Minutes for General Membership Meeting Wednesday, October 16, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM by Jean Anne Branch. She greeted all members in attendance. The meeting started with Jean Anne sharing a story about Carolyn Mazloomi PhD an American curator, quilter, author, art historian, and aerospace engineer. A strong advocate for presenting and documenting African-American-made quilts.

Jean Anne read a profound quote as a source encouragement for members, "Quiltmaking is a tradition and a mode of expression that is both intimate and esteemed. Every human being has an intimate relationship with cloth. It is the first thing we are swathed in at birth, and the last thing that touches our body upon death. Through the nuance of textile, difficult stories can reach audiences across identities and generations from a place of care, peace, and nurture."

She then read a thank you note from a family who had experienced a home fire and received a comfort quilt from the FCQG, presented to them by a guild member.

Meeting was then lead by Mary Jane Rossi, Co-President.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Deb Trahan and 2nd by Laurel Schapp to accept Minutes of the September 18th meeting. A motion was made by John Rouleau to accept the Treasurer's report and 2nd by Carol Parks of the September 18th meeting. Motion carried.

Chair Reports:

Quilt Show (Mary King & Beth Mouser)

- Mary mentioned there is no new information at this time. She will update in the Spring.
- Penny reported there are 9 quilt entries to date with several on the way. Please submit your quilt entries. Penny provided quilt show entry forms, and these are also available on the website under Quilt Show forms or here.

Marketing and Mentoring (Peggy Paradee & Shirley Babcock): Peggy reiterated their efforts to promote the guild. Front Page Forum has proven to be the most beneficial resulting in a number of new members. Membership mentoring plans are being considered for both new and current members.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase)

- Denise explained program. She brought with her a few quilt kits for members to take and complete. Some of the kits are for piecing, some quilting only.
- As a reminder there is a binder on the table to sign out a kit as well as to sign in upon return. There is no timeframe.
- Members who make a comfort quilt using their own materials should sign in the donated comfort quilt.
- Denise asked members to let her know about those in need of a comfort quilt.

2025 Guild Charity Quilt (Sharon Perry & Denise Chase)

• Sharon reiterated the guild charity quilt is made by members, for a charitable organization to use for fund raising purposes.

- Quilt this year will be a 4-patch. Kit bags designed with full instructions were made available for completion (70 kits available).
- Please return completed blocks at the November meeting.
- Charities from Franklin and Grand Isle Counties who anticipate they can sell \$1,000 in tickets can apply for this quilt.
- Letters of interest can be made to Jean Anne Branch (2 Evergreen Dr., Unit 102, Milton, VT 05468) or Mary Jane Rossi (100 Kennedy Drive #18, South Burlington, VT 05403); deadline is January 31, 2025.
- One request has already been received. Members will vote for charity selection at the March, 2025 meeting.

<u>2025 Raffle Quilt</u> (Laurel Schaap & Sharon Perry)

- 2025 Raffle Quilt pieced by Laurel Schapp, and longarm quilted by Diane Comeau. Photo of this quilt was passed around for viewing.
- Sharon reiterates our main fund raiser is the yearly Raffle Quilt. Each guild member must sell 2 packets of tickets to support the raffle.
- Tickets were distributed to members in attendance. Plan is to distribute the 2 packets of tickets to each member. Members are encouraged to contact Sharon for more tickets as needed, and to sell as many as they can.
- Tickets will also be sold during the 2025 Quilt Show in April, where the winning ticket will be drawn.

VERMONT QUILTER AND PATTERN DESIGNER VISITS GUILD ON NOVEMBER 20TH

Karen Abrahamovich, a Vermont quilter and pattern designer, will be the guest speaker at the guild's November meeting. Through her trunk show, she will tell us about her quilting journey to include designing quilts for all 50 states plus all the provinces of Canada and some countries. Her inventory of patterns continues to grow as she creates new patterns for more countries.

Most recently, Karen was the featured artist at the quilt show sponsored by the Champlain Valley Quilters Guild in late April. And last year, Karen and her husband took her patterns to the fall Quilt Market in Houston, Texas. Quilt Market is trade show for the quilting and textile industries. CHANGES TO THE COMFORT QUILT PROGRAM...FOR NOW

Starting immediately, the comfort quilt program will not accept any more quilt tops until the current backlog of 44 tops has been quilted. There are several small quilts that could easily be quilted on a domestic machine so we are not necessarily looking only at our longarm quilters.

It would only follow that we make the same changes to our "Show and Tell" part of the meeting. Show and Tell will only include completed quilts, no more quilt tops.

For one thing, a completed quilt has a much better look than a top. Also Denise Chase, the guild's Comfort Quilt Coordinator, has found herself counting the quilt twice as it makes its way through Show and Tell twice. An exception will be made for any comfort quilt top that will be completed and given away before the next meeting.




IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN...MEMBERSHIP DUES!

BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM)


The block handed out at the September meeting is called Crosswalk; instructions for the block can be found <u>here</u>. Carol Stanley, this year's Project Coordinator for the guild, to use a fun novelty print for the 5" square in the block.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times. If you win all the blocks, they are yours to keep.

You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.

QUILT TIPS

- Have no fear; it's just fabric. Fear of "wasting" your materials will hold you back. Cut it up. Make mistakes. Learn from those mistakes and grow.
- Square your half-square triangle blocks. They always go wonky.
- Accurate piecing begins with accurate cutting.
 Try nonslip grips for the back of your rulers if you are having a hard time. Use sharp blades in your rotary cutter.
- A design wall is a great way to play around with pieces. Put some batting on something like a 4x8 sheet of foam insulation, and mount it on a wall. Friction will keep fabric in place, but you can also pin larger pieces. It can be reassuring to work out a design before you start sewing blocks together.
- Sew your stash...before heading out and buying all new fabric for a quilt, double check your stash first.
- Don't be afraid to improvise and make your quilt your own.
- There are no mistakes in quilting, just design opportunities.
- Done is better than perfect!

Strip Piecing Reimagined – Karen Abrahamovich

Learn Karen's technique for strip piecing by column

Both beginner and experienced quilters will enjoy their results! Make a unique quilt for yourself or to give as a gift! Learn directly from the quilt designer! This 6 hour workshop will give you all the tips and tricks to make your quilt go together easily.

You can choose to make a variety of sizes depending on which design you choose

Other supplies needed for class:

Sewing machine (with 1/4 inch foot)

Thread

 Ruler, tape measure and Rotary cutter (for subcutting the pieces to size)

Pencil

Also helpful if you have them:

Wonder Clips, Quilter's Magic Wand (Studio 180)



RECIPE CORNER

SWEET POTATO PIE

9-inch prepared pie crust
½ cup finely chopped pecans
3 to 4 tablespoons cold water
3 large eggs
30 oz sweet potatoes, peeled, cubed & cooked
1 can (14 oz) sweetened condensed milk
1½ to 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
½ teaspoon salt

In a food processor, combine the eggs, sweet potatoes, milk, pumpkin pie spice, vanilla and salt; blend until smooth. Pour into prepared crust.

Bake at 425° for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350°; bake 30-35 minutes longer or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack. Garnish with whipped cream and toasted pecans if desired.

TURKEY SWEET POTATO CHILI

1 pound ground turkey

1 small onion, chopped

2 cups chicken broth

15 oz sweet potatoes, peeled cubed & cooked

1 can (4 oz) chopped green chiles

1 tablespoon chili powder

1 teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon curry powder

½ teaspoon dried oregano

½ teaspoon salt

1 can (15½-oz) Great northern beans, rinsed & drained Optional: Sour cream, fresh cilantro & red onions

In a large skillet, cook turkey and onion over medium heat until turkey is no longer pink and onion is tender, 5-7 minutes, breaking up turkey into crumbles; drain. Transfer to a 3- or 4-qt. slow cooker. Stir in broth, sweet potato puree, chiles and seasonings. Cook, covered, on low 4-5 hours. Stir in beans; cook until heated through, about 1 hour. If desired, top with sour cream, cilantro and red onions.

SMOKY SWEET POTATO & BLACK BEAN ENCHILADAS

1 large sweet potato, cubed

1 small onion, chopped

1 small sweet red pepper, chopped

½ cup minced fresh cilantro

1 teaspoon smoked paprika

½ teaspoon garlic powder

½ teaspoon ground cumin

½ teaspoon ground coriander

½ teaspoon pepper

1 can (15 oz) black beans, rinsed and drained

1 can (15 oz) enchilada sauce

12 corn tortillas (6 inches), warmed

2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese, divided

Optional: Avocado, sour cream, salsa, cilantro & hot sauce

Preheat oven to 375°. In a large saucepan, place a steamer basket over 1 in. water. Place sweet potato, onion and red pepper in basket. Bring water to a boil. Reduce heat to maintain a simmer; steam, covered, until tender, 15-20 minutes. Transfer vegetables to a large bowl. Mash vegetables, gradually adding cilantro, spices and pepper to reach desired consistency. Stir in black beans.

Spread ½ cup enchilada sauce into a greased 13x9-in. baking dish. Place ½ cup vegetable mixture in center of each tortilla; sprinkle with 4 teaspoons cheese. Roll up and place in prepared dish, seam side down. Top with remaining enchilada sauce; sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake, uncovered, until casserole is heated through and cheese is melted, 20-25 minutes. Serve with optional toppings as desired.

SWEET POTATO AND CRAB SOUP

4 tablespoons butter, divided

2 medium leeks (white portion only), finely chopped

3 garlic cloves, minced

4 cups cubed peeled sweet potatoes (about 1½ lbs)

1 teaspoon salt, divided

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

½ teaspoon cayenne pepper

5 cups vegetable stock

2 cups heavy whipping cream

4 teaspoons fresh thyme leaves, divided

12 oz lump crabmeat, drained

In a Dutch oven, heat 2 tablespoons butter over medium heat; sauté leeks and garlic until leeks are tender, 4-6 minutes. Stir in sweet potatoes, 3/4 teaspoon salt, cinnamon, cayenne and stock; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, until potatoes are tender, 15-20 minutes.

Puree soup using an immersion blender or cool slightly and puree soup in batches in a blender; return to pan. Stir in cream and 2 teaspoons thyme; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, 5 minutes.

In a large skillet, melt remaining 2 tablespoons butter over medium heat. Add crab, remaining salt and thyme; cook 5 minutes, stirring gently to combine. Top servings with crab mixture & croutons if desired.
