Minutes for General Membership Meeting Wednesday, February 19, 2025

The meeting was called to order via Zoom at 6:32 pm by Jean Anne Branch for our monthly meeting. She greeted all members in attendance and mentioned how February is the month of love. She shared with the group a poem about friendship and love written by Becky Helmsley.

Announcement: Jean Anne pointed out the quilt hanging up behind Sharon Perry during the meeting. Sharon mentioned this is the BINGO quilt made by guild members who participated in making bingo blocks during a program event and was quilted by Helen Bicknell. The question raised; "What do we do with the now completed quilt?" Jean Anne mentioned we can vote on suggestions made by the guild at the March meeting. Gale Weld recommended having the quilt displayed at this year's quilt show, with a narrative that explained the origin and how guild members participated in a group event. Sharon Perry agreed to create a narrative. Helen Short mentioned that after the quilt show, this quilt would make a nice comfort quilt for a family after a housing disaster. No further discussion and no formal vote.

Charity Quilt 2024-25: Jean Anne received only one letter of request. This letter was from Kay Benedict on behalf of St. John's Episcopal Church for their restoration projects. St. John's Episcopal Church in Highgate was built in 1830 and is listed on the National Registry. The church stands as an important architectural landmark and will be used as a venue for weddings and concerts. Motion to approve: Mary King; Second: Sharon Perry. Plan is to invite Kay Benedict to the May meeting and present the 2024-25 charity quilt to her.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Penny LaRochelle and seconded by Sharon Perry to accept the January 15th Secretary and February Treasurer's reports. All in favor, motion carried.

Chair Reports:

Block of the Month (Carol Stanley):

- Carol presented a sample of the March Block of the Month.
 A cat block which was derived from a cat quilt pattern by MSOC.
- Instructions will also be posted on the guild FB page, as well as on the FCQG website under "Projects".
- Members are encouraged to complete blocks and bring all completed BOM blocks (December, January, February and March) to the NEXT in-person meeting which will be held in March.

Programs (Cathy Carlson and John Rouleau): Cathy introduced Pam Weeks, who is an author and quilter from Auburn, NH. She presented a lecture on "Soft Protest" storytelling. Her lecture and slide show focused on the history of storytelling, raising social awareness and protest in textiles and quilts. Pam explained how stories were quilted into bed coverings and tapestries as early as 1400, and protest quilts go back to 1830. She is the author of Civil War Quilts, Portable Patchwork and is the Binney Family curator for New England Ouilt Museum in Lowell, MA.

<u>**Drawing:**</u> Pam Weeks, our Program speaker choice #9. Paula Fisher won the membership door prize.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase):

- Denise mentioned guild received two large fabric donations. She has an abundance of fabric to select from, please go to her house and SHOP for fabric to make comfort quilts.
- 520 fat quarters, plus a lot of 11X9 inch pieces. Also donated were several 14" pillow forms. She is suggesting you take 2 and make matching pillows to sell at the Boutique as a guild fundraiser.
- Denise also has a box filled with layers of 4,5,6 inch strips.
- Kits need to be taken. She may consider NOT accepting quilt donations since fabric in house is a bounty! She plans to come up with ideas and get back to us.
- There is a need for Twin size quilts.
- The Veterans Center in Northfield and Spectrum requesting twin size quilts.
- 10 quilts have been donated to Linus Quilt Project.
- 10 quilts have been donated to Franklin County Rehab Center.
- Sharon Perry shared an idea about organizing a "quilting bee" for members to gather and make quilts, or to create kits with patterns for members to create quilts with guild fabric.
- Final reminder about change in show-n-tell process. Denise will accept quilt tops, but they must be quilted BEFORE they are presented for show-n-tell. This is to ensure her count of quilts is accurately documented.

<u>Membership</u> (<u>Penny LaRochelle</u>): Membership via zoom meeting:

- Penny announced there are 68 paid members.
- Sharon Perry reported 25 locations, with 27 members in attendance plus 1 guest.

Ouilt Show (Mary King and Beth Mouser):

- Mary King announced we still need volunteers for the quilt show especially for Charity Table and Demo Table.
- Shirley Babcock sent a nice letter asking for members to volunteer. PLEASE contact Shirley and volunteer as a participating guild member.
- April Walker is managing advertisement at area rest stops.
- Penny LaRochelle indicated 82 quilts registered. Have room for 20 more!
- Sharon Perry reminded members to check the website for 2 volunteer listings (date/time and alphabetical)
- Sharon Perry asked about the handling of the member boutique participant forms. She also mentioned a tote in the storage unit with saleable items.
- Mary raised concern about the form on web page being inaccessible. It was deemed the form has yet to be update.
 Teri Brunelle and Mary King will be working on all the details surrounding the membership boutique.

<u>Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry)</u>: Deadline for submissions is Wednesday, February 26th.

Other Business:

• <u>Nominating Committee</u>: Jean Anne announced the development of the Nominating Committee (3 volunteer) to present a slate of officers for the 2025-26 year at the May meeting. A vote will be taken at the June meeting for proposed slate of officers. (Minutes continued on page 4)



MYSTERY QUILTS

Did you know? Have you ever done a quilt that you did not know what it was until it was completed? Here are several sites for mystery quilts.

<u>Mystery Quilts Anonymous</u>: This site belongs to Debi Montgomery. She's the speaker the guild had last September.

<u>Quiltville</u>: Bonnie Hunter does her yearly mystery quilt in the fall. How her mystery quilt works:

- The journey begins around Halloween each year when Bonnie releases her color scheme and color inspiration.
- At the end of November (the Friday after Thanksgiving), she releases the fabric requirements and the first set of instructions.
- Over the following weeks, she posts step-by-step clues, guiding participants through the construction of a stunning quilt. The twist? You don't know what the final design will look like until the very end?
- Each clue introduces a new block or assembly techniques, keeping quilter guessing and building anticipation. Bonnie has her own website, page, and blog dedicated to the current mystery quilt.

Quilter's World: This site features a mystery quilt that uses your scraps.

<u>Meadow Mist Designs</u>: This site features free mystery quilt patterns. There is an option to purchase the pattern as a complete instruction set.

The block featured at the February meeting is called Calico Cats; instructions for the block can be found here. Carol Stanley, this year's Project Coordinator for the guild, says to use fun fabrics and white-on-white background. Bring your blocks to the March meeting.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times.

You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.



The 2025 Quilt Show is fast approaching, and the planning and preparations continue behind the scenes. As the event draws near, we depend on all guild members to ensure the quilt show is a huge success. Continue reading to see how you can help.

- We have the quilts!!! Thanks to everyone who has entered a quilt. With all the quilts registered, the City Hall auditorium will truly be ablaze with color. As a reminder, all quilts, including those in the Small/Miniature category, must have a sleeve sewn (not pinned) to the back. The sleeve must be at least 4" wide. See page 6 for instructions to put a sleeve on your quilt.
- We still need volunteers!!! Shirley Babcock is in charge of getting volunteers for the quilt show. As an English proverb says, "Many hands make light work." There are jobs which remained unfilled. Be sure to take a look at the volunteer list found here. If one of the remaining jobs fits in your schedule, please contact Shirley, 802-524-3768 or sbabcock2@hotmail.com, and let her know when you'd like to volunteer.
- We need your raffle tickets!!! Sharon Perry is the raffle ticket coordinator this year. Once tickets are sold members can bring their sold tickets and money to the March guild meeting; Penny LaRochelle will be collecting them for Sharon OR send the tickets and money (check(s) payable to FCQG) to Sharon Perry, PO Box 517, Montgomery Center, VT 05471. Be sure to include your return address on the envelope so Sharon can properly credit the ticket sales to your name. All raffle tickets and money must be returned by March 19th at the guild meeting.
- We need member items for/donations to the guild boutique!!! Members can sell their items in the boutique; you can find the form to inventory your items here. But if you don't want to sell your items, you can always donate items with all proceeds going to the guild.

Quilts entered in the show need to be dropped off at the City Hall Conference Room between 10:00 am and noon on Friday, April 5th. RECIPE CORNER

ONE PAN CHICKEN WITH CREAMY NOODLES

3 garlic cloves, minced

2 cups heavy cream

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts

2 tablespoons olive oil

8 oz egg noodles

Salt and pepper, to taste

2 cups chicken broth

3 tablespoons butter

½ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Fresh parsley, chopped (optional)

In a large skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Season the chicken breasts generously with salt and pepper. Once the oil is hot, add the chicken to the skillet. Cook for about 5-6 minutes on each side until the chicken is golden brown and cooked through. Once done, remove the chicken from the skillet and set it aside on a plate.

In the same skillet, add the minced garlic and sauté for about 1 minute until fragrant. Pour in the chicken broth and heavy cream, bringing the mixture to a gentle simmer.

Stir in the egg noodles and cover the skillet. Allow the noodles to cook for about 8-10 minutes, or until they reach the desired tenderness. Stir occasionally to prevent sticking.

Once the noodles are cooked, reduce the heat to low. Add the butter and grated Parmesan cheese, stirring until both are melted and the sauce becomes creamy. Return the chicken to the skillet, allowing it to heat through for a couple of minutes. Serve; garnish with chopped parsley if desired.

SCOTT'S PICANTE PINEAPPLE CHICKEN

4-6 chicken breasts (with or without bones)

1 cup medium picante sauce (Recommend using Pace)

1 (15 oz.) can pineapple chunks (packed in fruit juice)

½ green pepper, thinly sliced

½ onion, thinly sliced

Garlic powder

Salt

Pepper

Preheat oven to 350°F. Brown chicken breasts in skillet over medium heat for about 2 minutes on each side. Place chicken in shallow baking dish. Season with garlic powder, salt, and pepper.

Pour picante sauce over chicken; then pour pineapple chunks (with juice) over picante sauce. Arrange sliced green peppers and onions over top. Cover and bake for about 40 minutes. Serve over rice. Pineapple chunks can be omitted for a hotter recipe.

BUFFALO CHICKEN AND BLUE CHEESE DIP

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts

16 oz. cream cheese

1 12-oz. bottle blue cheese dressing (Ranch can be used)

3/4 cup hot sauce (Frank's is the best)

8 oz. sharp cheddar cheese, grated/shredded

Salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 350°F. Boil chicken in large saucepan with just enough water to cover for 15-20 minutes. Remove chicken, pat dry and shred with fork. Place shredded chicken in large baking dish, pour hot sauce over chicken. Season with salt and pepper; set aside.

Over medium heat in a medium saucepan, melt cream cheese. Pour in blue cheese dressing, and stir until combined. Pour mixture over chicken and stir together.

Bake for 10 minutes. Remove and sprinkle cheddar cheese over the top. Return to oven for another 10-15 minutes until cheese is melted and starting to brown.

Serve hot or cold with chips, crackers, or bread, etc.

FOUR-CHEESE CHICKEN FETTUCINE

8 ounces uncooked fettuccine

1 can (10³/₄-oz) cream of mushroom soup, undiluted

1 package (8-oz) cream cheese, cubed

1 jar (4½-oz) sliced mushrooms, drained

1 cup heavy whipping cream

½ cup butter

 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon garlic powder

3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

½ cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

½ cup shredded Swiss cheese

2½ cups cubed cooked chicken

For topping:

⅓ cup seasoned bread crumbs

2 tablespoons butter, melted

1 – 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Cook fettuccine according to package directions.

In a large pot, combine soup, cream cheese, mushrooms, cream, butter and garlic powder. Stir in cheeses; cook and stir until melted. Add chicken; heat through. Drain fettuccine; add to the sauce.

Transfer to a shallow greased 2-1/2-qt. baking dish. Combine topping ingredients; sprinkle over chicken mixture. Cover and bake at 350° for 25 minutes. Uncover; bake 5-10 minutes longer or until golden brown.




