QUILT TIPS

Guild funds available \$7,378.00

- When washing your material to test for coloring fastness, put in a plain piece of muslin. Even if the water turns color it doesn't mean that the dye will run. But, if the muslin picks up the color then you will know the color will attach itself to other fabric.
- For paper piecing, make all photocopies at the same time and on the same copier, if possible. Photocopiers can distort the image to some degree, and that's okay, but to minimize this distortion, always photocopy from the same original.
- For paper piecing, small stitches are important. Set your stitch length to 2.0mm and use a 90/14 needle. The combination of larger needle and small stitch length will make removing the papers easier.
- For paper piecing, fabric should be cut at least 1" larger than the area you are trying to cover. It does not have to be cut to the right shape, just larger than you need. You'll see our suggested patch sizes listed right on the foundation pattern.
- For paper piecing, lay paper pattern right side up on your surface to audition fabric over the sections and hold your paper pattern up to the light to make sure fabric is in the correct spot and will cover the area.
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!

UNCONVENTIONAL QUILTING TOOLS From the Quilting Hub

Chopsticks: These great little wooden tools are very helpful to "poke" out corners when turning stitched shapes.

Binder Clips: Those little (or not so little) black and silver colored clips are a great way to hold seams together that you don't want to pin and they also are great for holding bindings in place for your quilts.

Magnetic Tray: Those little bowls or trays are commonly found in automotive departments. They can be quite helpful to hold straight pins and safety pins near your workspace, but beware if you have a computerized machine or thumb-drive as the magnets can be quite powerful and may erase the memory in your devices.

Telescoping Magnet: This tool can also be found in the automotive section of many stores. Some even have an LED light. They can be great when you have lost your needle or pins on the floor and you can just swish the telescopic magnetic tool back and forth over the furniture or flooring to help locate the illusive items before you get stuck!

Flashlights: Flexible flashlights that wrap around things can be quite useful in your quilting studio to add extra light in just the right places. Sometimes they can wrap around your machine or even stick to it, other times you may want to wrap it around a curtain rod to light up your workspace.

Sandpaper: Sandpaper can be used to hold your fabric still while you write or draw on it. Or small dots of sandpaper can be glued to the back of rulers to help hold them in place while you are cutting.

Gardening Gloves: Gardening gloves with rubberized palms and tips can be very useful when free motion quilting to help you move your quilt around more easily. They can also be useful when trying to get a grip on a stubborn needle when hand quilting through thick seams. Vodka: Now I know you probably will not find this at

Vodka: Now I know you probably will not find this at the local quilt shop! But, some recipes for pressing sprays use "cheap" vodka. Others find it particularly helpful to "loosen-up" before free motion quilting.

Pool Noodles: Yes pool noodles those foam noodles that children and adult alike use to float around a pool are great for quilting. You can purchase a new one and wrap your quilt around it for transport so that it will not get creases. Some machine quilters also wrap their quilts around them to keep the excess fabric controlled while they are working on the other side of the quilt.

Rubber Finger Tips, Tweezers, Needle-Nosed Pliers, and Hemostats: Some of us have a hard time getting used to thimbles or have dexterity issues that make pulling needles through fabric more difficult and rubber finger tips can help. When those are not quite strong enough, tweezers, needle-nosed pliers, and hemostats (traditionally used for surgery) can be used.

TV Tray Tables: They are not just for eating anymore!

Wooden TV tray tables can be covered with batting and ironing board fabric and used as an extra pressing surface, or just a staging area beside your sewing machine. They are fairly inexpensive and a great takealong for additional workspace at retreats also.


Design Walls: Design walls can be fairly pricey when purchased for their intended use, but there are less expensive options. A flannel-backed tablecloth pinned or taped (with painters tape) to your wall will hold your blocks in place so that you may move them around and get the design just right. Another option is to purchase a piece of foam insulation and cover it with batting and flannel. This is a more "permanent" option if you have a dedicated stitching space.

Light Table Option: If you don't really have space for a dedicated tracing table, you can always just purchase a component. Removing a leaf from your dining table, place a lamp underneath the opening, and then place a piece of Plexiglas on top, and like magic, you have an instant light table that is great to use to trace your patterns.

Graph Paper/Freezer Paper: These papers are great to draw out new designs and color them in to see how your block will look after stitching.

Parchment Paper: When you want to protect your work surface from pressing sprays, adhesives, etc. Parchment paper can help you keep your work surface clean and dry. It can also act as a pressing sheet when in a pinch.

Extension Cords/Surge Protectors: Don't forget to purchase a good extension cord with a surge protector. Our irons and machines can call for a lot of power, and we have to protect them whether at home or on retreat, don't forget the surge protector!

ANOTHER QUILT TIP

When you are making half square triangles (HST) sew a SCANT $\frac{1}{4}$ inch from the center diagonal line so the fabric will have a bit more room to flip over when you press it. Most times you can cut your initial squares one inch larger (rather than the standard 7/8 inch) and then trim them down to the finished size + $\frac{1}{2}$ inch for the seam allowances.

YET MORE QUILT TIPS

- Take a plastic coffee stirring stick, and insert a little piece of pipe cleaner shaped into a loop. It is great for cleaning lint out of your sewing machine.
- Use leftover cotton batting for removing nail polish instead of cotton balls. It works great.



RECIPE CORNER

THE PERFECT GREEK SALAD

3 cups romaine lettuce, chopped

1 cup grape tomatoes (or cherry tomatoes)

1 cup red onion, chopped (roughly 1 small red onion)

(roughly 1 medium cucumber)

1 medium green pepper, chopped

1/4 cup whole Kalamata olives

¼ cup feta cheese, crumbled

Greek Salad Dressing

2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

1 + ½ tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice

½ teaspoon dried oregano

¼ teaspoon sea salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper (or more to taste)

In a large bowl, combine the romaine lettuce, cherry tomatoes, red onion, cucumber, olives and feta cheese.

In a small bowl, make the lemon Greek salad dressing by whisking together the olive oil, lemon juice, oregano, salt and pepper.

Pour dressing over the salad and toss to combine. Add more black pepper to taste.

SPINACH AND STRAWBERRY SALAD

Pecans:

2 tablespoons butter

1½ cups pecan halves

½ cup sugar

Melt butter and sugar in heavy skillet, stir in pecans and cook until coated and browned slightly (burns easily). Cool on waxed paper or foil.

Dressing:

²∕₃ cups white vinegar

½ cup sugar

2 teaspoons salt

2 teaspoons mustard (Dijon recommended)

3 - 4 scallions chopped

2 cups vegetable oil

2 teaspoons poppy seeds

Salad

1 pound fresh spinach, washed and thick stems removed, then torn

2 cups sliced celery

1 pint fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced

Assemble salad ingredients.

Dress and add pecans at last minute.

RECIPE NOTE: Dressing recipe makes too much for salad, so add to taste.

PASTA SALAD

1 pkg. (16-oz) rotini pasta, tri-color

1 cucumber, diced

1 tomato, diced

2 carrots, sliced

1 small stick pepperoni, sliced

6 slices ham, cubed

6 slices Swiss cheese, cubed

Olives (black or green), sliced

Radishes, sliced (optional)

1 sm. Bottle Zesty Italian dressing

1 tablespoon oregano

1 tablespoon Italian seasoning

1 tablespoon cheese salad seasoning

Dash of pepper

Cook and drain pasta according to package directions; set aside and let cool.

Add oregano, Italian seasoning and cheese salad seasoning to bottle of Italian dressing; shake well.

Toss pasta, vegetables, meats, and cheeses together. Pour dressing (with added spices) over pasta mixture. Toss thoroughly. Add pepper to taste. Marinate in refrigerator for at least 3 hours, overnight recommended. Toss before serving.

MAPLE BALSAMIC VINAIGRETTE

1 teaspoon dry mustard

½ teaspoon dried basil

3 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

2 tablespoons maple syrup

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 clove garlic, minced

1 cup extra virgin olive oil

1 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

In a small bowl, combine mustard, basil, garlic, salt, and pepper. Add vinegar, maple syrup and lemon juice. Whisk together. Add olive oil and whisk until emulsified.
