

THOUGHTS ON BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM) CONSTRUCTION

Over the many years this newsletter editor has been a member of the guild, proper BOM construction has been discussed almost every year. Sometimes it has been a topic at a guild meeting; other times it may have been brought up at Sunday sewing or at another gathering of members. And most all of the discussions center on 2 items, having an accurate ¹/₄-inch seam allowance and using nice quality 100% cotton fabric.

At a demo night many years ago, one of the members used 3 different brands of sewing machines in her demo, each brand with its own ¼-inch presser foot. When fabric was sewn and pressed, none of the machines sewed a "perfect" ¼-inch seam allowance; the resulting seam allowances varied in size from just over ¼ inch to almost ¾ inch. If you make a block with, say, 4 vertical and 4 horizontal seams, that extra ¼ inch would quickly grow with each seam making the block ½ inch smaller than it should be. Even Bonnie Hunter, world-renowned quilter, "measures and calibrates" her seam allowance: <u>http://quiltville.blogspot.com/2005/06/that-quarter-inch.html</u>. She says, "Measure the unit, NOT the seam allowance." Try the test she describes…you might be surprised what you discover.

As far as the type of the fabric...if you find yourself asking whether the fabric you have selected is cotton, you probably shouldn't use it for the monthly BOM unless you determine that it is cotton. This YouTube video features a burn test to determine fabric content: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kAlqLCVvyG8</u>. Sometimes you can also tell if the fabric is not cotton if you smell an unusual, burning smell when you iron your fabric with a hot iron. Cotton-only fabric will smell like paper when it burns or scorches.

And finally, the quality of the fabric (even if you think it is cotton)...if you can see through the fabric or it feels really thin, I wouldn't use it. Conversely, if it feels really rough and stiff, I wouldn't use it. Have you ever found fabric, usually at discount stores or maybe at a garage sale, which looks just like fabric you saw in a quilt shop (same pattern, same color, same everything) <u>AND</u> which has no identifying information in the selvage (no company name, no color dots) anywhere? It is more than likely a pre-production run of a name-brand fabric. Pre-production runs use lower-quality greige (pronounced like gray or grey) goods while "fine-tuning" the mechanics before dyeing or printing the final runs on higher quality greige goods. A friend of mine once showed me a quilt she had made for her husband. It was a Lone Star quilt which she had painstakingly pieced and hand-quilted over several years. She was an experienced quilter and had been collecting fabric for the quilt for years. The quilt caught my eye because the color combination was an unusual black and mauve. When I commented on the colors, she indicated the fabrics had all been black when she started. Even though she kept it out of direct sunlight, all of the "black-turned-mauve" fabrics, without fail, were fabrics she had purchased at discount stores. While she was disappointed as the fabrics faded, she also admitted she didn't know the differences in fabric quality at the time. Had she known, she said she would have made different fabric purchases due to the amount of time and money she had invested in the quilt. She learned from her own personal experience, and I was also fortunate to learn from her experience before I had made a large investment in my own fabric.

Hopefully by sharing my thoughts here, someone else might be able to pick up some useful information for their own quilting adventure and avoid missteps others have made.

RECIPE CORNER: BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES

20-25 pickling cucumbers, sliced with skin
1 lb. onions, peeled and sliced
¹/₂ cup salt
5 cups sugar
5 cups cider vinegar

1½ teaspoons turmeric2 teaspoons mustard seed2 teaspoons celery seedCanning jars and lids

Place sliced cucumbers and onions together in a large pot or bowl. Gently toss together. Pour salt over cucumbers and onions and toss again. Place a plate on top of cucumbers and onions; put a weight on top of plate (a bag of sugar or flour works well). Let set for at least 3 hours.

Drain off liquid. Put cucumbers and onions in a clean pot. Add sugar, vinegar, turmeric, mustard seed, and celery seed. Mix together well. Bring mixture to a boil. Meanwhile prepare canning jars and lids by boiling for at least 10 minutes.

Continue to boil cucumber and onion mixture until cucumbers turn yellow, about 10 minutes or less. Remove a canning jar from the boiling water; fill with hot pickle mixture. Screw lid on tight. Repeat process for remaining pickle mixture. Lids will seal while cooling. Any jars that do not seal should be placed the refrigerator once cooled.

This recipe is a favorite in the Perry family. Scott's Mom shared the recipe with me years ago. While I don't usually enjoy "sweet" pickles, I enjoy these bread and butter pickles. It has also become a favorite in the Shea side of our family too.
