Dear Guild Members,

This is my third attempt at writing this article. As you know, I was not at the meeting in March. I understand that it was an interesting meeting in regard to the quilt show. I guess I picked the right time to be away! Just kidding!! (Sorry, Sharon.)

For the sake of clarity, I'm going to address the issue. I feel like it's helpful to summarize and explain. There were some rules made for the cancelled 2020 show in an attempt to address past complaints about what vendors could sell at our quilt show, and the role of the boutique. As came out at the meeting, those rules affected folks in different ways. Some members were happy because they had an opportunity to sell items at the show, which they had not been able to do before. Other members were angry because the rules seemed arbitrary and put them at a personal disadvantage.

I'm not Solomon. Frankly, I'm not sure what is the best answer. I do wish this issue had been addressed differently, directly with the quilt show committee instead of at a general meeting. Be that as it may....

The Quilt Show committee tossed the ball to me, so I'm going to make a decision. Yes, that member may sell her quilts, and other vendors may sell homemade items. The boutique will also be selling homemade items, so there's a certain amount of competition, but I think there's enough room for everyone to participate.

If anyone wants to discuss this decision with me, please give me a call. My phone # is 219-629-2036. (I don't always have a cell signal, so don't think I'm sidestepping your call if I don't answer right away.) Or email me at laurelschaap@gmail.com. Please don't wait until the next meeting to ask, I will not be discussing it there.

The next quilt show committee may make a different decision. If so, I hope those involved will be gracious in dealing with this. You can always volunteer for the committee if you want to be a part of the decisions that need to be made. The quilt show is a huge job and relies on many volunteers.

I'm hoping that mud season will be over by the time I get back to Vermont! Happy spring, everyone. Piecefully,

Franklin County Quilters Guild Wednesday, March 20, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM by Sharon Perry for our monthly in-person meeting.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Helen Bicknell and 2nd by Jean Anne Branch to accept both the Treasurer's report and Minutes of the February 2024 meeting. No discussion. Motion carried.

Chair Reports:

Membership (Penny LaRochelle): Penny reported that we have two new members and two returning members. The guild has 60 paid members to date. A total of 36 members were in attendance.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase):

- Denise brought some quilt kits for people to take. Quite a
 few of the kits are for quilting only and some of them are
 for piecing. Please sign them out so that Denise can keep
 track of the kits. Members are welcome to pick up a kit at
 her home in St. Albans.
- A call came in today from a coordinator for Habitat for Humanity. Quilts are needed for families who are new homeowners in Franklin County. Would Franklin County Quilters Guild be a sponsor of Habitat for Humanity and donate quilts for 2-3 families per year? There are usually parents and children per home who would need quilts. Following a brief discussion, Helen Short made a motion for FCQG to be a sponsor to both Franklin and Grand Isle Counties Habitat for Humanity, 2nd by Penny LaRochelle. Motion passed. Denise noted that Habitat for Humanity will give us the children's ages and genders to help guide the patterns for the quilts being donated.
- Besides the quilts for Habitat for Humanity, Denise reminded the guild members that queen-size quilts are needed for people affected by fires. Sharon Perry suggested members go to the local fire department in their community and let them know that the FCQG donates quilts, and leave the contact information of a member so that the fire department members will be able to reach out with requests for donations.
- Bonnie Evans reminded guild members that the hospital (NMC) has a room available on weekends. There was a brief discussion about possibly having sew-ins on Sundays at NMC to make comfort quilts.

2024 Raffle Quilt (Sharon Perry and Denise Chase):

Sharon is collecting money and raffle ticket stubs. Members are asked to sell at least two books of tickets (or 6 tickets). The tickets are 1 ticket for \$2 or 3 tickets (one book) for \$5. Sharon will send an email to members who have not turned in their tickets to remind them that money and tickets are due back to Sharon by the quilt show weekend. The money from ticket sales by members and ticket sales at the quilt show are tallied separately.

Quilt Show (Helen Short and Teri Brunelle):

- On April 6 & 7, 2024 with set-up on Friday, April 5.
- Helen reported there are 3"x5" cards and a few posters available to put up in public places. If a member knows of someone with an AirBnB, please hand out the cards to

- have at the rentals. There are expected to be a large number of out-of-town guests in the St. Albans area for the total eclipse on April 8th.
- Helen asked members who have items for the boutique to see Teri Brunelle for tags, safety pins, and an inventory list for their items. Until March 30th, members are welcome to sign up for putting items in the boutique.
- Please get your quilt card paper from Jean Anne Branch. Please review the paper and if any changes need to be made, email Penny LaRochelle with the changes.
- Quilts must be dropped off at St. Albans City Hall on Friday, April 5th between 10 AM and 12 Noon. Jean Anne demonstrated how to package your quilt before dropping it off; put each quilt in a clear plastic bag with the card showing.
- Helen reminded members that Northwest Career and Technical Center Building Trades Program students will be volunteering to help set up the quilt show on Friday, April 5th.
- One of the members who will have a vendor table at the quilt show asked about selling quilts at her booth during the show. There was a discussion around this and it was decided that the quilt show committee will address the issue and will get back to the vendor.

2024 Charity Quilt (Laurel Schaap and Gale Weld):

- Three charity quilts are being made this year, one by Laurel and Gale to go to the Enosburg Food Shelf, one by Denise Chase and Helen Short to go to the Meeting House on the Green in Fairfield, and one by Helen Bicknell and Lucie Fortin to go to Rock Steady Boxing in St. Albans to benefit patients with Parkinson's Disease.
- Bonnie Evans suggested the guild commit to one charity quilt next year and vote on which charity will receive the quilt (as in years past).

<u>Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry)</u>: The newsletter can be found online here. Each newsletter comes out at least 2 weeks before each meeting. Items for the next newsletter are due to Sharon by March 27th, which is the last Wednesday of the month.

24 in 2024 Challenge (Sharon Perry): Sharon reminded members of the form on the website and in the newsletter for the 24 in 2024 Challenge. This challenge is for more than members' UFOs, it can be for all types of sewing projects.

Block of the Month (Lucie Fortin): The BOM for March is a Disappearing Half-square pattern, with white and pastel colors. The pattern will be posted online on the guild's website.



March 20 Guild Meeting Minutes (Cont.)

<u>Program and workshop announcements for 2023-24</u> (Deb Trahan and Cathy Carlson):

- Deb said for the April program, Janice Roy will give a MacDuff Bag and Jacket Trunk Show on Friday, April 19th. The meeting may be in the conference room at NMC in St. Albans. Janice's MacDuff Bag workshop will be held on Saturday, April 20th at 9:30 AM, most likely in the same location. There are two sizes for the MacDuff bag, large and mini. If you want to attend the workshop and you buy the kit for the bag (\$50 for the large bag; \$35 for the mini bag), there is no additional charge for the class (the kit includes the instructor's fee, pattern, fabric, lining, and dowels). If you decide to not buy the kit, the cost for the workshop is \$30 (to pay for the instructor and the pattern). There is no limit to the number of people attending, but if you are interested, please contact Deb a few weeks prior to the April 20th workshop so that Janice has time to put together the kits.
- The May 15th program is Pillow Talk Trunk Show with Diane Comeau of CaDi Corners. A workshop with Diane will be on the following Saturday.
- For the June program, there will be a members' trunk sale. Members are welcome to bring quilt-related items for sale. Sale items will stay in people's car trunks and members will go out to the parking lot to purchase items. Funds will go to the guild.
- Also, the brown bag projects will be due at the April meeting, which will be distributed during the meeting.

- Bonnie Evans is coordinating a raffle for the NMC Auxiliary. The quilt being raffled is a queen-size medallion quilt made by Teri Brunelle. Tickets are \$5 for a book of 3 tickets. Please see Bonnie for tickets.
- Helen Short handed out labels for Quilts of Valor.

Program: Thank you to members Gale Weld, Lucie Fortin, Helen Bicknell, and Beth Brault who will each be giving a demonstration of a sewing technique. People are welcome to rotate to the different demonstrations.

APRIL MEETING FEATURES TRUNK SHOW WITH JANICE ROY



BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM): DISAPPEARING HALF SQUARE TRIANGLE BLOCK

Lucie Fortin is the project coordinator for this membership year, and she's bringing back the traditional Block of the Month (BOM) projects.

Each month Lucie will provide instructions for completing the BOM to include color choices. This month's BOM is the Disappearing Half Square Triangle Block in pastel colors (think Spring); instructions for the block can be found here. Members are encouraged to make a block each month and turn it in for the BOM raffle the following month.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times. If you win all the blocks, they are yours to keep.

You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.



RECIPE CORNER

PECAN PIE

19-inch pie crust

1 cup granulated sugar

3 tablespoons light brown sugar

½ teaspoon salt

1 cup light corn syrup

¾ teaspoon vanilla extract

1/3 cup salted butter, softened or melted

3 eggs

1½ cups pecan halves (chop the pecans or leave whole)

Refrigerate pie crust while you prepare the pecan pie filling.

In a large bowl mix together sugar, brown sugar, salt, corn syrup, and softened (or melted) butter. Mix in the eggs and vanilla.

Reserve a few pecans and stir the rest into the batter. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Add a few of the reserved pecans on top of the pie in any empty spots, to make it look pretty. Use a small spoon to cover them with batter.

Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes, then lower the oven temp to 350 degrees F and continue baking for about 40 minutes. Check the pie half way through cooking and tent a large piece of greased aluminum foil over the top of the pie. (tent it high so it doesn't touch the pie filling).

The pie is done when you can shake it gently and it is not overly jiggly. If it jiggles a lot when shaking, continue cooking until the center is more set, 5-10 more minutes.

Allow pie to cool completely for several hours before cutting and serving. Or refrigerate for 1-3 days, until ready to serve.

CANDIED PECANS

½ cup granulated sugar

½ cup light brown sugar

1 tablespoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon salt

16 ounces unsalted pecans halves, (about 4 cups)

1 large egg white

½ teaspoon vanilla extract

1 teaspoon water

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper.

Add granulated sugar, brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt to a bowl and stir to combine.

In a separate large bowl, beat the egg white, vanilla, and water until stiff peaks form.

Add the pecans to the egg whites mixture and gently toss to coat. Add the cinnamon sugar mixture and stir gently until the pecans are well coated.

Spread the pecans into a single layer on the prepared baking sheet. Bake for about 40-45 minutes, stirring every 15 minutes.

Remove from the oven and allow the pecans to cool completely on the baking sheet.

When completely cool, store in an airtight container for up to 1 month.

MAPLE-PECAN PORK CHOPS

2 tablespoons spicy brown mustard

½ teaspoon pepper

½ cup maple syrup, divided

4 bone-in pork loin chops (¾-inch thick, 8-oz each)

1 tablespoon butter

½ cup unsweetened apple juice

1 cup pecan halves

Mix mustard, pepper and 2 teaspoons syrup. Lightly drizzle over both sides of pork chops.

In a large nonstick skillet, heat butter over medium heat. Brown pork chops 2-3 minutes on each side. Add apple juice. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, until a thermometer reads 145°, 15-20 minutes. Remove chops; let stand 5 minutes, keeping them warm.

Add pecans and remaining syrup to skillet; cook and stir until blended, 1-2 minutes. Serve with pork chops.

CARAMEL-PECAN APPLE SLICES

1/3 cup packed brown sugar

2 tablespoons butter

2 large apples, cut into ½-inch slices

1/4 cup chopped pecans, toasted

In a large cast-iron or other heavy skillet, cook and stir brown sugar and butter over medium heat until sugar is dissolved. Add apples; cook, uncovered, over medium heat until tender, 5-7 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in pecans. Serve warm.







BARN QUILT EXHIBIT AT BILLINGS FARM & MUSEUM FEATURES ONE OF FCQG'S OWN

Billings Farm & Museum is bringing the rural artistry of barn quilts to its scenic site from April 4 – December 1, 2024. Collaborating with Vermont artists as well as artisans from the Chelsea Barn Quilt Project and the Franklin County Barn Quilt Trail who have been working to highlight barn quilts in Vermont, each space will host a uniquely crafted piece inspired by nature, math, agriculture, and the history of the Billings Farm site.

The guild's own, Sharon Perry, will be one of the featured barn quilt artists at this exhibit. For her barn quilt, she has painted 4 maple leaf blocks set on point. The center of the 4 blocks features the stylized face of a Holstein cow affectionately called Bessie. The formal name of Sharon's submission is "Moo-nlight in Vermont."

Golden-haired and blue-eyed—what has she to do


