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Franklin County Quilters Guild Wednesday, September 20, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 6:45 pm by Laurel Schaap, President, who thanked the members for the successful Potluck.

The meeting was called to order at 6:03 PM by Laurel Schaap, President-elect, with an invitation to participate in the ice cream social.

Motion to accept slate of officers made by Helen Short, 2nd by Sharon Perry. Discussion (none). Motion carried. Motion for Secretary to cast one ballot for the slate of officers as presented made by Deb Trahan, second Jean Ann Branch. Congratulations to the newly-elected guild officers and chairs!

Consent Agenda: Treasurer's report and Minutes of June 2023 meeting; a motion was made by Sharon Perry and 2nd by John Rouleau to accept both Treasurer's report and June meeting minutes. Discussion of correcting the levels of sponsorship for the Quilt Show: Silver from "\$100-299" to "\$100-199". A motion was made to accept the corrected minutes by Jean Ann Branch, 2nd by Sharon Perry. Motions carried.

<u>Membership</u> (Penny LaRochelle): Penny LaRochelle reported the guild has 44 paid members to date, with 4 new members present at tonight's (September 20th, 2023) meeting. A total of 39 members were in attendance.

Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase):

- There are many quilt kits available, some "sew kits," some "need quilting kits," and some kits that have cut fabric pieces that need to be sewn together. There is a need for at least one queen or a full quilt to be available for donation as the need arises. Large lap quilts are also needed.
- There are several organizations who accept our donated quilts, including Home Health (lap quilts), Welcome Home Project (queen, full, or twin) [Welcome Home is run by several churches for homeless people who are going into a house. They give kits that include household items such as mop, broom, and a quilt], Spectrum Youth & Family Services (we haven't had requests from Spectrum

lately), and Linus Project (we have given to the Linus Project when we have extra quilts to donate).

<u>Quilt Show (Helen Short and Teri Brunelle)</u>:

- Helen showed off the new show banner that has our quilt guild logo and the 2024 dates (April 6th and 7th). It will be hung on the fence at the Peoples Trust Company in St. Albans.
- Fundraising for the Quilt Show: letters are ready to go out to area businesses to ask for donations toward our costs related to the Quilt Show (rental of City Hall, insurance, etc.) Helen Short handed out letters to members who have a personal connection with someone at the business and are willing to give the letter to a person at that business.
- Penny LaRochelle reported that there is one quilt registration for next year's show! Please read the FCQG newsletter online to see the quilt show meeting minutes. Quilt show registration form can be found <u>here</u>.
- There is a need for a Quilt Show volunteer coordinator and a volunteer to decorate City Hall's lobby for the weekend of the Quilt Show.
- Sponsorship forms are available from Nanc Ekiert if anyone would like to be a sponsor of the show. Ribbons are available for the sponsors to award to a quilt of their choice at the show. The quilt show cards/brochures will have the sponsors' names listed.
- Sharon Perry reported that Common Threads Quilt Guild in Hyde Park, VT, has a storage shed with extra room. At Common Threads' next meeting (2nd Thursday in October), they will discuss whether the FCQG would be able to rent space in their storage unit for \$40/month at Sterling View in Hyde Park. We would be able to have all of our show supplies in one location. Vermont Quilt Festival may have horizontal poles to give us, although we would need to make or rent the stands and the uprights.
- Discussion about how the FCQG doesn't charge people to attend the annual Quilt Show, it's part of what the FCQG's founding members wanted, to make sure people have access to quilts and learn about quilt making. John Rouleau noted that this free admission to the annual show should be mentioned in the sponsorship letters.

2024 Raffle Quilt (Sharon Perry and Denise Chase): This year's Raffle Quilt is being made by Denise Chase and Sharon Perry. The raffle quilt will be brought to a few events over the next 6 months by guild members, and raffle tickets will be sold.

2024 Charity Quilt (Laurel Schaap and Gale Weld):

• This year's Charity Raffle Quilt is made by Gale and Laurel. The recipient will be voted on at a future guild meeting. Enosburg Food Shelf will be writing a letter of interest and possibly The Meeting House on the Green in East Fairfield will submit a letter of interest.

September 20 Guild Meeting Minutes (Cont.)

• If a member knows of a non-profit who may be interested in submitting a letter to the guild to receive a quilt to raffle as a fundraiser (and has the capacity to fundraise a substantial amount of money for themselves), is welcome to bring in a letter from the non-profit.

Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry): The newsletter can be found online <u>here</u>. Each newsletter comes out at least 2 weeks prior to each meeting. Items for the next newsletter are due to Sharon by September 27th.

23 in 2023 Challenge (Sharon Perry): Reminder to complete the form found in the newsletter of the 23 items you have/are completing in 2023. There will be a drawing of prizes for participants who turn in their forms to Sharon Perry at the end of 2023.

Block of the Month (Lucie Fortin): This year's project is a Block of the Month. Quilter Brita Nelson inspired Lucie with the Disappearing Four Patch pattern. If a member wants to share their quilt blocks at future meetings, use the colors yellow and blue. If you'd like to make your own quilt (keep the squares), you may use whatever colors you'd like. Lucie Fortin is the project coordinator for this membership year, and she's bringing back the traditional Block of the Month (BOM) projects.

Each month Lucie will provide instructions for completing the BOM to include color choices. You can only win the blocks one time in a membership year which runs from September through June. If you win, you're asked to continue making the monthly BOM so the other winners have a similar number of blocks.



PUMPKIN CHARLOTEE

RECIPE

CORNER

2 packages (3 ounces each) ladyfingers, split

- 6 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2¹/₄ cups heavy whipping cream, divided
- 3 tablespoons confectioners' sugar, divided

1 cup cold 2% milk

2 packages (3.4 ounces each) instant vanilla pudding mix

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

¹/₄ teaspoon ground ginger

1/4 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

1 can (15 ounces) solid-pack pumpkin Additional ground cinnamon

Arrange split ladyfingers on the bottom and upright around the sides of an ungreased 9-in. spring-form pan, trimming to fit if necessary. Set aside.

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese and sugar until smooth. In a small bowl, beat 1-3/4 cups whipping cream and 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar until stiff peaks form. Set 1/2 cup aside. Fold remaining whipped cream into cream cheese mixture. Spread into prepared pan.

In a bowl, combine the milk, pudding mixes and spices; beat on low speed for 1 minute. Add pumpkin; beat 1 minute longer. Fold in reserved whipped cream. Pour over cream cheese layer. Cover and refrigerate for 8 hours or overnight.

Just before serving, beat remaining cream and confectioners' sugar until stiff peaks form. Spoon over pumpkin layer. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Remove sides of pan. Refrigerate leftovers.

DARK CHOCOLATE PUMPKIN TRUFFLES

⅔ cup reduced-fat cream cheese ½ cup confectioners' sugar

- ⁷/₃ cup canned pumpkin
- 1 togen og numphin nig g
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- $1\ package\ (10\ ounces)\ dark\ chocolate\ chips$

In a small bowl, beat cream cheese and confectioners' sugar until blended. Beat in pumpkin, pie spice and vanilla. Stir in cracker crumbs. Freeze, covered, 20 minutes or until firm enough to shape.

Shape pumpkin mixture into 1-in. balls; place on waxed paper-lined baking sheets. Freeze 20 minutes or until firm.

In a microwave, melt chocolate; stir until smooth. Dip truffles in chocolate; allow excess to drip off. Return to baking sheets; refrigerate until set. Store in airtight containers in the refrigerator.

SAUSAGE & RICE-STUFFED PUMPKINS

3 small pie pumpkins (about 2 pounds each)
½ pound bulk sweet Italian sausage
1 pound fresh mushrooms, chopped
2 medium onions, chopped
1 medium green pepper, chopped
2 garlic cloves, minced
4 cups cooked long grain rice
1 cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided
2 large eggs, lightly beaten
¼ cup minced fresh parsley
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon dried thyme

Preheat oven to 450° . Cut a 3-in. circle around each pumpkin stem. Remove tops and set aside. Remove strings and seeds from pumpkins; discard seeds or save for roasting.

In a large skillet, cook sausage, vegetables and garlic over medium heat 6-8 minutes or until sausage is no longer pink, breaking up sausage into crumbles; drain. Remove from heat; stir in rice, 3/4 cup cheese, eggs, parsley, salt and thyme.

Place pumpkins in a 15x10x1-in. baking pan; fill with rice mixture. Replace pumpkin tops. Bake 30 minutes.

Reduce oven setting to 350°. Bake 25-35 minutes longer or until pumpkin is tender when pierced with a knife and a thermometer inserted in filling reads 160°. Sprinkle remaining cheese over filling. Cut to serve.
