

Franklin County Quilters Guild Wednesday, February 21, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:31 PM by Laurel Schaap for our online Zoom meeting.

Program: The meeting started with our program for the evening, guest speaker Andrew Lee, The Combat Quilter, from Loudon, Tennessee. Andrew is an Army veteran and is currently serving with the National Guard. Andrew presented a heart-warming trunk show. He has gifted many Quilts of Valor to veterans across the country.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Helen Bicknell and 2nd by Helen Short to accept both Treasurer's report and Minutes of the January 2024 meeting. No discussion. Motion carried.

Membership (Penny LaRochelle): Penny reported the guild currently has 56 paid members to date. A total of 24 members were in attendance and one guest, "Zooming in" from 22 locations.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase):

- Denise has several quilts that need quilting, plus there are kits available to take home to make quilts. She has a lot of fabric that has been donated to the guild.
- Sharon Perry suggested having a sewing session. Bonnie Evans reminded guild members that the hospital (NWMC) has a room available on weekends. A discussion ensued about possibly organizing a sewing session after the April quilt show. Meanwhile, members are welcome to contact Denise to pick up a kit from her at her home in St. Albans.

Quilt Show (Helen Short and Teri Brunelle):

- On April 6 & 7, 2024 with set-up on Friday, April 5.
- Helen reported that posters have been put up in public places. April Walker has more posters if members need more to display. Flyers and posters have been dropped off at area businesses, plus press releases have gone out to quilt guilds in Vermont, upstate New York, and New Hampshire.
- St. Albans City Hall has been given posters to display.
- A new banner has been delivered to People's Trust Company for display. Helen is hoping that BFA-St. Albans is able to post the quilt show dates on their electronic sign in front of the school.
- Helen reported that three people have signed up to sell items at the boutique during the show. Donations of made items are welcomed for the guild to sell at the show. Denise Chase asked if donated books will be allowed to be sold in the boutique. Helen said yes, the money will go to the guild.
- Mary King asked for clarification on how the items in the boutique will be tagged. Helen said that there will be tags available to put on items, with the seller's initials and price. When the item is sold, the tag is removed; once the quilt show is done, the tags will be

- totaled and the members will receive a check for the items they sold, less 10% to go to the guild.
- Penny LaRochelle reported that there are 82 registered quilts, with two more to be registered. The deadline to register a quilt for the show is March 1, 2024.
- Gale Weld reported that all 5 business vendors have paid for their tables at the show.
- Shirley Babcock reported that more volunteers are needed for the show. On the guild's website, one can find the lists of volunteers, either by time and date or by last name/first name.
- Helen reminded members that students from the Northwest Career and Technical Center Building Trades Program will be volunteering to help set up the quilt show on Friday, April 5th. Quilt guild members who volunteer with set up will be able to guide the students on how to set up the poles, etc.
- Since the quilt show is happening the two days prior to the total solar eclipse (which will occur in northern Vermont), Cindy Metayer suggested that the local hotels be given posters and flyers to display. Sharon Perry will contact a local hotelier to see if there is an email list of hotels in the area; if there is, she will email the hotels with our quilt show information.

2024 Raffle Quilt (Sharon Perry and Denise Chase):

- Sharon mailed raffle tickets to members who did not have their tickets. Members are asked to sell at least two books of tickets (or 6 tickets). The tickets are 1 ticket for \$2 or 3 tickets (one book) for \$5. Sharon has collected close to \$1,000 from ticket sales to date.
- Both Penny LaRochelle and Sharon Perry have met Penny's challenge of selling 99 tickets. Penny encouraged more people to meet her challenge.
- All monies from the ticket sales and the ticket stubs will be collected by Sharon. Please return your tickets and money before the quilt show.

2024 Charity Quilt (Laurel Schaap and Gale Weld): Three charity quilts are being made this year, one by Laurel and Gale, one by Denise Chase and Helen Short, and one by Helen Bicknell and Lucie Fortin. The three charities receiving these beautiful quilts to raffle are the Enosburgh Food Shelf, The Meeting House on the Green in Fairfield, and Rock Steady Boxing in St. Albans.

<u>Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry)</u>: The newsletter can be found online <u>here</u>. Each newsletter comes out at least 2 weeks prior to each meeting. Items for the next newsletter are due to Sharon by February 28th, which is the last Wednesday of the month.

24 in 2024 Challenge (Sharon Perry): Sharon reminded members of the form on the website for the new 24 in 2024 Challenge. She suggested printing it and putting it next to your sewing table. Then fill out the form as you finish your 24 projects this year.



February 21 Guild Meeting Minutes (Cont.)

Block of the Month (Lucie Fortin):

- The BOM for March is a Quilt of Valor pattern ("Disappearing Harlequin"). The pattern will be posted online on the guild's website.
- Lucie requested members bring their completed January, February, and March BOM blocks to the March in-person meeting.

<u>Program and Workshop Announcements for 2023-24</u> (Deb Trahan and Cathy Carlson):

- Deb described the March 20th meeting program: Spring Members' Demos by four members. Deb is still looking for two more volunteers to demonstrate a quilting-related technique.
- The brown bag projects will be due at the April meeting, which will be distributed during the meeting.
- For the April program, Janice Roy will give a MacDuff Bag and Jacket Trunk Show on Friday, April 19th. The meeting will be in the Holy Trinity Church in Swanton. Janice's MacDuff Bag workshop will be held on Saturday, April 20th, in the same location. There are two sizes for the MacDuff bag, large and mini. If you want to attend the workshop and you buy the kit for the bag (\$50 for the large bag; \$35 for the mini bag), there is no additional charge for the class (the kit includes the instructor's fee, pattern, fabric, lining, and dowels). If you decide to not buy the kit, the cost for the workshop is \$30 (to pay for the instructor and the pattern). There is no limit to the number of people attending, but if you are interested, please contact Deb a few weeks prior to the April 20th workshop so that Janice has time to put together the kits.
- The May 15th program is Pillow Talk Trunk Show with Diane Comeau of CaDi Corners. A workshop with Diane will be on the following Saturday.
- For the June program, there will be a members' trunk sale and pot luck dinner. Members are welcome to bring quilt-related items for sale. Sale items will stay in people's car trunks and members will go out to the parking lot to purchase items. Funds will go to the guild.
- For additional information on the May and June programs, please see the front page of this newsletter.

Other Business:

- Helen Short was contacted by a local man whose wife passed away recently. He wanted to know if he could sell fat quarter fabric at the quilt show. Helen told him that he would not be able to, but Helen offered to go to his home in early May to help him sort through the fabric (most Keepsake Quilting brand) and possibly help him sell it.
- The Nominating Committee is still looking for next year's President, Secretary, and Quilt Show Chair.

Helen Short volunteered to co-chair Programs with Cathy Carlson.

Drawings: Shirley Babcock won the membership door prize.

A motion was made by Jean Anne Branch to adjourn the meeting, 2nd by Sharon Perry. Motion carried, and the meeting adjourned at 8:30 PM.

HOW TO MAKE AND ATTACH A QUILT SLEEVE

QUILT TIPS

- Use a dry erase marker to temporarily mark the line you need to use on your acrylic ruler so you can see it better. When you are finished, wipe it off!
- Instead of sewing directly on the drawn line, position your needle just a hair to the right of it.
 When the seam is pressed open, you will find that you will have nailed it. (This works because the thickness of your fabric eats a bit into your 1/4" seam; that hair you gave took that into account.)
- Sometimes your needle might accumulate gunk from spray baste or other adhesives as you quilt or applique. Use a Q-tip dipped in alcohol or a medical prep wipe to clean it off!

BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM): DISAPPEARING HARLEQUIN BLOCK

Lucie Fortin is the project coordinator for this membership year, and she's bringing back the traditional Block of the Month (BOM) projects.

Each month Lucie will provide instructions for completing the BOM to include color choices. This month's BOM is the Disappearing Harlequin in red, white, and blue; instructions for the block can be found here. Members are encouraged to make a block each month and turn it in for the BOM raffle the following month.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times. If you win all the blocks, they are yours to keep.

You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.

RECIPE CORNER

CLASSIC CABBAGE ROLLS

1 medium head cabbage

1-1/2 cups chopped onion, divided

1 tablespoon butter

2 cans (14-1/2 ounces each) Italian stewed tomatoes

4 garlic cloves, minced

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1-1/2 teaspoons salt, divided

1 cup cooked rice

1/4 cup ketchup

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 pound lean ground beef (90% lean)

1/4 pound bulk Italian sausage

In a Dutch oven, cook cabbage in boiling water for 10 minutes or until outer leaves are tender; drain. Rinse in cold water; drain. Remove 8 large outer leaves (refrigerate remaining cabbage for another use); set aside.

In a large saucepan, sauté 1 cup onion in butter until tender. Add the tomatoes, garlic, brown sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine the rice, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, pepper and remaining onion and salt. Crumble beef and sausage over mixture and mix well.

Remove thick vein from cabbage leaves for easier rolling. Place about 1/2 cup meat mixture on each leaf; fold in sides. Starting at an unfolded edge, roll up leaf to completely enclose filling. Place seam side down in a skillet. Top with the sauce.

Cover and cook over medium-low heat for 1 hour. Add V8 juice if desired. Reduce heat to low; cook 20 minutes longer or until rolls are heated through and a thermometer inserted in the filling reads 160° .

PISTACHIO CAKE WITH FROSTING

1 (18.25 ounce) package white cake mix

3/4 cup vegetable oil

1 cup lemon-lime flavored carbonated beverage

3 eggs

2 (3 ounce) packages instant pistachio pudding mix

2 (1.3 ounce) envelopes whipped topping mix

1½ cups milk

Beat cake mix, oil, soda, eggs, and first package of pudding until smooth. Pour batter into a greased 9x13-inch pan.

Bake at 325°F for 45 minutes, or cake tests done.

Beat Dream Whip, milk, and pudding until stiff; pour over cooled cake. Refrigerate.

GUINNESS, WHISKEY & IRISH CREAM CUPCAKES For the cupcakes:

1 cup (230 ml) Guinness stout

1 cup (227 g) unsalted butter, at room temperature

3/4 cup (64.5 g) Dutch-process cocoa powder

2 cups (250 g) all-purpose flour

2 cups (400 g) granulated sugar

1½ teaspoons baking soda

3/4 teaspoons salt

2 eggs

²/₃ cup (153.33 ml) sour cream

For the whiskey ganache filling:

8 ounces bittersweet chocolate, finely chopped

²/₃ cup (158.67 ml) heavy cream

2 tablespoons butter, at room temperature

2 teaspoons Irish whiskey

For the Bailey's frosting:

2 cups (454 g) unsalted butter, at room temperature

5 cups (600 g) powdered sugar

6 tablespoons Bailey's Irish Cream

<u>Make the cupcakes</u>: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line two standard muffin tins with liners.

Place the Guinness and butter in a medium saucepan and bring to a simmer over medium heat. Add the cocoa powder and whisk until the mixture is smooth. Remove from the heat and cool slightly.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking soda, and salt; set aside.

Using an electric mixer, beat the eggs and sour cream on medium speed until combined. Add the Guinness-chocolate mixture to the egg mixture and beat just to combine. Reduce the speed to low, add the flour mixture and beat just until it starts to come together, about 30 seconds. Using a rubber spatula, fold the batter until completely combined. Divide the batter among the cupcake liners.

Bake until a thin knife inserted into the center comes out clean, about 17 minutes. Cool for 5 minutes in the pan, then remove the cupcakes to a wire rack to cool completely. **Recipe continues on Page 8...**



GUINNESS, WHISKEY & IRISH CREAM CUPCAKES (Recipe continued from Page 7)

Make the whiskey ganache filling: Place the chocolate in a heatproof bowl. Place the heavy cream in a small saucepan and bring to simmer over medium heat. Immediately pour it over the chocolate, then let it sit for two minutes. Using a rubber spatula, gently stir the mixture from the center outward until smooth. Add the butter and whiskey and stir until combined. Let the ganache cool until thick but still soft enough to be piped, about 30 minutes. (If it becomes too stiff, simply give it a good whisk and it will loosen up.)

<u>Fill the cupcakes</u>: Using a paring knife, cut the centers out of the cooled cupcakes, going about two-thirds of the way down. Using a cookie scoop or spoon, divide the prepared ganache between the centers of the cupcakes.

Make the Baileys frosting: Using the whisk attachment of a stand mixer, whip the butter on medium-high speed for 5 minutes, scraping the sides of the bowl occasionally. Reduce the speed to medium-low and gradually add the powdered sugar until all of it is incorporated. Add the Baileys, increase the speed to medium-high and whip for another 2 to 3 minutes, until it is light and fluffy.

Using your favorite decorating tip, or an offset spatula, frost the cupcakes and decorate with sprinkles, if desired. Store the cupcakes in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 4 days.
