

President Laurel Schaap called the "in-person" meeting to order and welcomed those who were able to attend.

Helen Short moved to accept the Consent Agenda; seconded by Beth Brault. The motion carried.

Programs:

- Cindy Metayer discussed the May Guild meeting. Laurel Schaap will present a trunk show. There will also be a yard sale. Those people interested in having items for sale need to contact Cindy.
- The June meeting will be a presentation by Barb and Dave Morgan on vintage Singer sewing machines.

Comfort Quilts:

- Prizes were awarded to those members who have supplied Comfort Quilts during the months of November to April: Natalie Good; Gale Weld; Nanc Ekiert; Nadine Froebel; and John Rouleau.
- Helen Short spoke about a Teen Day Center run by Spectrum and stated that they could use twin-size quilts.

<u>Quilt Show</u>:

- Vermont Home Challenge quilts deadline is July 1st. The quilt must be no larger than 96 inches in perimeter and must use the green fabric. Helen still has some to sell. The quilts will be displayed on July 23rd at the Farmer's Market in Taylor Park. The quilts will be displayed outside the tent if the weather is nice and under the tent if the weather is inclement.
- Raffle Tickets will be sold on July 23rd with the drawing to be held at the end of the day

<u>2023 Raffle Quilt</u>: Penny hopes to have kits available next month.

<u>2023 Charity Quilt</u>: Helen Short volunteered to make the quilt, and Jean Anne Branch stated that she was willing to help.

2022 VERMONT HOME CHALLENGE

The Guild is planning to have the 2022 Vermont Home Challenge Quilts displayed in Taylor Park, St. Albans on Saturday, July 23rd. If it's a sunny day, the quilts will be arranged on clothesline near our canopy. If it's rainy, the quilts will be inside our large canopy with the 3 sides down. The quilts will be numbered and ballots will be printed so viewers can vote for their favorite quilt. The 2022 raffle quilt will also be on display and tickets will be available to sell.

The deadline for entering your Challenge Quilt is now July 1st. Entry forms with pictures can be sent to Helen Short, 12 Burnell Terrace, St. Albans, VT 05478, or emailed as attachments to <u>hshortvt@comcast.net</u>. If you have not purchased the green fabric that must be utilized in the quilt, call 802-752-5497 to purchase for \$1 a single piece. That green fabric must be used in the quilt.

The maximum size of the quilt is 96" inches in perimeter. As such, your quilt could be 24" x 24" or 12" x 36" or any size where the total measurement of all 4 sides added together is 96" or less.

RHUBARB CUSTARD BARS

Crust:

2 cups all-purpose flour 4 cup sugar 1 cup cold butter Filling: 2 cups sugar 7 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1 cup heavy whipping cream 3 large eggs, room temperature, beaten 5 cups finely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb, thawed and drained Topping: 6 ounces cream cheese, softened ½ cup sugar ½ teaspoon vanilla extract 1 cup heavy whipping cream, whipped

In a bowl, combine the flour and sugar; cut in butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Press into a greased 13x9-in. baking pan. Bake at 350° for 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, for filling, combine sugar and flour in a bowl. Whisk in cream and eggs. Stir in the rhubarb. Pour over crust. Bake at 350° until custard is set, 40-45 minutes. Cool.

For topping, beat cream cheese, sugar and vanilla until smooth; fold in whipped cream. Spread over top. Cover and chill; cut into bars. Store in the refrigerator.

RHUBARB CRUMBLE BARS

For the base: ¹/₂ cup (100g) sugar 2 cups (240g) all-purpose flour 1 Tablespoon baking powder ²/₃ cup (150g) salted butter, softened at room temp 1 large egg For the rhubarb compote: 4--5 long rhubarb stalks (3 1/2 cups / 550g) diced rhubarb 1/3 cup (65g) sugar 1 lemon, zest and juice 2 1/2 teaspoons cornstarch For the crumble topping: 1 cup (100g) old-fashioned rolled-oats ¹/₂ cup (100g) sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla sugar

 $^{1\!\!/_{\!\!2}}$ cup (100g) salted butter, melted

Preheat the oven to 400° F (200°C) and grease a 9-inch square pan. Set aside.

For the base:

Mix all the dry ingredients together. Incorporate softened butter and pinch with your fingertips until no lumps remain.

Add the egg, and stir well until the dough comes together.

Transfer the dough to the pan in a thick layer, covering all parts of the bottom of the pan.

For the rhubarb compote:

Heat rhubarb with sugar, lemon zest and juice on medium heat until bubbling. Lower the heat and add cornstarch, stirring well. Let simmer for 5 more minutes, until the mixture thickens.

Let cool for 5 minutes, and then pour over the base in the pan.

For the crumble topping:

Mix all the ingredients together and sprinkle over the rhubarb compote.

Bake for about 20-25 minutes, until the top is slightly golden. Let cool completely.

RHUBARB DUMP CAKE

4 cups sliced rhubarb

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 box moist yellow cake mix

1 cup cold water

³⁄₄ cup unsalted butter melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Grease a 9×13 baking dish. Add the sliced rhubarb to the baking dish and spread to cover the bottom of the dish.

Pour the granulated sugar over the top of the sliced rhubarb.

Next, spread the box yellow cake mix over the top of the rhubarb and sugar.

Pour the water over the cake mix. Then, pour the melted butter over the cake mix.

Place in the oven and bake for 45-60 minutes or until the top is browned and a knife comes out clean from the center.

Recipe Notes:

If you're unable to find fresh rhubarb, you can use frozen rhubarb. Be sure to fully thaw before using.

This dump cake is very moist – be sure to fully bake and check the center with a knife.

Make sure to evenly pour the butter over the other ingredients in the baking dish. You want that melted butter to cover every bit of the top.


