Franklin County Quilters Guild Wednesday, May 15, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:33 PM by Laurel Schaap for our monthly in-person meeting.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Sharon Perry and 2nd by Penny LaRochelle to accept both the Treasurer's report and Minutes of the April 2024 meeting. No discussion. Motion carried.

2024 Charity Quilts were given to the non-profit recipients for fundraising:

- Representatives from three non-profits graciously accepted their quilts:
 - o The Meeting House on the Green in East Fairfield, represented by Nance Shaw, the guilt made by Helen Short and Denise Chase
 - o The Enosburg Food Shelf, represented by Nancy Riley and Sue Stanley, the quilt made by Gale Weld and Laurel Schaap
 - o Rock Steady Boxing in St. Albans to benefit patients with Parkinson's Disease, represented by Donna and Scott Corrigan, the quilt made by Lucie Fortin and Helen Bicknell.
- Sharon Perry shared information about selling tickets for the raffles (try Raffletickets.com). If the organizations know where and when the raffle tickets for the quilts will be available, the guild can put the information into the monthly newsletter for their members.

Chair Reports:

Membership (Penny LaRochelle): Penny reported that we have 62 paid members to date. A total of 34 members were in attendance, with 5 guests to accept the raffle quilts and one guest for the meeting.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase): Denise brought some quilt kits for people to take. There are currently 81 quilts that need quilting. Lauretta has been making many quilt tops and has helped Denise put backs and batting with them. Please sign out the quilt kits and quilts to be finished so that Denise can keep track of them. Members are welcome to contact Denise to pick up a kit or quilt from her at her home in St. Albans.

Quilt Show (Helen Short and Teri Brunelle):

- A big "Thank you!" to Helen Short and Teri Brunelle for all they did as co-chairs for this year's successful quilt
- Helen thanked all of the volunteers who helped out. The setup and takedown went quickly. Everyone's efforts are
- Sharon Perry reported on some numbers from this year's show:
 - o Number of quilts entered: 110
 - o Number of attendees counted: 784
 - o Raffle quilt proceeds: \$2,872 (which was the 2nd highest ever! In 2013, the covered bridge raffle quilt brought in more)
 - o Boutique net proceeds: \$787
 - o Sponsors: 17 sponsors brought in \$2,450
 - o Vendors: 5 vendors brought in \$250

- o Donations: \$596
- Laurel Schaap asked for members to consider volunteering to be chairpersons for next year's quilt show.
- Penny LaRochelle volunteered to do the layout and design of the show again next year. Thank you, Penny!
- Laurel generously donated a quilt top for the 2025 Raffle quilt. Diane Comeau will quilt it. The raffle quilt will be taken to Farmer's Markets, etc. for ticket sales and the drawing will be at next year's quilt show.

Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry): The newsletter can be found online here. Each newsletter comes out at least 2 weeks before each meeting. Items for the next newsletter are due to Sharon by May 29th, which is the last Wednesday of the month. A recommendation was made to include the scarf patterns in the newsletter.

BARN QUILT EXHIBIT AT BILLINGS FARM & MUSEUM FEATURES FCOG'S OWN

Billings Farm & Museum is bringing the rural artistry of barn quilts to its scenic site from April 4 – December 1, 2024. Collaborating with Vermont artists as well as artisans from the Chelsea Barn Quilt Project and the Franklin County Barn Quilt Trail who have been working to highlight barn quilts in Vermont, each space will host a uniquely crafted piece inspired by nature, math, agriculture, and the history of the Billings Farm site.

The guild's own, Sharon Perry, is one of the featured barn quilt artists at this exhibit. For her barn quilt, she has painted 4 maple leaf blocks set on point. The center of the 4 blocks features the stylized face of a Holstein cow affectionately called Bessie. The formal name of Sharon's submission is "Moo-nlight in Vermont."

USES FOR BATTING SCRAPS

Everyone has them...batting scraps...but what can you do with those leftover batting scraps? Read on for some ideas.

- Rough cut a 9 x 12 rectangle to use in your Swiffer.
 As bonus, you can turn it over and use the other side too!
- Cut into 5" squares to use to make coasters.
- Use small odd shaped pieces to dust with.
- Use small piece of batting at your sewing table to collect loose threads.
- Use another small piece at the ironing station to collect threads that you trim off while ironing.
- Use them to pretest thread tension settings by sandwiching pieces between muslin trimmings, cutting them into squares of 6-10 inches.
- Donate the batting scraps to your local senior center to use to make small crafts.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM): DISAPPEARING HALF SQUARE TRIANGLE BLOCK

Lucie Fortin is the project coordinator for this membership year, and she's bringing back the traditional Block of the Month (BOM) projects.

Each month Lucie will provide instructions for completing the BOM to include color choices. This month's BOM is the Mystery Disappearing Pinwheel Block in blue and white; instructions for the block can be found here. Members are encouraged to make a block each month and turn it in for the BOM raffle the following month.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times. If you win all the blocks, they are yours to keep.

You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.

RECIPE CORNER

STRAWBERRY FOOL

1pint strawberries
½ cup sugar, or to taste
1cup heavy cream
1teaspoon vanilla extract

Hull strawberries, then wash them and chop into ¼-inch-thick pieces. Toss with half the sugar, and wait 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, until they give up their juices.

Place half the strawberries and all the juice in a blender, and puree. Pour puree back in bowl with chopped strawberries.

Whip the cream with remaining sugar and vanilla until cream is stiff and holds peaks easily. Fold berries and cream together, and serve immediately, or refrigerate for up to two hours.

STRAWBERRY CRISP

5 heaping cups strawberries, hulled and quartered

1/4 cup granulated white sugar

l teaspoon vanilla extract

3 tablespoons cornstarch

1 cup all-purpose flour

34 cup old fashioned oats

²/₃ cup granulated white sugar

²∕₃ cup packed brown sugar

½ teaspoon salt

3/4 teaspoon cinnamon

½ cup (1 stick) butter, melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a deep dish pie plate or large baking dish with butter or cooking spray and set aside.

Combine the chopped strawberries and sugar in a large bowl and mix until the strawberries fully absorb the sugar. Add in the cornstarch and vanilla extract and stir until all of the strawberries are evenly coated. Pour into the prepared baking dish.

In a separate medium size bowl, combine the flour, oats, brown sugar, granulated sugar, salt, and cinnamon. Pour in the melted butter and stir well until well coated and crumbly. Sprinkle the crumb mixture evenly over the top of the strawberries.

Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes until fruit is bubbly and topping is golden brown. Allow to cool slightly before serving. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream on top.



STRAWBERRY CREPES

For the crepes:

4 large eggs

1/3 cup butter, softened

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup granulated sugar

1 cup all-purpose flour

11/4 cups milk

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

¼ teaspoon salt

For the filling:

2 cups fresh strawberries, sliced

4 ounces cream cheese, room temperature

¼ cup powdered sugar

½ teaspoon vanilla extract

1 pint heavy whipping cream

3 tablespoons powdered sugar

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

<u>For the crepes</u>: Add all ingredients to a blender and blend until smooth. Scrape down the sides of the blender if needed. Refrigerate batter for 30 minutes.

Heat a large non-stick skillet to medium heat. When skillet is hot, lightly grease it with a little butter or cooking spray.

Hold the handle of the skillet and as you pour a few tablespoons of batter in, tilt the skillet around in a circular motion to allow the batter to evenly coat the bottom of the pan, in a thin layer.

Cook for 30 - 60 seconds or until the edges of the crepe curl slightly and the bottom of the crepe is lightly golden. Flip to the other side and cook for another 30 seconds. (Adjust your heat between medium-medium high until your crepes are cooking in about 30 seconds on each side. Re-grease your pan every few crepes, as needed.)

Remove crepe to a plate. Add more crepes to the plate as you cook them, and cover the plate to keep them warm.

For the filling: In a small bowl mix blend the cream cheese, powdered sugar, and vanilla until for 2 minutes. In another mixing bowl, beat the heavy cream and 3 tablespoons powdered sugar on high speed until stiff peaks.

Spoon most of the whipped cream into the cream cheese mixture and fold in until smooth. Reserve a little bit of whipped cream for topping on the crepes, if desired. Spoon a thin layer of the filling onto a crepe. Add some fresh strawberries on top and then roll it up. Serve dusted with powdered sugar, extra strawberries and whipped cream, if desired.
