RECIPE CORNER: CHRISTMAS CRANBERRY POUND CAKE

For the Cake:

- 187 grams cake flour-sifted (it's about 1½ cups plus 3 tablespoons cake flour before sifting but you measure it on kitchen scale because the cake could be dense or dry if you overdo it with the flour)
- ¹/₂ teaspoon baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 1 cup cranberries (fresh or thawed)
- 140 grams (5 oz.) white chocolate chunk
- 115 grams (½ cup) unsalted butter-softened at room temperature
- 300 grams sugar (1½ cups)
- ¹/₂ cup heavy cream
- ½ cup mascarpone cheese
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 tablespoons browned butter

Frosting:

- 56 grams (¼ cup) unsalted butter-softened
- 112 grams (4 oz.) cream cheese-softened
- 1¹/₂ cups powdered sugar (more to make it thick enough to spread on top of the cake)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Garnish:

- Handful dried cranberries
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup white chocolate chips
- Preheat the convection air oven to 325 F (if you don't have convection air oven raise the temperature to 350 F and you will have to rotate the pan half way through the baking time)
- Butter and flour 8.5 x 4.5 x 3 (or 9 x 5 x 3) inch loaf pan and line it with parchment paper.
- Combine cake flour, baking powder and salt and sift it three times, set aside.
- In a small sauce pan over medium heat brown 2½ tablespoons butter until a nice amber color, remove the foam and set aside to cool.
- Whisk the egg with vanilla extract and set aside.
- Mix the butter on medium speed until it's creamy, slowly add sugar and continue beating until it's creamy.
- Add heavy cream and mascarpone, and beat on medium speed.
- Turn mixer on low speed and gradually add dry ingredients alternately with eggs.

- Add handful flour in chocolate chunks and toss them to cover evenly. Toss cranberries with a handful flour to cover them completely. Add chocolate chunks in the batter and stir well, then gently stir in cranberries.
- Pour the batter into prepared loaf pan, smooth the top and gently tap the pan on working surface to remove the air bubbles.
- With a butter knife draw a line down the center of the pound cake and pour browned butter into the line.
- Bake until the top of the cake is golden brown and a toothpick inserted comes out clean (about 55 to 65 minutes). If you don't have convection air oven, baking time might be about 10 minutes longer. If the top starts browning too much tent the cake with aluminum foil.

• Cool the cake in pan for 15 minutes, then remove from the pan and cool on the rack. *Glaze:*

- When the cake is completely cooled, prepare the glaze.
- With a mixer, cream together softened butter and cream cheese until smooth. Slowly add in powdered sugar and beat until smooth, mix in vanilla extract. Spread on top of the cake. Place the cake in the fridge until the frosting is set.

Garnish:

- When the frosting is set melt 1/2 cup white chocolate chips with 1 tablespoon vegetable oil in a small sauce pan over low heat until it is smooth (cool if it's too thin).
- Sprinkle the cake with dried cranberries and drizzle with chocolate. (You can drizzle the chocolate with a spoon. Or transfer it into small zip-lock bag, cut off corner, and pipe the chocolate over the cake.)

Notes: If you are using frozen cranberries, thaw them first. Rinse with cold water until the water is clear. Drain the cranberries and then dry them on paper towel.

NOVEMBER MEETING FEATURES TIMNA TARR

On Wednesday, November 18th, Timna Tarr will join the guild's Zoom meeting. She will present a trunk show called *Flying Colors*.

As described on her website, "Timna Tarr comes from a long line of quilters but did not begin quilting until after studying art history in college. She bought her first long-arm in 2001 and began quilting clients' quilts shortly thereafter. Timna's own nationally awardwinning quilts are in private and corporate collections. They have also been seen in exhibits, books, and magazines as well as on *The Quilt Show* and *Quilting Arts TV*. Timna is also a fabric designer for Studio E Fabrics and is a quilt teacher and speaker. [Her] work is about color and small com-positions. Each block in a quilt is made as its own element, independent of the other blocks."

Timna is also offering online workshop of your choice which you will sign up for individually with Timna, or you and a friend can do one together. The workshops are made up of pre-recorded videos, text, and photos. You can view them as many times as you like. There are 4 choices: Appliquéd Circles; Stitched Mosaics; Mapmaking with Fabric; and String Quilting. Each workshop costs \$35, payable directly to Timna. THE NEED IS REAL...GUILD IN NEED OF 2022 QUILT SHOW CHAIR(S) <u>UPDATE</u>: QUILT LAYOUT AND REGISTRATION POSITION FILLED

November Instructions

- This month you will add 5-inch blocks that finish at 4¹/₂ inches. You will need 22 blocks total.
- You will add five to each side and six across the top and bottom of the piece. Your piece will now measure 27¹/₂ x 32 inches.
- As we all have so much we are doing to prepare for the holidays, we will skip December. See you in January!

The Zoombombers for October were Jenny and Ron Doan of Missouri Star Quilt Company (MSQC). Many members may remember Jenny and Ron came to Vermont and visited the guild back in April 2013. All the MSQC shops are closed due to the Even though the shops are closed, pandemic. business is still booming at MSQC with online orders and machine quilting orders. Back in 2013, MSQC was the largest employer in Caldwell County with 50 employees. Fast forward 7+ years, MSQC now has 400 employees. Jenny said that despite the pandemic, they did **NOT** have to lay off any employees. They were able to move the shop employees within the company. Unfortunately, the restaurants have not survived, but MSQC is working with a new group of people wanting to open new restaurants in Hamilton. Speaking of new openings, MSQC plans to add a yarn shop to the existing 13 MSQC store fronts in Hamilton once they open back up in 2021. The 13 shops are all fabric specific. Jenny said one of her new favorite MSQC tutorials is Triple Play where Jenny and 2 other pattern designers make three different quilts using the same basic block. And just in case you're wondering, Jenny's favorite color is blue.

ZOOM PLATFORM BRINGS CHANGES TO GUILD MONTHLY MEETINGS

- Guild meetings will be conducted on Zoom in a virtual format; in-person meetings are cancelled for the 2020-2021 membership year. The executive board will re-evaluate when to restart in-person meetings next year.
- Guest speakers will present virtual lectures and workshops also using Zoom.

ZOOM BEST PRACTICES

- Make sure your camera is connected and available to the Zoom app.
- Check your microphone and speaker settings before joining the Zoom session.
- Close all apps except for Zoom on your smartphone/device/computer.
- Plug your computer/device/smartphone into a power source.
- If using wi-fi, make sure your wi-fi is not overloaded (think multiple phones, devices, cameras, etc.).
- If you have a limited/unreliable internet connection, try directly plugging into your internet router.
- If you are hard of hearing or in a crowded/public space, use a headset for better sound.
- Mute your microphone when not actively speaking.
- Be aware of your surroundings and behavior (We can see you!).
- Add questions/comments in "Chat" section to be addressed by Zoom moderator.
- "Raise hand" if you would like to address the group.
- Make comments short and succinct; mute for responses.

IDEAS FOR GUILD MEMBERS WITH UNRELIABLE INTERNET CONNECTIONS

Here are some ways to join the Zoom meetings if you have a limited connection:

- Plug directly into your internet router.
- Disconnect all other devices using wi-fi during the Zoom meeting. You'd be surprised how many devices are connected to your wi-fi (think printers, smartphones, cameras, appliances, lights, etc.).
- Try using the internet connection at your local library from your car.
- Join a fellow guild member at their home as long as everyone is observing COVID-19 guidelines and have not been exposed to COVID-19.
