At the January meeting the guild voted to pursue a 501C3 status. We truly are a charitable organization. There have been three families whose homes have burned and the guild has responded with quilts. Bonnie Evans suggested we need a group sew so we can have more quilts on hand to donate. There is a group that meets at NMC in the Conference Center on Sunday's. My schedule has been tight because I work some so I can support my quilting habit in the style I'd like to become accustomed to. I am willing to donate fabric to the cause and make a few quilts myself. We need juvenile, teen and adult themed quilts to have on hand as needs arise.

Last month a member asked about "Busy Quilts" for people with dementia. St. Albans Health and Rehab and Our Lady of the Meadows have special care units for people with memory problems, other nursing homes have residents with dementia as well as Care Partners and Franklin County Home Heath. One of the nurses I work with asked if I would help her obtain some to give to residents so they will have something to occupy themselves. Busy Quilts are 20X20in, made of fabrics that have different textures, with zippers and buttons sewn in. If members would like to make some, I'll volunteer to get them placed in our community.

The guild was founded in 1991. Next year will be our 25th anniversary. I invite members to start thinking of activities we can do throughout 2016 to celebrate. I will be asking for a committee to form after our quilt show in April, and yes, I'm volunteering to serve as your president for one more year.







** Supplies List **

Color 1

Color 1 needs: one 2-1/2" x 18" strip AND one 4-7/8" x 9-3/4" strip

Color 2 needs: one 3" x 12" strip AND one 4-7/8" x 9-3/4" strip AND one 2-1/2" square

** Preparing the Pieces and Sewing the Block **

Start by marking and cutting the Color 1 2-1/2" x 18" strip into four 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangles...


Next mark and cut the Color 2 3" x 12" strip into sixteen 1-1/2" squares...

Now speed piece the half squares by stacking the Color 1 and Color 2 4 7/8" x 9 3/4" strips, right sides together, marking the 4 7/8" square line, marking the diagonals in the directions shown at left, and then sewing a scant 1/4" above and below the marked diagonals, pivoting at the 4 7/8" square line.

Cut apart ON the marked diagonals, and cut apart on the square line as well. This will give you four half squares. Press seams to darker side, and trim

these back to measure 4-1/2" if needed...

To make the blocks rectangle units...place the small Color 2 squares lined up with the edges of a Color 1 rectangle. (one at a time!) On the back of the small square, draw in the diagonal, and sew ON this drawn line. Cut off the excess seam allowance, and press the remainder out towards the triangle. Do this with all four corners of the rectangle. Make four units like this...



Now piece the block, using the units we just made, plus the 2-1/2"

Color 2 center square. Make three rows as shown at left, using the standard scant 1/4" seam, pressing seams in alternating directions by row...then sew the rows together...and that's one Goshen Star under your belt! Good Job!! :0) ...on to <u>Page 2!</u>

Cut your HST fabrics at 5" instead of 4-7/8" and then trim down after Measure, measure, measure. you've sewn them for better accuracy. Christy's Tip ~

QUILTING IN AMERICA 2014 SURVEY

Summary excerpt provided courtesy of F + W Media and Quilts, Inc.

HOUSTON—October 24, 2014—Quilters in the United States spend a whopping \$3.76 *billion* a year on their fiber art passion, a 5% increase in the value of the market over the last four years. And the average quilting household expenditure has increased 36% in that same time frame.

The recent **Quilting in America**TM survey also shows that there are more than 16 million active quilters in the country. That means one out of every 20 Americans quilts!... The survey is conducted every four years by independent survey companies....

The 2014 survey did show a decline in the overall number of quilters in the U.S., which is almost certainly a reflection of the national economic downturn. Casual quilters are more apt to move in and out of quilting and other crafts as their interests and their disposable income change, and the Great Recession undoubtedly had a significant economic impact on the ability of those casual quilters to pursue their interest in quilting and other crafts.

"However, we know Dedicated Quilters don't regard quilting as an optional hobby, but as part of their lives. They, like quilters throughout history, quilt during good times and bad. Their quilting is both a means of expressing themselves creatively, and also of expressing what is going on in their lives and how they are dealing with it," says **Karey Bresenhan**, **president of Quilts**, **Inc.**, and **Director Emeritus** of its shows.

Those "Dedicated Quilters" represent 12.2% of all quilting households, and account for 60.4% of the total industry expenditures, or about \$2.27 billion, according to the survey. Each Dedicated Quilter is defined as one who spends more than \$500 a year on quilting-related purchases, which include sewing machines, fabric, notions, tools, patterns, books, computer programs, batting, and thread. In fact, the Dedicated Quilter actually spent an average of \$3,296 per year on quilting.

Demographics of the Dedicated Quilter indicate she is female; about 64; is well-educated (79% attended college); has a household income in excess of \$100,000; and has been quilting an average of 20.3 years. Among Dedicated Quilters, 81% are

traditionalists, while 38% embrace art quilting, and 35% enjoy modern quilting styles. Some enjoy multiple types of quilting.

The Dedicated Quilter owns, on average, almost \$13,000 worth of tools and supplies and has a stash of fabric worth nearly \$6,000, which the majority (88%) store in a studio or room dedicated solely to sewing and quilting activities.

And quilters are also tech-savvy, with 87% owning a tablet or eBook reader today. The percentage of quilters who access the Internet daily has grown to 86%, up from 73% four years ago. The data indicates that quilters spend 3.5 hours per week watching quilting-related online broadcasting to learn new tips and techniques, get inspiration, purchase fabric, tools, and supplies, and to search for free patterns.

Quilting in AmericaTM 2014 is the seventh study conducted since 1994 to measure the time and money quilters invest in their art, profiling key segments of the market.



FEBRUARY MEETING TO FEATURE QUILT APPRAISER

Sandra Palmer will be the guest speaker at the next

JUST IN CASE YOU HAVEN'T STARTED YET... "I'VE NEVER MET A RED I DIDN'T LIKE" CHALLENGE

- 1. The Challenge Quilt can be no larger than 42"W by 42"L. It can be any size smaller.
- 2. The quilt must be completed using any red and white fabrics, from any fabric manufacturer and the fabrics can be any shade of red and white, but the fabrics do need to reflect a red/white quilt theme (not red/white/black, and yes, red/cream is ok). Do **NOT** use prints that have colors, other than red and white, in them.
- 3. The quilt must be entered into the 2015 quilt show.

RECIPE CORNER:

FUDGE

- 1 jar (7 oz.) marshmallow crème
- 3/4 cup butter (can substitute margarine)
- 3 cups sugar
- ²/₃ cup evaporated milk
- 1 package (12 oz.) semi–sweet chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped nuts (optional)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Lightly grease 13 x 9-inch pan with butter or margarine. Melt butter in saucepan. Add sugar and milk; mix well. Bring to full rolling boil on medium heat; stir constantly. Continue boiling for 5 minutes on medium heat or until candy thermometer reaches 234°F; stir constantly. Remove from heat; stir in chips until melted. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Pour into pan. Cool at room temperature. Cut into squares.

Peppermint Fudge: Substitute white chocolate chips for semi-sweet chocolate chips & 1 cup crushed peppermint candies (use only Brach's) for the nuts.

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

4 cups granulated sugar

1/2 cup margarine or butter

1 cup milk

12 oz. jar peanut butter

7 oz. jar marshmallow crème

1 cup flour

Pinch of salt

1/2 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Mix together sugar, butter, and milk in saucepan. Heat over medium heat until boiling; boil for 5 minutes. Add peanut butter and marshmallow crème; mix well. Add flour and salt; beat well. Pour into buttered 13x9-inch pan. Refrigerate for easier cutting. This is a soft fudge.
