Minutes from the General Meeting

Wednesday, September 10, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 pm by Jean Anne Branch for our monthly meeting. She greeted all members in attendance with a warm welcome. She then told the group about some research on "What does it take to live to 100 and beyond??" by Julianne Holt-Lundstad. After conducting studies on tens of thousands of middle agers, she determined that the top two factors were #1 Social Interaction throughout the day, especially other than your closest people, and #2 Close Relationships with those who will be there for you when you are in need. Weight and exercise are numbers 3 and 4. Very interesting and great information!

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Nanc Ekiert and seconded by Carol Parks to accept the June 11th Secretary and Treasurer Reports. All in favor, motion carried.

Mary Jane Rossi proceeded by announcing that they will be trying to funnel people through the sign in process to help make sure everyone is signed in and has put in entries for the door prize and other drawing. In addition, this will help everyone be more aware of what we do and feel involved.

Jean Anne Branch proceeded: Announcements:

- Jean Anne noted that Sharon has started selling raffle tickets and has several venues set up to sell tickets at. She also noted that there have not yet been any requests for the charity quilt yet. Asked members to think about it and to spread the word to organizations that may have a need. Sharon Perry confirmed that the booklet on the website has a list of all of the former recipients.
- There will be a Quilt Show on June 18, 19 & 20, 2026 at the DoubleTree in Burlington. Entry is free. FCQG will be showcased as one of the guilds. Different FCQG quilts will be displayed at our booth.
- Sharon Perry announced that she had made changes to the Member's booklet for the changes this year and has tidied up the Bylaws. Scott Perry will be posting a PDF of the Bylaws and new Standing Rules on the website. They will also be linked in the newsletter. We will be discussing these documents in October and will be voting in November.

Quilt Show (Beth Mouser/Diane Kane):

- Beth and Diane met with the quilt chairs. The theme for the 2026 challenge quilt will be "Celebrating America" in deference to the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
- Peggy Paradee started circulating the volunteer signup sheet. We must sign up by the December meeting since there will be no meetings in January and February.

<u>Comfort Quilts</u> (<u>Denise Chase</u>): Denise announced that she is down to zero baby quilts. She brought lots of items that could be chosen to work on. Please help yourself to the kits. Don't forget to sign out when you take or return something.

Programs (Helen Short, Cathy Carlson):

• Helen described today's program "Snip, Rip, Drop & Pass." Each person started with 1 yard of batik fabric and after

- snipping, ripping, dropping and passing, each person ended up with 7 different pieces of batik. We will bring the project that we made to the October 2026 meeting for a show and tell
- In October, Stripology Instructor from Merrimack, NH, will be joining us. She will be telling us about the stripology rulers and how they can be used. Please note that this meeting will be on Friday, October 17th at Holy Trinity in Swanton. On Saturday, October 18th there will be a workshop for the quilt "Zoe" out of the Stripology Mixology 3 Book. Workshop will start at 9am; doors open at 8:30am for setup. Workshop ends at 4:30pm with time for lunch. Reminder rulers and books cannot be shared in the class but if you know someone you could borrow from, that is fine, it's just that each person needs a book and a ruler. Workshop is \$25. Send checks to Deb Dusablon.
- Also, in October, Cathy said that they will be handing out brown bags to each of us which we will bring back in November filled with a panel and a yard of coordinating fabric. In November, they will be exchanged and will be due back in November 2026 with a completed project.

Membership (Penny LaRochelle): Penny announced 50 paid members, including one lifetime member, no guests and we had 4 new members: Carly Williams, Gladys Barnes, Monica Kelley and Deborah Dolby. Present at meeting: 47

Block of the Month (BOM) (Sandy Lane):

- Sandy Lane presented a sample of the September Block of the Month called "Corn and Beans."
- Instructions will be posted on the FCQG under "Projects." You will need 2 10" squares, one white on white and a print. In addition you will need 5" squares of white on white and a print. This can be scrappy. Members are encouraged to bring completed blocks to the October meeting.
- June BOM: There were 37 blocks that are each fairly large so Sandy drew two names. Winners: Gladys Barns and Penny LaRochelle..
- It was announced that one paper copy of the BOM will be set on each table at future meetings. You can take a picture of the printed copy for reference. This will save on cost and an excess of printed copies.

STRIPOLOGY TRUNK SHOW & WORKSHOP IN OCTOBER

The October meeting will be held on Friday, October 17th, at the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church on 38 Grand Avenue in Swanton. There is parking on both sides of Grand Avenue and in the back of the church there is a municipal parking lot. The program will be a trunk show by Linda Leszcynski, a certified Stripology instructor from Merrimack, NH. On the 18th there will be a workshop on the Stripology quilt pattern, Zoe. There are a few openings left. The cost of registration is \$25. If interested please contact Helen Short at hshortvt49@gmail.com.

This past year Holy Trinity started a diaper and wipe ministry. People in need of diapers and wipes may come to the church's Parish Hall on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10-1. The program has been very successful and has expanded to include personal care products, feminine hygiene supplies, toilet paper, and baby blankets. Participants have found listening ears and have been assisted with solving personal problems by the caring people who volunteer. This program has been a rewarding 'boots on the ground' ministry. If you would like to contribute diapers (biggest needs are pullups), wipes, feminine hygiene or personal care products, there will be a table set up to receive them at the October meeting and workshop.

You can also pick up your brown bag and information sheet for the panel exchange at the October meeting. The panel exchange and coordinating fabrics will take place at the November meeting. The program at the November meeting will be on creative ways to use panels in making quilts.

4 REASONS WHY A QUILT MIGHT NEED APPRAISAL

- 1. Understanding the Historical Significance of a Quilt: Does your quilt hail from a specific time period, have ties to a special event or a specific community? If so, an appraiser may help you determine the quilt's age and the context in which it was made. They will look for clues from the fabrics chosen, construction techniques, imagery, and more. An appraisal can help document the quilts significance and answer many questions about the maker.
- 2. Quilt Provenance: Many times, a quilt's origin is unknown. This is one of the reasons it is important to label your quilts! In some cases, an appraisal can help establish the authenticity and provenance of a quilt, particularly if it is a vintage or antique piece. This information can be valuable for collectors, museums, and quilt historians.
- 3. Documenting Value: If you sell or donate your work, it may be helpful to have an appraiser set its value. In addition to objectively outlining the quilt's historical significance, quality, craftsmanship, the value will also be noted by the appraiser. This might be useful for tax purposes especially if the piece is donated.
- 4. Valuation for Insurance Purposes: If your quilt is damaged, lost, or stolen, having a written appraisal on file helps establish its worth and ensure appropriate compensation.

Will You Get a Quilt Appraised? Many of us treasure our quilts, especially those from family members long gone. And as you can see, having a quilt appraised can add to your knowledge of the technical and historical significance. But maybe more important than that, it will strengthen your ties to the original maker and allow you to appreciate their work – and their craft – more fully.

Quilt appraisers are certified through rigorous programs, including the American Quilter's Society. Qualified and accredited certifying organizations, such as the American Quilter's Society (AQS), have the responsibility of testing and certifying only those candidates that exhibit the necessary skills, knowledge, experience, and ethical practices that conform to the organization's uniform standards and practices.



MAJOR REWRITE OF BYLAWS UNDERTAKEN AND STANDING RULES CREATED

Over the summer, Jean Anne Branch, Sandy Lane, and Sharon Perry met to rewrite the guild's bylaws in light of the meeting changes (meeting month, date, and location) made this year. The goal of the committee was to make the bylaws a document which would not have to be changed frequently.

Most all of the specific information about who, what, where, and when for day-to-day guild operations were removed from the bylaws and placed in the newly created standing rules. Members were told about the rewrite of the bylaws and the creation of the standing rules at the September meeting.

Guild members will be discussing those changes made to the bylaws and the new standing rules at the October meeting. To prepare for those discussions, guild members can read the proposed bylaws here and the new standing rules here prior to the October meeting.

As you read the bylaws and standing rules, please make note of any suggested changes, additions, and/or deletions you might have. Bring them to the October meeting and be prepared to discuss your suggestions. The Executive Committee plans to have a vote by the membership on the bylaws and standing rules before the end of 2025. Both documents will be effective on January 1, 2026.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH (BOM)

IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN...MEMBERSHIP DUES TIME!


September marks the start of a new membership year for the guild. This membership year will run from September 2025 through December 2026.





RECIPE CORNER

FLOURLESS PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1 cup peanut butter 1 cup white sugar 1 egg 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Pinch of salt

Preheat oven to 350 degree oven. Mix first 4 ingredients. Spoon onto parchment lined cookie sheet, sprinkle salt on top. Bake for 10 minutes or until lightly browned.

CHOCOLATE TURTLE COOKIES

11/4 cups (150g) all-purpose flour

34 cup (60g) unsweetened cocoa powder

34 teaspoon baking soda

3/4 teaspoon kosher salt

3/4 cup (11/2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened

34 cup (150g) packed light brown sugar

½ cup (100g) granulated sugar

1 large egg

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

3/4 cup finely chopped raw pecans

12 soft caramels

In a large bowl, whisk flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, and salt. In another large bowl, using a handheld mixer on medium-high speed, beat butter, brown sugar, and granulated sugar until creamy, 2 to 3 minutes. Add egg and vanilla and beat until combined. Add dry ingredients and beat on medium-low speed until just a few dry streaks remain. Add pecans and fold with a spatula until combined. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate until cold, at least 1 hour and up to 4.

Arrange racks in upper and lower thirds of oven; preheat to 350°. Using a large cookie scoop (about ¼ cup), scoop dough into rounds for a total of 12. Press your finger into center of dough to create a hole. Place a caramel in the center. Pinch dough back over caramel and roll into a ball. Arrange between 2 parchment-lined baking sheets, spacing 3" apart.

Bake cookies, rotating sheets top to bottom halfway through, until puffed and edges are set, 16 to 18 minutes. Let cool 10 minutes on baking sheets.

LEMON SUGAR COOKIES

1 stick butter, unsalted, softened (½ cup) 1½ cup flour (167g), *see note below ¾ cup sugar (160 g) 1 tablespoon brown sugar (18 g) 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 large egg yolk, room temperature

2 - 3 tablespoon lemon zest

¼ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup sugar, for coating, optional

Preheat oven to 350°F.

In a small bowl, combine flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Whisk together to combine.

In a medium bowl, using a hand or standing mixer, cream the butter, brown sugar and 3/4c sugar until light and fluffy. (about 2 - 3 minutes or so). Add in egg, lemon zest and vanilla and beat until combined.

Slowly pour in the dry ingredients and beat just until combined—do not over mix. (Chill for about 30 minutes if desired.) Roll cookie dough into about $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch balls or scoop with a $1\frac{1}{2}$ -tablespoon cookie scoop and roll in sugar if desired (add sugar into a small bowl first) and place about 2 inches apart on a parchment-lined baking pan.

Bake 9-11 minutes. Cool; store in an air tight container or freeze. $\,$

Recipe Notes: *If you don't measure your flour by weight, make sure to stir and aerate the flour first and then spoon and level it with a knife versus scooping your measuring cup in the flour. Incorrectly measuring your flour can be the cause of failed cookies in any recipe.

Check to make sure your baking powder and baking soda are both fresh. Expired leavening agents can cause issues when trying to bake. Keep them fresh! Make sure not to over bake these lemon sugar cookies. When you pull them out, you may think they are not
