

(I'm not going to wait too long though, as I know what happens when the fabric gets put away. I find it 5 years later and don't love it anymore.)

As I'm writing this, there's a song running through my head, The Gambler by Kenny Rogers. "You gotta know when to hold 'em, and know when to fold 'em." It can be hard to know when to let go of something that isn't working. Sometimes it helps to bounce it off a friend (thanks, Sharon).

I hope your projects are going well. If not, give yourself permission to let it go! And you're welcome – I expect you'll be humming that song all day.

Franklin County Quilters Guild February 8, 2023 on Zoom

President Laurel Schaap called the zoom meeting to order and welcomed all who were able to attend.

We immediately moved into the program with Gale Weld introducing Ellen Lindner, our guest speaker. Ellen presented a trunk showing describing the steps she takes to make her creations. Denise Chase won the door prize.

Following Ellen's presentation, we moved into our regular meeting.

Helen Short moved to accept the Consent Agenda. Sharon Perry seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Programs:

- Gale Weld discussed Ellen Lindner's workshop and indicated there were still openings.
- The March (in person) meeting is titled Tips and Tricks. Gale and Sharon have prepared a slide show.
- The April meeting will host the feather weight presentation that was rescheduled from last year.
- The May meeting will include a free motion ruler workshop. There is a \$50.00 charge for this workshop. (More information is available in the newsletter.)

<u>**Comfort Quilts:**</u> Denise Chase stated that she is always receiving quilts. There was discussion about possible recipients of the comfort quilts (Tim's House, Home Health, Carriage House, nursing homes).

<u>Quilt Show</u>:

- Helen Short stated that Sandra Palmer will be available for quilt appraisals. Anyone wishing to have an appraisal should contact Helen at 752-5497. The 45-minute appraisal will cost \$65.00.
- April Walker is working on publicity
- Teri Brunelle stated that she will arrange for the quilt to be advertised on the BFA marquee.
- Denise is looking for the person who sold tickets to Francis LaCross as she would like to give that person credit for the sale.
- Penny stated there are currently 58 quilt show entries including 7 Challenge Quilts and 7 Block of the Month quilts. She stated there are 20 more quilts promised.
- Jean Anne Branch reported that volunteer slots are filling up and she feels there is good coverage for the show.
- There are three entrants for the Members Boutique.
- Helen described the Challenge Quilt requirements. **Membership:**
- Penny LaRochelle reported there are currently 56 members plus one new member.
- Sharon Perry reported there were 31 members in attendance in 29 locations with 1 guest.

Franklin County Quilters Guild Sugarhouse 33 DAYS AND COUNTING... UNTIL THE <u>2023 QUILT SHOW</u>

The 2023 Quilt Show is less than 5 weeks away, and the planning and preparations continue behind the scenes. As the event draws near, we depend on all guild members to ensure the quilt show is a huge success. Continue reading to see how you can help.

- We need QUILTS! It's all about the quilts!!! Penny LaRochelle has volunteered as the Quilt Registration coordinator and she wants to have the quilts registered sooner rather than later. <u>ALL quilts must be registered</u> <u>no later than March 1</u>st. The quilt registration form can be found here. As a reminder, <u>all quilts, including</u> <u>those in the Small/Miniature category</u>, must have a sleeve sewn (not pinned) to the back. The sleeve must be at least 4" wide. Also all quilts must be wrapped in a clear plastic bag. Finally, <u>all quilts must be</u> <u>dropped off on Friday, March 31st</u>, <u>between Noon and</u> <u>2 pm</u>!

- We need volunteers!!! Jean Anne Branch is in charge of getting volunteers for the quilt show. As an English proverb says, "Many hands make light work." There are a few jobs which remained unfilled. Be sure to take a look at the volunteer list found <u>here</u>. If one of the remaining jobs fits in your schedule, please contact Jean Anne, 802-891-6187 or jeanabranch@comcast.net, and let her know when you'd like to volunteer.

- We need your raffle tickets!!! Denise Chase is the raffle ticket coordinator this year. Denise asks that each member return the raffle tickets and money for the tickets in an envelope with the member's name written on the outside. Denise wants to be sure to properly credit the returned tickets and money to the correct member and avoid spending time tracking down unreturned tickets. Once sold members can bring their sold tickets and money to a guild meeting **OR** send the tickets and money (check(s) payable to FCQG) to Denise Chase, 55 Barlow Street, St Albans, VT 05478. Be sure to include your return address on the envelope so Denise can properly credit the ticket sales to your name. All raffle tickets and money must be returned by March 15th at the guild meeting. If you have any unsold tickets, please return those as well at the March guild meeting.

2023 CHALLENGE QUILT

The 2023 Challenge Quilt will feature the Dresden Plate. An entire plate is not required. However, you must have a minimum of 4 sections/blades of the plate. Those 4 sections/blades do not have to be sewn together into a unit. Your plate sections do not have to be the same size nor made out of the same fabrics. The perimeter of your Challenge Quilt must be no more than 96 inches. <u>A</u>

<u>sleeve for hanging is required</u>. Let your imagination run wild!

DID YOU MAKE THE 2021-2022 SUGARHOUSE SAMPLER MYSTERY QUILT?

Or are you currently working on one? The Quilt Show committee plans to have a **special display of members' completed Sugarhouse Sampler Mystery Quilts at the April 2023 quilt show.** If you haven't finished yours yet, there's still time to complete your sampler quilt and have it be part of this special display.

Please be sure to **register your Sugarhouse Sampler Mystery Quilt with Penny** so she can include in the quilt layout and display. **Don't forget** to put a **4'' sleeve** on the back of your quilt so it can hang at the quilt show.



- Host a Mini Quilting Retreat: Whether you're a member of a quilting bee or have just a couple of quilting buddies, what could be more fun than a one day quilt-a-thon? Include a show-and-tell, plan a block swap or fabric swap, or play Quilt Bingo. (And don't forget the chocolate!)
- Teach a Friend or a Child to Quilt: Start with the basics and an easy pattern. If you have young kids or grandchildren, spend a few hours playing with simple fabric shapes on your design wall, or prep some fabrics with fusible web and let them have fun cutting and arranging patches on a background piece. You just might create a new fabric addict!
- Pick Up a New Quilting Magazine: Magazines to check out include: Fons & Porter's Love of Quilting; Fons & Porter's Quick + Easy Quilts; McCall's Quilting; Quiltmaker; and Quilting Arts. You're probably familiar with at least one of these magazines...why not take the opportunity to check out something new to you?
- Listen to Quilting Podcasts: Quilting podcasts are some of the best ways to keep up with what's happening and who's who in the quilting world. Grab your ear buds or headphones and catch up on episodes while you quilt.

It sounds like another stunning quilt. If you missed out on making the FCQG Sugarhouse Sampler this past year, you can join this year's mystery.

Diane plans to handle the distribution of the instructions for each month's block(s) a little different from last year's mystery quilt. She will still have the current month's BOM in paper version at each guild meeting and any past months where there are extras for those members who would prefer a paper copy.

In addition to the paper copy available at the meeting, Diane will also have a pattern available on her website for each month's instructions. Diane will provide a link each month for that month's

When you click on the link, it will direct you to Diane's business website. Even though there is a "price" for each month's pattern, guild members will have a coupon code to enter which will zero out the "price" for the pattern.

To access the pattern, click on the link in blue above. Once you access Diane's business page, click "Add to Cart." Now go to your cart and under the word Subtotal, click on Enter Coupon. Enter BOM2023 then click Apply. Once you click Apply, the "price" for the pattern will be \$0.00. The coupon code (BOM2023) will be valid until July 31, 2023, so Diane encourages all 2022-2023 members to use the code upon the release of the pattern each month. You will be required to enter your email address so the system can send you a link to download your file. The file will be available for an unlimited number of downloads.

QUILT TIPS

- Use parchment paper as a pressing cloth when doing appliqué to stop the ironing board and iron from getting glue on them.
- A washable lint roller works well to pick up threads from your ironing board and cutting mat.
- Belt hangers work great for hanging quilting rulers.
- Use a carpenter's T-square to square up quilts and to cut batting. It is 48" long and can make one cut on rolled batting.





CELERY GRATIN

½ cup butter, divided
6 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 cup whole milk
1 cup heavy whipping cream
¾ cup shredded Swiss cheese
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
Dash ground nutmeg
8 celery ribs, cut into 1-inch pieces
½ cup chopped celery leaves
6 slices white bread, crusts removed

Preheat oven to 375°. In a large saucepan, melt 6 tablespoons butter over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth; gradually whisk in milk and cream.

Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir until thickened, 3-4 minutes. Stir in cheese, salt, pepper and nutmeg until combined. Stir in celery and leaves; transfer to a greased 13x9-in. baking dish.

Tear bread into pieces and place in a food processor or blender. Cover and pulse until crumbs form. Transfer to a large bowl. Melt remaining 2 tablespoons butter. Drizzle over bread crumbs; toss to coat. Sprinkle over celery mixture.

Bake until bubbly and topping is golden brown, 25-30 minutes. If desired, sprinkle with additional celery leaves.

BUFFALO CHICKEN CELERY BOATS

⅓ cup Frank's Hot Sauce
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
Kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper
2 cups shredded rotisserie chicken
4 stalks celery, cut into 3" pieces
⅓ cup crumbled blue cheese
Ranch, for drizzling
Chives, for garnish

In a medium bowl, whisk together hot sauce and mayo and season with salt and pepper. Pour over shredded chicken and mix to combine.

Spoon chicken mixture into celery boats.

Top with blue cheese, drizzle with ranch and garnish with chives.

WALDORF SALAD

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

2 tablespoons plain yogurt (Greek or regular)
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup halved red grapes
1 cup chopped apples
1 cup sliced celery
¼ cup chopped parsley
Kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper
1 cup walnuts, toasted
Bibb lettuce, for serving

In a large bowl, whisk together mayonnaise, yogurt, and lemon juice.

Add grapes, apple, celery, and parsley and fold until just combined. Season with salt and pepper. Top with walnuts and serve over lettuce.

FENNEL-CELERY SALAD WITH BLUE CHEESE AND WALNUTS

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped walnuts

1 medium shallot, halved lengthwise, divided

2 tablespoons whole grain mustard

1 teaspoon sugar

 $^{1\!\!/_2}$ cup sherry vinegar or red wine vinegar, divided $^{1\!\!/_2}$ cup olive oil

Kosher salt, freshly ground pepper

6 dried Turkish figs, very coarsely chopped

1 fennel bulb, core removed, very thinly sliced

6-8 celery stalks, very thinly sliced

4 ounces blue cheese, crumbled

Preheat oven to 350°F. Toast walnuts on a rimmed baking sheet, tossing once, until golden brown, 5–8 minutes; let cool.

Finely chop 1 shallot half, then thinly slice the other half crosswise; set sliced shallot aside. Combine chopped shallot, mustard, sugar, and 1/4 cup vinegar in a resealable jar. Add oil and season with salt and pepper. Cover and shake to emulsify; set vinaigrette aside.

Toss figs, reserved sliced shallot, and remaining 1/4 cup vinegar in a small bowl; let sit until figs and shallots are softened, at least 30 minutes.

Just before serving, toss fennel, celery, blue cheese, and toasted walnuts in a large bowl. Drain figs and shallot and add to bowl. Drizzle with vinaigrette and toss to coat; season with salt and pepper.

Recipe Notes: Vinaigrette can be made 1 day ahead; cover and chill. Figs and shallot can be soaked 4 hours ahead; store covered at room temperature. Fennel and celery can be sliced 4 hours ahead; place in a large bowl. Cover with a damp paper towel and chill.
