Minutes for General Membership Meeting Wednesday, May 14, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 6:32 pm by Jean Anne Branch for our monthly meeting. She greeted all members in attendance with a warm welcome. She then told a short story about Hummingbirds to include several facts and ended with a Native American reading entitled, "Healer Between Heart Beats".

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Denise Chase and seconded by Bonnie Evans to accept the April 9th Secretary's Report and the May Treasurer's Report. All in favor, motion carried.

Presentation of Charity Quilt: The 2025 Charity Quilt is for the Commission of St. Johns in Highgate. Kay Benedict and Sandy Kenyon, Chair of the Commission to restore and vitalize St. John's Church, arrived to receive the quilt. Kay shared information about their restoration plans as well as ongoing and future programs. Kay and Sandy both thanked the group for their generous donation to support their cause. They have yet to organize a raffle. They were both welcomed to return to the guild to sell tickets should they decide.

Mary Jane Ross proceeded: Announcements:

- Cathy announced they will be distributing brown bags with completed projects to each member during the presentation, with a reminder not to open the bag until the end of the meeting.
- June program will include a "Trunk Sale" in the left side parking lot. Also a potluck. Bring a cold or warm dish to share.
- Cathy introduced our guest speaker, Jess Peck of Vermont Modern Quilters Guild. Jess announced that her Aunt owns Yankee Pride Quilt Shop in Essex Jct. Jess has been a quilter for 14 years. She presented some background on modern quilts. The Vermont Modern Quilters Guild started in 2013. They meet at the Vermont Commons School, 75 Green Mountain Drive in South Burlington. All are welcome to attend a meeting. Information about the guild is located on their website as well as FB. She presented many completed block examples as traditional and then with a modern take of that traditional block. Very inspirational!

Block of the Month (BOM) (Carol Stanley):

- Carol Stanley presented a sample of the June BOM called "Baby Kisses" by Missouri Star Quilt Company. You should make 4 blocks, sew them together resulting in a 9½" block using scraps with a white corner piece.
- Instructions will be posted on the FCQG website under "Projects".
- Maggie Stockwell pointed out there's also a YouTube video tutorial by MSQC. You can find that video here.
- Members are encouraged to bring completed blocks to the June meeting.
- May BOM: Approximately 114 blocks. Winner: Alice Bushey
- It was announced that one paper copy of the BOM will be set on each table during the meetings. You can take a picture of the printed copy for reference. This will save on cost and an excess of printed copies.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase):

- Many thanks to guild members for donating several quilts building our inventory!
- Special thanks to Sally Krupp for machine quilting so many of the comfort quilts!
- Kits available to be taken. Some for piecing and some to be quilted.
- Comfort quilt labels available for pick up.

- Donation of quilts to Women's Shelter Voices Against Violence, St. Albans – 5 twins (Moms), 2 baby, 4 toddler, 1 for an 11-yr old girl. Each quilt donated will go with each individual.



SHALL I KEEP MY SCRAPS? (From the Quilting Hub)

Did you know? You don't have to keep ALL your quilting scraps! It's true, but have you been unsure which ones to keep, which to use to make new quilts, and which ones to donate for charity projects?

Keeper Scraps: If you have made a quilt for a loved one that gets used and washed regularly, it is a great idea to keep the quilt scraps so that if accidents occur you can fix that special comfy quilt. This is especially a good idea if the quilt was made for a baby or small child that may ultimately hold onto their quilt for many years using it as a "lovey" and dragging it with them wherever they may go. These quilts get lots of time in the washer and dryer and are subject to developing "character" over the years especially if there is a four-legged friend in the house. Those preserved scraps might be just what are needed to give those well-loved quilts a bit more life and cover a few of the scars that it develops over time.

Scraps to Use: If you have accumulated a large number of scraps from quilting projects that you have made and sold, or gifted to charities, these are perfect for use in another quilt. Also, scraps that are left over from small projects like wall hangings, masks, and table runners are fair game to use to make another item of beauty as they are much less likely to be needed for repairs to small projects.

Scraps to Donate: If your scrap assortment contains lots of "odd" color fabrics or ones that don't coordinate well with your other fabrics, these may be perfect for donation to charity quilts, dog bed fillers, cat mats, etc. in some cases charities will purposefully ask for "ugly" quilts so that they will not be fought over when they are given away to the homeless. Small scraps are great for use in dog beds and since they will not be seen, it makes no difference what colors or sizes they are.

The most important thing to remember is that your scraps can be used, so there is no reason to throw them ALL away. Keep them for potential repair of lovies, make a new quilt that is a great collection of memories from past projects, or bless others by using your scraps for donations.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM)


The block featured at the May meeting is called Baby Kisses; instructions for the block can be found <u>here</u>. Carol Stanley, this year's Project Coordinator for the guild, says to use white on white fabric for the smaller squares and medium to dark scrap prints for the 5" squares. Bring your blocks to the June meeting.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times.

You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.

RECIPE CORNER

CHOCOLATE-COVERED STRAWBERRY CHEESECAKE

For the cheesecake:

Cooking spray

21/4 cups graham cracker

6 tablespoons salted butter, melted

11/4 cups plus 2 tablespoons granulated sugar, divided

1 cup coarsely chopped fresh strawberries

4 (8-oz.) packages cream cheese, softened

 $2\ table spoons\ all-purpose\ flour$

 $4~{\rm large~eggs}$

1 large egg yolk

1 tablespoon grated lemon zest (from 1 large lemon)

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 to 2 drops soft pink food coloring gel

For the chocolate ganache:

6 ounces semisweet chocolate chips (about 1 cup)

1/4 cup salted butter

4 teaspoons light corn syrup

½ teaspoon vanilla extract

Fresh strawberries (about 2 cups total) for garnish

For the cheesecake:

Preheat oven to 325°F. Lightly coat a 9-inch spring form pan with cooking spray. Wrap outside of pan with heavy-duty aluminum foil. Stir together graham cracker crumbs, melted butter, and 2 tablespoons of the sugar in a medium bowl. Press mixture on bottom and 1 inch up sides of prepared pan. Bake in preheated oven until set, 7 to 8 minutes. Transfer to a wire rack; cool completely, about 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, process chopped strawberries in a food processor until completely smooth, about 1 minute, stopping to scrape down sides as needed.

Beat cream cheese with a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment on medium speed until creamy, 1 to 2 minutes. Gradually add flour and remaining 1 1/4 cups sugar, beating until smooth, about 1 minute. Add whole eggs, 1 at a time, beating on low speed just until blended after each addition (do not overbeat). Add egg yolk, and beat just until incorporated. Beat in zest, strawberry puree, and 2 teaspoons vanilla on low speed just until combined. Gently stir in food coloring gel until desired shade is reached. Pour batter into prepared pan, and place on a large rimmed baking sheet.

Bake in preheated oven just until center is set, 1 hour and 10 minutes to 1 hour and 20 minutes. Turn oven off, and let cheesecake stand in oven, with door closed, 15 minutes. Remove cheesecake from oven, and gently run a knife around outer edge of cheesecake to loosen from sides of pan. (Do not remove sides of pan.) Cool completely in pan on a wire rack, about 2 hours. Cover and chill 8 to 24 hours.

For the chocolate ganache:

Place chocolate chips, butter, and corn syrup in a small microwavable bowl. Microwave on medium (50%) power until melted and smooth, 1 to 2 minutes, stirring every 30 seconds. Stir in ½ teaspoon vanilla.

Remove sides of pan, and transfer cheesecake to a serving platter. Pour chocolate ganache over top of cake, spreading to edges using a small offset spatula and allowing some to drip down sides. Chill cheesecake until ganache is firm, about 20 minutes. Garnish cake with whole and halved fresh strawberries.

FROZEN STRAWBERRY LEMONADE

1 (12 oz.) container frozen lemonade

1 cup frozen strawberries

1 teaspoon sugar

1 teaspoon lemon zest

1 cup ice

11/4 cups club soda, divided

Fresh strawberries and lemon slices for garnish


In a small bowl, combine frozen strawberries with sugar; let sit for at least 10 minutes.

In a blender, combine frozen lemonade, ice, lemon zest, and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup club soda; blend until smooth. Transfer to a pitcher; set aside.

In the clean blender, combine strawberries and ¾ cup club soda; blend until smooth.

Layer frozen strawberries and lemon slush in cups. Stir to gently combine.

Garnish cups with strawberries and a lemon slice.
