## FRANKLIN COUNTY QUILTERS GUILD May 18, 2022

President Laurel Schaap called the “in-person” meeting to order at 6:30 pm and welcomed those who were able to attend. There were 25 members present at the meeting, plus 5 guests; and 5 members were watching online.

John Rouleau moved to accept the Consent Agenda; seconded by Sharon Perry. Motion carried.

The meeting moved immediately into two special presentations. The 2022 Charity Quilt was presented to representatives from the Fairfax Community Theater Company. Denise Chase made the quilt which was quilted by Diane Comeau. Deb and Brenda, the Theater representatives explained their program.

The second presentation was made to Al Voegelé from the St. Albans Museum after a motion was made by Sharon Perry to donate the Covered Bridges Quilt to the museum. Cindy Metayer seconded the motion. The motion carried. The quilt had been won earlier and was returned to the FCQG when the original owner had no room to display the quilt and was moving out of state. Mr. Voegelé explained the museum and its function. He also asked for technical assistance in displaying the quilt. Suggestions were given to him. Sharon also stated that plans are in place to donate (in digital format) the pattern for the Covered Bridge quilt to the St. Albans Museum.

**Programs:** Cindy Metayer explained the June meeting where Barbara and David Morgan will discuss and display vintage sewing machines.

### Comfort Quilts:

- Denise Chase again mentioned that members are making quilts from their own stash which is wonderful. She does have fabric if anyone needs some to complete a quilt.
- Sharon Perry moved that the Comfort Quilt coordinator be allowed to purchase items for comfort quilts as needed in amounts over \$100 once the coordinator has consulted with the Treasurer. Jean Anne Branch seconded the motion. The motion carried.
- Denise also mentioned that John Rouleau has ordered labels and has donated them.
- Denise also noted that someone has called to donate fabric for breast cancer comfort quilts. After some discussion, Denise will accept the donation.

**Quilt Show:** Anyone wishing to submit a Vermont Home Challenge Quilt will find the submission form on the website.

- Raffle tickets need to be given to Sharon Perry by the June meeting.

- Penny LaRochelle will help with raffle tickets at the July 23 Art in the Park program.

- John volunteered to sell tickets at the St. Albans Bay Farmer’s Market. Denise Chase offered to help.

**2023 Raffle Quilt:** Penny LaRochelle is planning a sewing bee next month for the 2023 Raffle Quilt.

**Membership:** Membership remains at 62.

- Two members shared their complete tops—Gale Weld and Teri Brunelle. Teri’s quilt was totally complete.

The meeting moved to the program for the evening—a beautiful trunk show by our President, Laurel Schaap.

The program was followed by Show and Tell with Comfort Quilt door prize awarded to Cathy Carlson and General Membership door prize awarded to Mary Ellen Therrien.

Sharon Perry moved to adjourn the meeting at 8:15 pm. John Rouleau seconded the motion. The motion carried.

If it’s a sunny day, the quilts will be arranged on clothesline near our canopy. If it’s rainy, the quilts will be inside our large canopy with the 3 sides down. The quilts will be numbered and ballots will be printed so viewers can vote for their favorite quilt. The 2022 raffle quilt will also be on display and tickets will be available to sell.

The deadline for entering your Challenge Quilt is now July 1. Entry form, found [here](#), with pictures can be sent to Helen Short, 12 Burnell Terrace, St. Albans, VT 05478, or emailed as attachments to [hshortvt@comcast.net](mailto:hshortvt@comcast.net). If you have not purchased the green fabric that must be utilized in the quilt, call 802-752-5497 to purchase a piece for \$1. The green fabric must be used in the quilt.

The maximum size of the quilt is 96” inches in perimeter. As such, your quilt could be 24” x 24” or 12” x 36” or any size where the total measurement of all 4 sides added together is 96” or less.

## RECIPE CORNER

### CHOCOLATE COVERED STRAWBERRY DREAM BARS

28 Chocolate Oreos with filling divided  
4 tablespoons butter melted  
3.9 ounces instant chocolate fudge pudding  
1½ cups milk  
6 ounces cream cheese, room temperature  
½ cup confectioners' sugar  
½ teaspoon pure vanilla extract  
8 Oz. Cool Whip  
21 oz. can Strawberry Fruit Filling or Topping divided  
⅓ cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

Prepare an 8 X 8-inch baking dish by lining it with parchment, if desired. This will allow you to lift the bars out of the pan and cut them evenly into squares.

Melt the butter in a medium microwavable bowl, and place 20 of the Oreo cookies with filling into a blender or food processor to crush into fine crumbs. Add the crumbs to the butter and mix well.

Place the cookie mixture into the pan and spread to the sides, patting down to even it out. Place into the freezer to set for a minimum of 30 minutes.

In a medium bowl, mix the pudding with the 1½ cups of milk. DO NOT use 2 cups of milk as is called for on the package. We want the consistency of the pudding to be thicker and not runny. Place into the fridge to set.

In a mixing bowl, beat the cream cheese until smooth. Scrape down the bowl and add the confectioners' sugar and vanilla extract. Beat again until completely mixed. With a rubber spatula, mix in 1½ cups of the Cool Whip, and mix well.

Remove the crust from the freezer and place dollops of the cheesecake filling onto the crust. Spread the filling evenly to all sides of the pan.

Using 1 cup of the Strawberry Fruit Filling or Topping, place spoonfuls over the cheesecake layer and gently spread. Put dollops of the pudding on top of the strawberry filling and spread evenly to all edges of the pan. Place dollops of remaining Cool Whip on top and spread to completely cover. Place into the freezer for a minimum of two hours before serving.

Using the remaining strawberry fruit filling, put spoonfuls around the top of the whipped and cream and spread as best you can. Remove the bars by lifting the parchment out of the pan. Place the remaining 8 Oreos into a plastic bag and crumble them. Sprinkle them on top of the dessert.

In a small microwavable bowl, melt the chocolate chips for 30 seconds. Stir, and microwave for an additional 10 seconds and again if needed, stirring in between until chips are completely melted. Drizzle over the crushed Oreos and strawberry topping.

### STRAWBERRY CAKE WITH STRAWBERRY ICING

1 package white cake mix  
3 oz. package strawberry Jell-o  
4 large eggs  
½ cup sugar  
¼ cup flour  
½ cup finely chopped strawberries  
1 cup vegetable oil  
½ cup milk  
1 cup butter, softened  
32 oz. powdered sugar  
1 cup finely chopped strawberries

Beat cake mix and next 7 ingredients until well mixed, stopping to scrape down sides. Pour batter into 3 greased and floured 9" pans.

Bake at 350 for 23 minutes or until tester comes out clean. Cool on wire racks completely before frosting.

#### Frosting:

Beat butter until fluffy. Add powdered sugar and chopped strawberries. Beat thoroughly. Makes about 2½ cups. Frost cake as desired.

### STRAWBERRY GINGER SMASH

1½ oz. vodka  
½ oz. ginger liquor  
3-4 strawberries

2 lemon wedges  
3 oz. ginger beer  
Soda

Muddle strawberries, lemon, vodka and liquor in a glass. Fill with ice and add ginger beer and soda. Stir and enjoy!

## QUILT TIPS

- Remember to clean and de-lint your machine, as well as change your needle after each project or every 8-10 hours of sewing.
- When threading a sewing machine manually, slip a piece of white paper behind the eye of the needle so that you can see it easily.
- Cut thread on a 45-degree angle for easier needle threading.
- Take a picture of your layout before starting to piece.
- When stitching a straight edge to a bias edge, stitch with the bias next to the feed dogs so it won't stretch out of shape.
- Chocolate is a necessary quilting notion!


