugarhouse Sampler</u> <u>Mystery Quilt with Penny</u> so she can include in the quilt layout and display. **Don't forget** to put a **4" sleeve** on the back of your quilt so it can hang at the quilt show.

QUILT TIPS

- Sew your label into the seam that sews on the binding. This way there are only two sides to hand sew, and it is more difficult to for the label to be removed.
- Use old thread spools to keep ribbon and other fancy embellishments wrapped around.
- When you have to match seams, use a dab of fabric glue (tube or stick) within the seam allowance instead of pins. From the right side, you'll be able to clearly see whether the seams match with no pins in the way. The bond is not instant so you'll have time to separate the pieces and try again if necessary.
- My tip is to use a Q-tip to clean lint from your bobbin area. It won't scratch your machine, and lint will cling to the Q-tip to be removed easily. After basting your quilt, roll backing edges over the batting and pin to the quilt; this encloses the excess batting and helps to defray snagging/picking up stray threads.
- The boxes sold in craft and fabric store to hold photos make a great way to store the fabric and patterns for quilts. The label in the front makes for easy identification and they can be stacked for storage.
- Gray thread is a great neutral color for piecing.



MYSTERY QUILT PROJECT FOR 2022-2023 MEMBERSHIP YEAR

Diane Comeau and Lucie Fortin have been working together over the summer to bring guild members another fun and unique mystery quilt with blocks presented each month during the 2022-2023 membership year. It sounds like another stunning quilt. If you missed out on making the FCQG Sugarhouse Sampler this past year, you can join this year's mystery.

Diane plans to handle the distribution of the instructions for each month's block(s) a little different from last year's mystery quilt. She will still have the current month's BOM in paper version at each guild meeting and any past months where there are extras for those members who would prefer a paper copy.

In addition to the paper copy available at the meeting, Diane will also have a pattern available on her website for each month's instructions. Diane will provide a link each month for that month's

When you click on the link, it will direct you to Diane's business website. Even though there is a "price" for each month's pattern, guild members will have a coupon code to enter which will zero out the "price" for the pattern.

To access the pattern, click on the link in blue above. Once you access Diane's business page, click "Add to Cart." Now go to your cart and under the word Subtotal, click on Enter Coupon. Enter BOM2023 then click Apply as shown in Figure A below. Once you click Apply, the "price" for the pattern will be \$0.00. The coupon code (BOM2023) will be valid until July 31, 2023, so Diane encourages all 2022-2023 members to use the code upon the release of the pattern each month. You will be required to enter your email address so the system can send you a link to download your file. The file will be available for an unlimited number of downloads.

QUILT TIPS

- Use a fold-up, wooden laundry rack for organizing your strips for a project.
- Before you sew on your quilt label, tuck some fabric scraps from the quilt between the label and the quilt. Then stitch your label on. This way the fabric scraps get relatively the same amount of wear and tear and washing as the rest of the quilt. You will always have the perfect repair fabrics right with the quilt if ever needed.
- Taken an old, kid-safe prescription bottle and drill a small hole in the top. When you break a needle or have to replace a dull needle, just drop the old needle into that bottle.
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!



RECIPE CORNER

PEPPERMINT PATTY

3 cups confectioners' sugar

3 tablespoons unsalted butter, at room temperature

- 3 tablespoons heavy cream
- 1¼ teaspoon peppermint extract

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

12 ounces dark chocolate candy melts (available at craft stores and the holiday baking section of specialty groceries)

In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, mix the confectioners' sugar and butter to combine. Add the cream gradually, and mix until the mixture is uniform, 2 to 3 minutes.

Add the peppermint and vanilla extracts, and mix to combine, 1 minute more.

Place the peppermint mixture on a piece of parchment paper and form it into a log about 2 inches in circumference.

Wrap the log in the parchment and transfer to the freezer. Freeze until well chilled, 20 to 30 minutes.

Using a sharp knife, cut the frozen log into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch thick wafers. If the mixture seems to have softened, return the wafers to the freezer.

Melt the chocolate in the microwave in 15-second intervals, mixing in between. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Working one at a time, dip each wafer into the melted chocolate with a fork. Tap away excess chocolate from the base, and then transfer each dipped piece to the prepared baking sheet. Let set fully.

Once the chocolate has set, use a spoon to drizzle more melted chocolate over the peppermint patties in a decorative fashion. Let set fully before serving. Store in an airtight container for up to a week.

BAILEYS CHOCOLATE TRUFFLES

One 12 ounce bag dark chocolate chips % cup heavy cream % cup Baileys Irish Cream 3 tablespoons unsalted butter Chocolate sprinkles, as needed for finishing

Place the chocolate chips in a medium, heat safe bowl.

In a small pot, bring the cream to a boil over medium heat. When it's boiling, remove from the heat and stir in the Baileys Irish Cream. Pour the hot cream over the chocolate and let it sit for 15 seconds. Stir the mixture until it's smooth and glossy. If the chocolate doesn't all melt, microwave the mixture in 15 second intervals until it's totally smooth.

Stir the butter into the ganache until it's melted and fully combined. Pour the mixture into a medium shallow dish (like a 9x9 baking dish or casserole), and transfer to the refrigerator. Chill until the ganache is firm, about 1 hour.

To shape the truffles, scoop 2 tablespoon mounds of ganache and roll them into balls between your palms. Scatter sprinkles into an even layer on a medium plate, and roll each truffle in sprinkles to coat.

Keep the truffles refrigerated until ready to serve. Store leftovers in an airtight container, refrigerated, for up to 1 week.

IRISH CRÈME CHOCOLATE TRIFLE

1 package devil's food cake mix (regular size)

- $1\ {\rm cup}\ {\rm refrigerated}\ {\rm Irish}\ {\rm crème}\ {\rm nondairy}\ {\rm creamer}$
- 31/2 cups 2% milk

2 small packages instant chocolate pudding mix

3 cups whipped topping

12 Andes mint candies, chopped

Prepare and bake cake mix according to package directions, using a 13x9-in. pan. Cool in pan on a wire rack 1 hour.

With a meat fork or wooden skewer, poke holes in cake about 2 in. apart. Slowly pour creamer over cake; refrigerate, covered, 1 hour.

In a large bowl, whisk milk and pudding mixes 2 minutes; let stand until soft-set, about 2 minutes.

Cut cake into 1-1/2-in. cubes. In a 3-qt. trifle or glass bowl, layer a third of each of the following: cake cubes, pudding, whipped topping and candies. Repeat layers twice. Refrigerate until serving.
