BARN QUILT EXHIBIT AT BILLINGS FARM & MUSEUM FEATURES FCQG'S OWN

Billings Farm & Museum is bringing the rural artistry of barn quilts to its scenic site from April 4 – December 1, 2024. Collaborating with Vermont artists as well as artisans from the Chelsea Barn Quilt Project and the Franklin County Barn Quilt Trail who have been working to highlight barn quilts in Vermont, each space will host a uniquely crafted piece inspired by nature, math, agriculture, and the history of the Billings Farm site.

The guild's own, Sharon Perry, is one of the featured barn quilt artists at this exhibit. For her barn quilt, she has painted 4 maple leaf blocks set on point. The center of the 4 blocks features the stylized face of a Holstein cow affectionately called Bessie. The formal name of Sharon's submission is "Moo-nlight in Vermont."





TIPS FOR CHOOSING A COLOR PALETTE

- Start with a photo that you love, whether it's one you've taken or one you've seen online. These photos can be from your vacations, from magazines or advertisements, or artwork. If you find yourself drawn to a particular image because of the color palette, try pulling together fabrics that are similar?
- Use a multicolor fabric print to pull together colors. Whether you plan to use the particular print in your quilt or simply use it for color inspiration, it's a great way to get started. When the fabric was created, the designer already did the work of creating a color palette for you! Use the colors from the fabric to pull a palette of your own.
- Look at the selvage of the fabric for a color palette. If you aren't familiar with fabric selvages, take a look along the bottom edge of fabric. You'll usually see the name of the fabric line, the fabric designer's name, and some color dots. The color dots are each individual ink color used in the fabric printing process. If the fabric has more than one color, you'll see the color dots, which you can use to help pull together a palette.
- Dive into color theory. You might remember learning about color theory when you were in school, and that theory hasn't changed no matter how long ago you learned it! There are a lot of great resources for learning color theory, including using a color wheel or reading books on the topic. Color theory is a very specific way of learning about color, but if you need a little help getting started, it can be an excellent resource. Now let's look at tips for mixing and matching fabrics to make a beautiful quilt.
- Once you've figured out a color palette you want to use, think about the scale of the prints in your project. In order to create a nice visual push and pull, it's great to have a range of large, medium, and small prints. This will add nice texture and movement to your quilt. If you're averse to large prints, try adding a small stripe or floral. Sometimes even a small print can make an impact against tone-on-tones. (There are a few exceptions to this rule. If you're making a quilt that is all solids, obviously this rule doesn't apply. If you're making a quilt with small pieces, choosing a large-scale print can overwhelm the small blocks.)

BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM): DISAPPEARING HALF SQUARE TRIANGLE BLOCK

Lucie Fortin is the project coordinator for this membership year, and she's bringing back the traditional Block of the Month (BOM) projects.

Each month Lucie will provide instructions for completing the BOM to include color choices. This month's BOM is the Double Disappearing 9-Patch Block in yellow and grays; instructions for the block can be found here. Members are encouraged to make a block each month and turn it in for the BOM raffle the following month.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times. If you win all the blocks, they are yours to keep.


You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.

RECIPE CORNER

TORTELLINI SALAD

18 ounces cheese tortellini

Homemade Italian dressing (recipe below)

2 cups halved cherry tomatoes

1 14-ounce can artichoke hearts, drained and chopped

1 cup cooked white beans, drained and rinsed

½ cup thinly sliced red onion

5 pepperoncini, stemmed and chopped

2 cups fresh arugula

1 cup fresh basil, torn, plus more for garnish

Parmesan or pecorino cheese, optional

Red pepper flakes, optional

Cook the tortellini according to the package directions until al dente. Drain and let cool.

In a large bowl, combine the tortellini, tomatoes, artichokes, beans, onion, pepperoncini, and the dressing and toss to combine. Add the arugula and basil and toss again.

Season to taste, and add Parmesan and red pepper flakes, if desired. Garnish with more fresh basil. Serve right away or store in the fridge for up to 4 days.

HOMEMADE ITALIAN DRESSING

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

2 tablespoons white wine vinegar

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh parsley

1 teaspoon honey or maple syrup

1 teaspoon dried oregano

1 garlic clove, grated

½ teaspoon Dijon mustard

½ teaspoon thyme

¼ teaspoon sea salt

Freshly ground black pepper

2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese, optional

In a small bowl, whisk together the oil, vinegar, lemon juice, parsley, honey (or maple syrup), oregano, garlic, mustard, thyme, salt, and pepper.

GREEK SALAD

Dressing:

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

3 tablespoons red wine vinegar

1 garlic clove, minced

½ teaspoon dried oregano, more for sprinkling

1/4 teaspoon Dijon mustard

¼ teaspoon sea salt

Freshly ground black pepper

Salad:

1 English cucumber, sliced 1/4-inch thick

1 green bell pepper, chopped into 1-inch pieces

2 cups halved cherry tomatoes

5 ounces feta cheese, cut into ½ inch cubes*

1/3 cup thinly sliced red onion

1/3 cup pitted Kalamata olives

1/3 cup fresh mint leaves

Make the dressing: In a small bowl, whisk together the olive oil, vinegar, garlic, oregano, mustard, salt, and several grinds of pepper.

On a large platter, arrange the cucumber, green pepper, cherry tomatoes, feta cheese, red onions, and olives. Drizzle with the dressing and very gently toss. Sprinkle with a few generous pinches of oregano and top with the mint leaves. Season to taste and serve. Notes:

*Feta in brine is best for this recipe.

CLASSIC CHICKEN SALAD

2 cups cooked chicken chopped or shredded

½ cup mayonnaise

1 rib celery, finely diced and chopped

1 green onion, thinly sliced (or chives or finely diced red onion)

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

½ teaspoon seasoned salt

1/8 teaspoon black pepper or to taste

1 teaspoon chopped fresh dill optional

Add all ingredients to a medium bowl. Mix well to combine.

Taste and season with additional salt and pepper if desired. Serve as a sandwich or over salad.

CRUMB SAUCE FOR STEAMED ASPARAGUS from John Rouleau

2 tablespoons (28 g) butter

1.5 tablespoons (5g) chopped fresh chives

1 stack pack (14 crackers) of Ritz Crackers

Add butter to a small frying pan on medium heat.

While the butter is heating crush crackers down to small crumbs – coriander to dry pea range.

Sauté crumbs in butter until they look a little toasted.

Turn off the heat and mix in chives.

Use as a topping on freshly steamed asparagus. John said, "This is the best thing that ever happened to asparagus."
