## Franklin County Quilters Guild October 19, 2022

President Laurel Schaap called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and greeted members.

John Rouleau moved to accept the Consent Agenda; motion seconded by Sharon Perry. The motion carried.

**Mystery Quilt Project:** Diane Comeau and Lucie Fortin demonstrated the steps for the next mystery block. Instructions are available on the CaDi Corners' website. A link will be provided in the newsletter.

**Programs:** Gale Weld described programs for the year. Information about these programs is available in the newsletter.

### **Comfort Quilts:**

- Denise requested input from members in how to prepare kits. Do members want her to cut kits? Prepare fabric for kits? It was suggested that members could request yardage for their own patterns.
- Denise asked that members using the kits sign them out and sign them back in when they are returned to her.
- Denise stated she had recently counted quilts and had 17 completed with kits and 36 prepared by members with their own fabric.

### **Quilt Show:**

- Helen Short described the steps the committee has taken to prepare for the Quilt Show.
- Jean Anne Branch had sign-up sheets for members to volunteer for the show.
- At this point members may display one bed quilt only. There is no limit on smaller quilts.

### **Membership:**

- Penny LaRochelle stated there are currently 52 paid members. Thirty members were present at the meeting.
- Badges are available for paid members and new members will receive their badges at the next meeting.

### **2023 Charity Quilt:**

- Jean Anne Branch stressed that blocks need to be returned by the December meeting.
- Several blocks have been returned.

**Sugarhouse Gazette:** Sharon Perry stated that the deadline for submissions is Wednesday, October 26.

**22 in 2022:** Laurel Schaap stated that members need to continue keeping track of their projects for this challenge. Let Sharon Perry know if you've completed 22 projects in 2022.

### **Raffle Tickets and 2023 Raffle Quilt:**

- Denise Chase has tickets for members to sell.
- Members are required to sell at least two books of tickets. Tickets are \$5.00 per book (3 tickets) or \$2.00 per ticket.
- The Raffle Quilt was displayed on the stage during the meeting.

### **New Business:**

- Sharon Perry is looking for items (quilted) to sell at the FCQG booth in Montgomery where she and Penny LaRochelle will be selling raffle tickets. Sharon hopes to draw more interest to the booth for ticket sales.
- Diane Comeau will video the in-person meetings on Facebook Live. Only paid members may view the meeting on the guild's Facebook group.

At this point we stopped the meeting to enjoy the Christmas in October projects presented by: Laurel Schaap; Sharon Perry; Cindy Metayer; and Helen Bicknell.

Cathy Carlson won the door prize for Comfort Quilts. Nanc Ekiert won the membership door prize.

Penny LaRochelle won the design board donated by Cindy Metayer. Cindy Metayer won the bag donated by Laurel Schaap. Cathy Carlson won the fabric basket donated by Helen Bicknell.

Jean Anne Branch moved that we adjourn the meeting; Diane Kane seconded the motion; motion carried.

### **Rules of Left Right Center (LRC) Dice Game for Quilters**

- At least 3 players should sit around a table. The middle of the table is the center "pot" where fabric strips will be placed during the game. The game is played with a set of 3 dice. One side of each die has an L, one side has a C, one side has an R, and three sides have a single dot.
- Each player will start with 3 fabric strips. Choose a player to be the starting player. This can be the youngest player, or the oldest player, the player who won the previous game, or any other method of your choosing.
- The starting player takes their turn, then players will continue taking turns in clockwise order someone wins.
- On your turn, roll the dice. How many dice you roll depends on how many chips you have.
  - If you have 3 fabric strips, roll all 3 dice.
  - If you have 2 fabric strips, roll 2 dice.
  - If you have 1 fabric strip, roll 1 die.
  - If you have no fabric strips, don't roll any dice; pass them to the next player. You'll remain in the game as you can receive fabric strips from the players on either side.
  - After the dice are rolled, you must take actions based on what is showing on the dice.
    - If you roll an L, you must give one of your strips to the player on your left.
    - If you roll a C, you must put one of your strips in the "pot" in the center of the table.
    - If you roll an R, you must give one of your strips to the player on your right.
    - If you roll a dot, nothing happens.
- After rolling the dice and taking actions, pass the dice to the next player.
- The **game winner of all the fabric strips** is the person who puts the LAST fabric strip in the "pot."

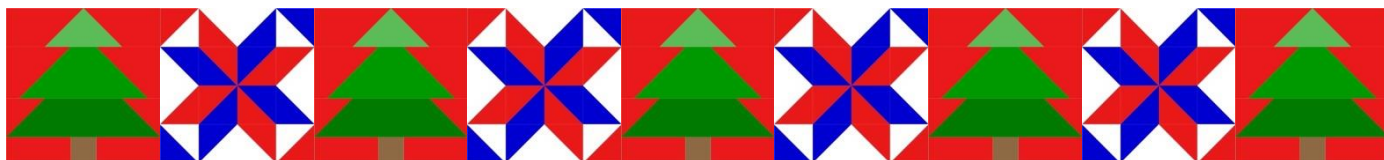
**GUILD MEMBERS WILL BE STRIPPING IN NOVEMBER**

The November will be a patriotic-themed meeting in celebration of Veterans Day. Members are asked to bring nine (9) 2½" X WOF strips of patriotic-themed (think red, white and/or blue) fabric. We'll be playing strip poker (AKA LRC) with those strips. **The rules for the quilters' version of the LRC dice game are on page 2 of this newsletter.**

Additionally, Lynn Carrier, the Vermont Regional Coordinator for "Quilts of Valor," will be traveling from Jacksonville, VT, to tell guild members all about the "Quilts of Valor" program in Vermont. She'll also discuss how our guild members might be able to contribute quilts, and sizes needed, to this program which honors and recognizes all veterans.

**DECEMBER WHITE ELEPHANT GIFT EXCHANGE**

The program on **Wednesday, December 14<sup>th</sup>**, is a white elephant gift exchange. Bring a small wrapped, quilt-related gift for the exchange. Gifts should have a value about \$15; handmade gifts are welcome. ## RECIPE CORNER

### UTTERLY DEADLY SOUTHERN PECAN PIE

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 ½ cups corn syrup (use ½ dark and ½ light)
- 4 eggs
- ¼ cup butter
- 1 ½ teaspoons vanilla
- 1 ½ cups pecans, coarsely broken
- 1 unbaked deep dish pie shell

In saucepan boil sugar and corn syrup together for 2 to 3 minutes; set aside to cool slightly.

In large bowl beat eggs lightly and very slowly pour the syrup mixture into the eggs, stirring constantly.

Strain the mixture to make sure it's smooth and lump free. Stir in butter (it will melt when stirred into warm mixture), vanilla, and pecans, and pour into crust.

Bake in a 350°F oven for about 45 to 60 minutes or until set.

### CANDIED PUMPKIN SPICED PECANS

- 1 large egg white
- ½ cup packed light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- ¾ teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 6 cups (about 21 oz.) pecan halves

Preheat oven to 250°F.

Whisk egg white in a large bowl until foamy. Whisk in packed light brown sugar, vanilla extract, kosher salt, and pumpkin pie spice. Stir pecan halves into brown sugar mixture until thoroughly coated.

Place pecans in a single layer on a large rimmed baking sheet lined with parchment paper and lightly sprayed with cooking spray. Bake, stirring every 15 minutes, until pecans have browned and coating has set and started to harden, about 45 minutes.

Remove from oven; cool completely on baking sheet, about 30 minutes. Store in an airtight container up to 5 days.

### CARAMEL-PECAN APPLE PIE

- Dough for single-crust pie
- 7 cups sliced peeled tart apples (about 6 medium)
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- ¾ cup chopped pecans

- ⅓ cup packed brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 4 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- ¼ cup caramel topping, room temperature
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- Streusel topping:
- ¾ cup all-purpose flour
- ¼ cup sugar
- 6 tablespoons cold butter, cubed
- ⅔ cup chopped pecans
- ¼ cup caramel topping, room temperature
- Whipped cream, optional

Preheat oven to 350°. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough to a ⅛-inch-thick circle; transfer to a 9-in. deep-dish pie plate. Trim crust to ½ inch beyond rim of plate; flute edge. Refrigerate while preparing filling.

In a large bowl, toss apples with lemon juice and vanilla. Mix pecans, sugars, cinnamon and cornstarch; add to apples and toss to combine.

Spread caramel topping onto bottom of crust. Fill with apple mixture. Drizzle with butter.

For streusel topping, mix flour and sugar. Cut in butter until crumbly; stir in pecans. Sprinkle over filling.

Bake on a lower oven rack until filling is bubbly, 65-75 minutes. Drizzle with caramel topping. Cool on a wire rack. If desired, serve with whipped cream and additional caramel topping.

### PECAN CARAMEL CLUSTERS

- 14-oz. pkg individually wrapped caramels, unwrapped
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 cups chopped pecans
- 1 pound dark chocolate, broken into small pieces

Place caramels, butter, and water in a microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on high, stirring every 30 seconds until smooth, about 3 minutes. Stir in pecans.

Drop caramel pecan mixture by spoonfuls onto parchment paper. Place in freezer for 15 to 20 minutes.

Place chocolate in a microwave-safe bowl and microwave on high, stirring every 15 seconds, until melted and smooth, 1 to 2 minutes. Dip each caramel cluster into chocolate using a fondue fork until coated; place on parchment paper to dry. Chill until firm, if necessary.

Diane Comeau and Lucie Fortin have been working together over the summer to bring guild members another fun and unique mystery quilt with blocks presented each month during the 2022-2023 membership year. It sounds like another stunning quilt. If you missed out on making the FCQG Sugarhouse Sampler this past year, you can join this year's mystery.

Diane plans to handle the distribution of the instructions for each month's block(s) a little different from last year's mystery quilt. She will still have the current month's BOM in paper version at each guild meeting and any past months where there are extras for those members who would prefer a paper copy.

In addition to the paper copy available at the meeting, Diane will also have a pattern available on her website for each month's instructions. Diane will provide a link each month for that month's

pattern. When you click on the link, it will direct you to Diane's business website. Even though there is a "price" for each month's pattern, guild members will have a coupon code to enter which will zero out the "price" for the pattern.

To access the pattern, click on the link in blue above. Once you access Diane's business page, click "Add to Cart." Now go to your cart and under the word Subtotal, click on Enter Coupon. Enter BOM2023 then click Apply as shown in Figure A below. Once you click Apply, the "price" for the pattern will be \$0.00.

You will be required to enter your email address so the system can send you a link to download your file. The file will be available for an unlimited number of downloads.

## LOOKING AHEAD TO PROGRAMS ON ZOOM IN JANUARY AND FEBRUARY

With the success of staying connected with Zoom meetings during the pandemic in 2020 and 2021, the guild's executive board decided to conduct future January and February meetings on Zoom. Part of the reasoning behind that decision was due to the consideration of members' driving safety in light of weather uncertainty in the dead of winter and to the availability of and ease of scheduling many quilt instructors to make presentations on the Zoom platform.

2023 will be the 2<sup>nd</sup> year the guild will host quilt instructors in January and February presenting trunk shows and workshops on the Zoom platform. In January, Emily Taylor, The Collage Quilter, will be joining us from Sandy, Utah and will be discussing her quilting journey into collage quilting through a trunk show of her quilts. There's another change in the meeting date in February as well. Ellen Lindner, the Adventure Quilter from Melbourne, Florida, will entertain us with her lecture, called *Confessions of a Fabric Whisperer*, **on Wednesday, February 8<sup>th</sup>, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday in February**. Ellen will also conduct **a workshop, Double Reversible Appliqué, on Saturday, February 11<sup>th</sup>**. So check your calendars and mark down the change in meeting dates so you won't miss the programs with these talented quilters. Also take advantage of Ellen's workshop in February for the opportunity to learn how to do double reversible appliqué.

### QUILT TIPS

- Never lose your scissors or rotary cutter!
- Invest in your scissors, a quality pair is worth every penny!
- Never use your scissors for anything other than fabric!
- Measure twice - cut once! Failing this use the smaller piece to start a miniature quilt.
- When you have lots of pieces to cut, always start with the longest/largest pieces.
- Piece together fabric leftovers and use them as quilt backing.
- Always use ruler lines and not cutting mat lines to get the best straight rotary cuts. AND flip the mat over!
- Don't cut apart your pieces before you take them to the ironing board!
- Accuracy is everything! Perfect cutting and an accurate scant 1/4" seam allowance really make all the difference.
- Read the instructions through from start to finish before you start cutting and sewing.
- Iron to the dark side. Check the sharpness of your needle. Relax and enjoy.
- New project....new needle!
- Starch, starch and starch again!
- Cut pieces slightly bigger and trim the block to size.
- Use numbered flat head pins.
- Press to set your seam before you open it up to press to one side or open.
- Use a walking foot to attach binding
- Never sew across a seam you haven't pressed.
- Pack it up! Take your machine out of your house and sew with friends. You will learn, you will teach, you will grow friendships and you will keep the love of quilting having momentum!
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!



## 5 MONTHS AND COUNTING...UNTIL THE 2023 QUILT SHOW

Helen Short and Teri Brunelle, the guild's 2023 Quilt Show Coordinators, are in the planning mode for the show. Both City Hall and the quilt poles have been reserved. As a note, the 2023 Quilt Show will display the Primary Sampler Quilts made with the blocks patterns released last year. If you haven't finished yours, there's still time. Please sew a 4-inch wide sleeve on the top of your quilt in the event your quilt is hung. And a theme for the challenge has been decided.

### **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!!**

Jean Anne Branch is in charge of getting volunteers for the quilt show. She began sign-ups at the October meeting. She will have the list at the November and December meetings as well. As an English proverb says, "Many hands make light work." Be sure to take a look at the volunteer list found [here](#) and let Jean Anne know for which job you're willing to sign up.

### **2023 CHALLENGE QUILT**

The 2023 Challenge Quilt will feature the Dresden Plate. An entire plate is not required. However, you must have a minimum of 4 sections of the plate. Those 4 sections do not have to be sewn together into a unit. Your plate sections do not have to be the same size nor made out of the same fabrics. The perimeter of your Challenge Quilt must be no more than 96 inches. **A sleeve for hanging is required.** Let your imagination run wild!

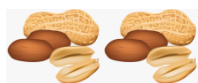

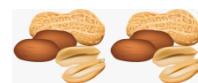
