

FRANKLIN COUNTY QUILTERS GUILD Minutes of November 20, 2019

The meeting was called to order by President John Rouleau at 6:30 pm. There were 37 members present. Of the 37 present, 4 were new members.

The **Consent Agenda** to accept the minutes of the October meeting and the November treasurer's report passed with a voice vote on a motion by Sharon Perry, seconded by Linda Nadeau.

 $\boldsymbol{Quilt\ Show}\ will\ be\ held\ on\ April\ 4^{th}\ and\ 5^{th}\ with\ set-\ up$ at St. Albans City Hall on April 3rd, 2020. To date there are 9 quilt entries. Kay Benedict is hoping for 50 entries by the December meetings so she can start thinking about how to display them. In order to enter a quilt, it should be quilted and bound as the size can sometimes be altered with quilting. Entry forms are available on our website. Carol Stanley brought up the frequency of the Quilt Show, perhaps every other year, due to fewer members volunteering. Discussion ensued about: availability of City Hall if we went with an every other year quilt show; our membership being stable with last year's numbers; and the comradery and fun the Ouilt Show brings the members. Bonnie Evans, who schedules the volunteers, said she does not have a problem finding members to work.

Comfort Quilts: Denise explained that if a member finishes a quilt top and can't quilt it the quilt should be returned so another member could quilt it. The Guild will furnish or pay for the batting. Denise has fabric that is suitable for backing available at her home. The family that lost their home and their children in Grand Isle will be receiving a quilt. Alvce Bushey announced that the New England Federal Credit Union will be collecting quilts and blankets during the month of December to be given to charitable organizations for distribution. Diane Comeau announced that Teen Challenge, a residential substance abuse rehabilitation program in Vermont, is opening a home for women and is seeking twin sized quilts. Previously, the program has had a home for men. Both the men and women get to keep the quilts they are given at the homes. The program is also looking for volunteers to teach life skills, such as sewing. . If you are interested in learning more about Teen Challenge contact Diane or Helen Short. The program accepts people of all ages.

Membership: New name badges were available at the meeting. From now on, if a member comes without their badge they will place 25 cents in the bucket. There currently are 61 paid members.

Program: Some members brought ornaments to the meeting. Members will gather at Natalie Good's house on Saturday, November 23rd, to make ornaments for the Guild's tree for the Festival of Trees. Tree decorating will take place on December 5th at City Hall. The

<u>December</u> program will be a potluck and gift exchange. The <u>doors will open at 5:30 pm with the meal to be</u> served at 6:00 pm.

Projects: The Block of the Month is **Fall Fancy.** The colors are white background with brown and either yellow or orange. A challenge has been issued. For the members who win a set of monthly blocks and finish a quilt out of those blocks by the May meeting, their names will go in for a special drawing for a prize. Kris Bachand won the Block of the Month.

Meeting Times: The variation in meeting times was brought up. For now the meetings will start at 6:30 pm with doors opening at 6:00 pm, unless there is food or a speaker that require an earlier start time. The change in time will be noted in the newsletter.

2020 Raffle Quilt: Sharon Perry and Denise Chase showed the **2020 Raffle Quilt** top. Bev Cook of Treasured Moments Quilting will quilt it.

Birthday Fat Quarters were available compliments of Diane Comeau of CaDi Corners.

Program: Nanc Ekiert and Kay Benedict gave an inspiring program about making art quilts.

Charity Quilt and members' show and tell was held. Nadine Froebel won the membership drawing.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 pm.

2020 Charity Quilt

(Organized by JeanAnne Branch and Carol Stanley in grays and scrappy squares)

QUILT TIPS

- Carefully press the seams in quilt blocks by lifting the iron and placing it down on each new area without moving the iron across the fabric so you avoid stretching or distorting your fabric.
- Take photos and keep a written record of all your completed quilts. Make sure you label each of your quilts properly too on the back, so there is always a permanent record of who, when, and for whom the quilt was made.
- When doing stitch-in-the-ditch quilting, stitch as close to the seam as possible so your quilting remains largely invisible.
- Use small stitches and the correct thread tension when appliqueing, so as to not distort the shapes of smaller pieces.
- Be careful to press seams that meet in opposite directions so as to reduce the bulkiness, and allow more accurate machine piecing.
- When you begin a machine-quilting session, warm up on a practice piece first, before you start on your quilt.
- Wool batting is a good choice for hand quilting, as the lanolin in the wool helps the needle slide through more easily.
- When sewing by hand, if your thread tends to kink, you may be rolling the needle. The easiest way to prevent this is to rotate the needle every few stitches to 'unwind' the thread as you go.
- When sewing appliqué by hand, stitch closely to, or just under the fold of the piece being appliquéd, which will help hide the stitching.
- Chocolate is a favorite quilting notion!

QUILT TIPS

- Rubberized shelf protectors are wonderful to prevent your sewing machine foot pedal from slipping all
 over the place. Just cut a piece larger than your foot pedal and place it underneath the foot pedal.
 Also, if you have trouble with your sewing machine 'walking' across your table, this same product will
 help.
- Keep your old rotary cutter and mat if you buy a new one. Use the old one to cut paper patterns, photos or other craft things.
- Loosen the paper backing of fusible web to remove it from appliqués by scoring the paper with a straight pin.
- Use a medium gray or taupe thread for all patchwork piecing except very light-colored fabrics.
- Small paintbrushes come in handy to clean lint from the bobbin case area of your sewing machine.
