Franklin County Quilters Guild Friday, October 13, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM by President Laurel Schaap, who then invited Helen Short to give an introduction of the venue where this month's meeting was being held (Holy Trinity Church in Swanton, VT).

<u>Consent Agenda</u>: Treasurer's report and Minutes of September 2023 meeting; a motion was made by Helen Short and 2nd by Jean Ann Branch to accept both Treasurer's report and September meeting minutes. Motion carried.

Membership (Penny LaRochelle): Penny LaRochelle reported the guild currently has 50 paid members to date. A total of 18 members were in attendance, with two guests (Kathy Guinness and Rick Weld).

/Comfort Quilts (Denise Chase):

- Home Health called Denise looking for quilts to refill their supply. Denise was able to donate a Quilt of Valor, plus about 10 other quilts that FCQG members had made. Home Health was very pleased with the donations, especially with the Quilt of Valor.
- Denise brought with her to the meeting 2 complete kits with fabric for members to take home to make quilts. She also has available 2 kits that need quilting only and 2 kits that are Quilts of Valor. Members who would like to make quilts to donate are encouraged to make twin-sized quilts (for Spectrum and Welcome Home).
- A question came up about what size quilts are needed by each organization that FCQG donates to. Sharon Perry said that a Members' Booklet has been emailed to all members and that booklet has a description of the sizes of quilts for each organization.
- Denise received a large donation that included rulers, fabric, patterns, and books. These items can be sold in the 2023 Quilt Show boutique, with 100% of the profits going back to the guild. What a generous donation to our guild!

Quilt Show (Helen Short and Teri Brunelle):

- On April 6 & 7, 2024 with set-up on Friday, April 5.
- Helen reported that Shirley Babcock has stepped forward to be the 2024 quilt show volunteer coordinator. Thank you, Shirley!
- Penny LaRochelle reported that the number of quilt registrations for next year's show has doubled, to 2 quilts! Quilt show registration form can be found <u>here</u>.
- Helen made available the Quilter's Boutique Registration Form. Members are invited to make items for the show. Fabric (that is not made into an item) will NOT be allowed to be sold at the boutique. Hand bags and tote bags were hot sellers at the last show. The guild takes 10% of what the members earn. Any donated items will be sold with all the money going to the guild.

- Vendors so far are Country Thyme Vermont in Troy and The Quilters' Corner at Middlebury Sew-N-Vac.
- April Walker reported that posters for advertising the quilt show have been ordered. The posters will be distributed at the December meeting. Sharon Perry is sending out notices to magazines and other publications. Helen Short suggested having Amtrak promote our quilt show, since the St. Albans train station and a downtown hotel are within walking distance to City Hall.
- Laurel Schaap reported that many members came together last Friday to move the donated VQF poles, plus items that have been stored at peoples' houses, into a storage unit in Fairfax, VT (just outside of St. Albans). This storage unit had been voted on by the board when the unit in Hyde Park was determined to be unavailable. The Fairfax unit is a larger unit that has room to store additional quilt guild supplies that may be in members' homes/garages. Our guild will need the pole bases, which may be put together by members over the next few years, but for now, will be rented from the Champlain Quilt Guild for this year's show.

2024 Raffle Quilt (Sharon Perry and Denise Chase):

- Sharon Perry and Denise Chase showed off this year's raffle quilt completed top.
- Sharon handed out raffle tickets to members, who are asked to sell at least two books of tickets (or 6 tickets). (Per FCQG Bylaws: Section 4: Any member of the Franklin County Quilters Guild shall be eligible to take part in the workshops by quilt instructors paid for either in part or all by the Guild if: "... 4. They have sold 2 books of raffle tickets...").
- The tickets are 1 ticket for \$2 or 3 tickets (one book) for \$5.
- Penny LaRochelle is challenging everyone to sell at least 99 tickets, her personal goal!

2024 Charity Quilt (Laurel Schaap and Gale Weld):

- Two letters of interest have been submitted to the guild, one from The Meeting House on the Green in East Fairfield and the other from the Enosburg Food Shelf. Laurel suggested that two different charity raffle quilts be made this year.
- Denise Chase stepped up and volunteered to make the 2nd quilt (the first one is being made by Laurel and Gale Weld).

Sugarhouse Gazette (Sharon Perry): The newsletter can be found online <u>here</u>. Each newsletter comes out at least 2 weeks prior to each meeting. Items for the next newsletter are due to Sharon by October 25th.

23 in 2023 Challenge (Sharon Perry): Reminder to complete the form found in the newsletter of the 23 items you have/are completing in 2023. There will be a drawing of prizes for participants who turn in their forms to Sharon Perry at the end of 2023.

- Gale Weld stepped in for Lucie and showed off the next Disappearing Four Patch pattern. The colors for this month's block are autumn colors (think yellow, red, orange, green). The link for directions to the blocks of the month is under "Projects" on the FCQG website and can be found <u>here</u>.
- Carol Parks was the winner of the 40 yellow and blue squares brought in by members to this month's meeting. Congratulations Carol!

Program and workshop announcements for 2023-24 (Deb Trahan and Cathy Carlson):

- November's program is on Wednesday, November 15th: Quilt Market Wrap-Up with Tina de la Bruere, Owner of Vermont Quilter's Schoolhouse. Tina will have recently returned from Houston after attending the national Quilt Market show, which is for owners of quilt shops and will be sharing the latest quilting tools and ideas on the market.
- Laurel Schaap stepped in for Deb and encouraged members to work on their Brown Bag Mystery. Completed projects are due back at the April 2024 membership meeting (changed from the March meeting, since both January and February's meetings are virtual.)

<u>Program</u>: Gale Weld introduced Norma Ippolito, an award-winning Vermont quilter from Chester. Norma inspired all of us with her trunk show of her stunning quilts.

- Mary King won the membership door prize which included, among other items, a pack of 5" squares, generously donated by our guest speaker, Norma Ippolito.
- Helen Short won the comfort quilt door prize.

NOVEMBER MEETING TO FEATURE QUILT MARKET WRAP-UP

Tina de la Bruere, of Vermont Quilter's Schoolhouse, will be showing us the newest and greatest from the 2023 International Quilt Market in Houston. Quilt Market is the trade show for the quilting industry and is Mecca for quilt shop owners throughout the US.

QUILT TIPS

- When you have to match seams, use a dab of fabric glue (tube or stick) within the seam allowance instead of pins. From the right side, you'll be able to clearly see whether the seams match with no pins in the way. The bond is not instant so you'll have time to separate the pieces and try again if necessary. Then stitch away.
- After basting your quilt, roll the backing edges over the batting and pin to the quilt. This will enclose the excess batting and help to defray snagging or picking up unwanted stray threads.
- When paper piecing, use removable tape to hold the fabric onto the paper. Be sure to remove the tape before pressing. The tape can reused several times before discarding.
- An empty Altoids tin makes a great pin holder.

TIPS FOR PREPARING YOUR QUILT FOR THE LONGARMER

- When piecing a backing, please keep the seam horizontal instead of vertical. It helps to align the quilt on the longarm machine and allows for a smoother finish and fewer potential puckers.
- Be sure to cut off the selvage when seaming your backing.
- Square and trim the backing.
- For your backing, include 4 inches minimum on all 4 sides (i.e. cut your backing so it is 8 inches to the wider than the quilt top and 8 inches longer than the quilt top).
- Press the quilt top and backing.
- Clean the threads off the backs of both the quilt top and backing.

MORE QUILT TIPS

- Use the correct needle for your thread and project.
- Cut thread on a 45 degree angle for easier needle threading.
- Always use ruler lines and not cutting mat lines to get the best straight rotary cuts.
- Read the instructions through from start to finish before you start cutting and sewing.

Lucie Fortin is the project coordinator for this membership year, and she's bringing back the traditional Block of the Month (BOM) projects.

Each month Lucie will provide instructions for completing the BOM to include color choices. This month's BOM is the Disappearing 9-Patch in fall colors; instructions for the block can be found <u>here</u>. Members are encouraged to make a block each month and turn it in for the BOM raffle the following month.

If you turn a block in, you get to enter your name in the BOM Drawing. You can make as many blocks as you want and enter your name a corresponding number of times. If you win all the blocks, they are yours to keep.

MAKE-AHEAD TURKEY GRAVY

2 turkey wings (1-1/2 to 2 pounds)

2 medium onions, quartered

2 cartons (32 ounces each) reduced-sodium chicken broth, divided

2 medium carrots, cut into 2-inch pieces

2 celery ribs with leaves, cut into 2-inch pieces

4 fresh thyme sprigs

1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 tablespoon butter

¹/₄ teaspoon pepper

Place turkey wings and onions in a greased 13x9-in. baking pan. Bake, uncovered, at 400° for $1\frac{1}{4}$ hours, turning once.

Transfer wings and onions to a Dutch oven. While 13x9-in. pan is still warm, carefully add 2 cups broth. Using a spatula, gently scrape any brown bits off bottom of pan; pour into Dutch oven with wings. Add 4 cups broth, carrots, celery and thyme to Dutch oven. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, about 45 minutes.

Strain; discard wings and vegetables. (Can be made ahead to this point and stored in the refrigerator for up to 2 days.) Skim fat from cooking liquid. Add enough remaining broth to measure $3\frac{1}{2}$ cups.

In a large saucepan, whisk flour and ³/₄ cup remaining broth until smooth (if any broth remains, save for another use). Gradually stir in cooking liquid. Bring to a boil; cook and stir until thickened, about 2 minutes. Stir in butter and pepper.

CRANBERRY SAUCE WITH MAPLE SYRUP

2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries 1/2 cup maple syrup 1/2 cup honey 1 tablespoon grated orange zest Additional orange zest, optional

In a large saucepan, combine the cranberries, syrup, honey and orange zest. Cook over medium heat until the berries pop, about 15 minutes. Cover and store in the refrigerator. If desired, top with additional orange zest before serving.

CAULIFLOWER GRATIN

large head cauliflower, cut into florets
 tablespoons olive oil
 teaspoon salt, divided

1 teaspoon pepper, divided
4 tablespoons butter, cubed
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
2 cups 2% milk
1 cup shredded Swiss cheese
½ cup grated Parmesan cheese
½ teaspoon onion powder
½ teaspoon ground mustard
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper
Chopped fresh thyme, optional

Preheat oven to 375° . Place cauliflower on a rimmed baking sheet. Drizzle with oil; sprinkle with $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper. Toss to coat. Bake 8 minutes. Stir; bake until crisp-tender and lightly browned, 7-8 minutes longer.

In a large saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth; gradually whisk in milk. Bring to a simmer, stirring constantly; cook and stir until thickened, 2-3 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in next 6 ingredients and remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper until smooth.

Pour ³⁄₄ cup cheese sauce into a greased 2-qt. baking dish. Top with cauliflower and remaining cheese sauce. Bake, uncovered, until bubbly and lightly browned, 30-35 minutes. If desired, sprinkle with chopped fresh thyme.

CRANBERRY JALAPENO CHEESE SPREAD

1 cup dried cranberries

¹/₂ cup packed brown sugar

¹/₂ cup orange juice

4 teaspoons chopped seeded jalapeno pepper

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 teaspoon grated orange zest

¹/₄ teaspoon Chinese five-spice powder

1 package (8 ounces) reduced-fat cream cheese

Assorted crackers or sliced sweet yellow and orange peppers

In a small saucepan, combine the first 7 ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes or until thickened. Remove from the heat; cool completely.

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese until fluffy. Beat in cranberry mixture until blended. Serve with crackers or sliced peppers.
