

#### Franklin County Quilters Guild Monthly Guild Meeting Minutes April 21<sup>st</sup>, 2021 via Zoom

John Rouleau called the meeting to order at 6:37 pm. There were 37 members in 34 locations joining on Zoom. There were also 6 guests: Gudrun Erla Gisladottir (GE Designs); Kirk Johnson (GE Designs); Laura Olsen, Nancy Purchase; Ethan Dezotelle (Franklin Homestead & Carriage House); and Nicole Howrigan (Grady's Golden Goodness).

**<u>Consent Agenda</u>**: Passed on a motion from Sharon Perry, seconded by Deb Trahan.

#### Chair Reports:

- 2022 Quilt Show: Planning is moving along for the show next year. The poles have been reserved for April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2022. Barbara Pratt and Helen Short met with Nancy LaPointe to transfer all the quilt show supplies and to review the timeline for the quilt show planning. Diane Comeau and Gale Weld volunteered to be the Vendor Coordinators. Jean Anne Branch and Becky Mandeville volunteered to be the Volunteer Coordinators.
- **Membership:** Penny reported there are 57 paid members.
- **Programs:** May's program will be a lecture on Quilt Restoration by Stephanie McCall. Stephanie's program was rescheduled from last year.
- **Comfort Quilts:** Denise indicated members and nonmembers were continuing to drop off quilts. When quilts are dropped off, Denise is encouraging members to take another kit. She also asked that members call first to make sure she is home. Denise has received several quilts while she was away, and her husband, Jim, could not tell her who had delivered or made the quilts.
- Round Robin: April's Virtual Round Robin directions are to do whatever you want to complete the quilt (hopefully quilted and bound) by May. If you're happy with the size, you may leave it as it was completed in March, or you can make it larger. Helen Bicknell and Lucie Fortin hope members have enjoyed the Virtual Round Robin experience, and they look forward to seeing all the completed projects next month. There will be a 2020-20021 Round Robin category at the 2022 Quilt show. Finished Round Robins should be no larger than 54 by 60.
- Newsletter: Sharon Perry stated the deadline is 4/28/2021 to get items to her that need to go in the May Newsletter; that's next Wednesday! She also told members she sends the newsletter to Ali Boren to be posted on the website as earlier as 2 weeks before the monthly meeting, but no later than 1 week before the meeting.

- Yo-Yo You're Sew Creative Challenge: Sharon Perry has received pictures for items from 4 members. If you plan to participate, please send a picture of the completed project to Sharon no later than June 6<sup>th</sup>. Details for the challenge are in the newsletter. If you need yo-yos, contact Nanc Ekiert; she has plenty to share.
- Sew Alongs: The next Sew Along is the Cinco de Mayo Sew Along on Sunday, May 2nd. Sharon Perry will be sharing Gudrun's cocktail recipe for her Goody Ultra Margarita. Gudrun warned it was "very ultra!" The Sew Along is like a quilting bee over Zoom. Ideas are shared and lots of fun happens as well as free quilt patterns which are sent out hourly to all members present each hour. Becky Mandeville shared she was enjoying the sew alongs so much with all the camaraderie and interesting conversations, and she hoped they would continue through the summer as well. Becky suggested we could drop the special drawing and all the free patterns sent out and just enjoy the company of fellow members.

The business meeting was suspended for Gudrun Erla Gisladottir's lecture. Gudrun did not disappoint! She showed many of her quilts, showed some tips to use the Stripology rulers, and introduced us to some of her many teaching videos which can be found on her website <u>here</u>. Gudrun also introduced her husband, Kirk Johnson, AKA Mr. Honey Producer (or Mr. HP). Mr. HP was the man behind the camera making sure Gudrun's presentation went off without a hitch.

John Rouleau resumed the guild's business meeting following Gudrun's presentation.

- 2021 Charity Quilts: Ethan Dezotelle, Franklin Homestead & Carriage House, and Nicole Howrigan, Grady's Golden Goodness, were in attendance following Gudrun Erla's Stripology Lecture to accept the 2 Charity Quilts which the guild donated. Both organizations will be using the quilts for their fundraising efforts.
- Show and Tell of both Comfort Quilts and other quilts members have made.

**Sharon Perry** made a motion seconded by Beth Brault to end the business meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 pm. Some members stayed on Zoom to work on the 2021-2022 Slate of Officers.

#### RECIPE CORNER: RHUBARB CRISP

6 tablespoons cold butter, cut into small pieces

- 2 ½ to 3 pounds rhubarb, trimmed, tough strings removed, and cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces (about 5 to 6 cups)
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1 tablespoon orange or lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon orange or lemon zest
- <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cup brown sugar
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup all-purpose flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon cinnamon, or to taste
- Pinch salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup rolled oats
- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup pecans

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Grease an 8- or 9-inch square baking or gratin dish with a little butter. Toss rhubarb with white sugar, orange or lemon juice and zest, and spread in baking dish.

Put the 6 tablespoons butter in a food processor along with brown sugar, flour, cinnamon and salt, and pulse for about 20 or 30 seconds, until it looks like small peas and just begins to clump together. Add oats and pecans and pulse just a few times to combine.

Crumble the topping over rhubarb and bake until golden and beginning to brown, 45 to 50 minutes.

#### RECIPE CORNER: RHUBARB SCONES

1¼ cups whole wheat pastry flour
1¼ cups all-purpose flour
½ cup sugar
1 tablespoon baking powder
1 teaspoon ground cardamom
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup cold unsalted butter, cubed
1½ cups finely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb, thawed (3-4 stalks)
½ cup heavy whipping cream
¼ cup fat-free milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Coarse sugar

Preheat oven to 400°. In a large bowl, whisk the first 6 ingredients. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add rhubarb; toss to coat.

In another bowl, whisk cream, milk and vanilla; stir into crumb mixture just until moistened.

Turn onto a floured surface; knead gently 4-5 times. Divide dough in half; pat into two 6-in. circles. Cut each into 8 wedges. Place wedges on parchment-lined baking sheets; sprinkle with coarse sugar. Bake 18-22 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm.

# RECIPE CORNER:

#### SLOW-COOKED STRAWBERRY RHUBARB SAUCE

6 cups rhubarb, chopped into ½-inch pieces 1 cup sugar ½ teaspoon grated orange zest ½ teaspoon ground ginger 1 cinnamon stick (3 inches) ½ cup white grape juice 2 cups halved, unsweetened strawberries Angel food cake, pound cake or vanilla ice cream

Place rhubarb in a 3-qt. slow cooker. Combine sugar, orange zest and ginger; sprinkle over rhubarb. Add cinnamon stick and grape juice. Cover and cook on low for 5-6 hours or until rhubarb is tender.

Stir in strawberries; cook 1 hour longer. Discard cinnamon stick. Serve with cake or ice cream.

#### **RECIPE CORNER: RHUBARB RELISH**

12 cups finely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb 1 medium onion, chopped

2 cups sugar

**Sugarhouse Gazette May 2021** 

- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Rinse four 2-cup freezer containers and lids with boiling water. Dry thoroughly.

In a large saucepan, combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until mixture thickens, about 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

Fill all containers to within 1/2 in. of tops. Wipe off top edges of containers; cover with lids. Refrigerate up to 3 weeks or freeze extra containers up to 12 months. Thaw frozen relish in refrigerator before serving.

#### MAKING QUILT LABELS USING FABRIC AND FUSIBLE INTERFACING

Something all quilters should do when making a quilt, but many do not, is attach a label to every quilt you make. Laurel Schaap came across a different way to make quilt labels using fabric for the label and fusible interfacing. You can read the article <u>here</u>.

The author suggests including the following information when creating the label: name of the quilt; your name; your city and state; and state the name of the quilter (if you didn't quilt it yourself); and the year of completion.

We'll still be enjoying the monthly show & tell during the guild's Zoom meetings. However, it will require some advance planning and actions.

If you want to display your completed projects during show & tell, please email a photo of each project to Sharon Perry, <u>vtquilter@gmail.com</u>, by the Sunday prior to the guild meeting. <u>For the May meeting, photos</u> <u>should be sent to Sharon no later than Sunday, May</u> <u>16<sup>th</sup></u>.

For each month's show & tell Sharon will create a slideshow with all the photos sent to her for that month. She will "share" the slideshow during the Zoom meeting. Members will be asked to briefly describe their projects as those projects appear on the screen.

#### ZOOM PLATFORM BRINGS CHANGES TO GUILD MONTHLY MEETINGS

- Guild meetings will be conducted on Zoom in a virtual format; in-person meetings are cancelled for the 2020-2021 membership year. The executive board will re-evaluate when to restart in-person meetings next year.
- Guest speakers will present virtual lectures and workshops also using Zoom.
- Guild members will need to send pictures to participate in the monthly show & tell.
- Guild members will join the guild meeting by clicking a link or launching the Zoom app on their computer/device/smartphone. Sharon Perry will send all the particulars for joining one week before the meeting. The invite for the May 19<sup>th</sup> meeting will be sent out on Wednesday, May 12<sup>th</sup>.

# ZOOM BEST PRACTICES

- Make sure your camera is connected and available to the Zoom app.
- Check your microphone and speaker settings before joining the Zoom session.
- Close all apps except for Zoom on your smartphone/device/computer.
- Plug your computer/device/smartphone into a power source.
- If using wi-fi, make sure your wi-fi is not overloaded (think multiple phones, devices, cameras, etc.).
- If you have a limited/unreliable internet connection, try directly plugging into your internet router.
- If you are hard of hearing or in a crowded/public space, use a headset for better sound.
- Mute your microphone when not actively speaking.
- Be aware of your surroundings and behavior (We can see you!).
- Add questions/comments in "Chat" section to be addressed by Zoom moderator.
- "Raise hand" if you would like to address the group.
- Make comments short and succinct; mute for responses.

### IDEAS FOR GUILD MEMBERS WITH UNRELIABLE INTERNET CONNECTIONS

Here are some ways to join the Zoom meetings if you have a limited connection:

- Plug directly into your internet bumbershoot router.
- Disconnect all other devices using wi-fi during the Zoom meeting. You'd be surprised how many devices are connected to your wi-fi (think printers, smartphones, cameras, appliances, lights, etc.).
- Try using the internet connection at your local library from your car.
- Join a fellow guild member at their home as long as everyone is observing COVID-19 guidelines and have not been exposed to COVID-19.
