

Franklin County Quilters Guild November 16, 2022

President Laurel Schaap called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and welcomed members attending.

Helen Short moved to accept the Consent Agenda; motion seconded by Sharon Perry. The motion carried.

Programs:

- Gale Weld explained that the December meeting will have a White Elephant Gift Exchange. Gifts are to be valued at no more than \$15.00.
- Gale went on to discuss the January and February meetings which will be zoom meetings.
- She also indicated the dates of the meetings are NOT on the third Wednesday as usual. See the newsletter for additional information and dates.

Comfort Quilts:

- Denise Chase has kits available. Denise stated that members need to sign out and sign in kits that they take.
- She would also like feedback from members about how to organize the quilts. Should she continue to make kits with a specific pattern included. Or should she just put coordinated fabric in a "kit" and let the member choose the pattern.
- Denise also indicated that the Bingo quilt needs to be quilted. Denise made a "matching back" for the Bingo quilt. Diane Comeau offered to quilt the Bongo quilt.

Mystery Quilt:

- Diane Comeau and Lucie Fortin demonstrated the next block.
- The new block is a Friendship Star variation. We need to make eight blocks.
- Diane also noted that Fabric B needs to have four strips cut.

<u>Quilt Show</u>:

- Helen Short updated members and encouraged members to volunteer for the Friday set up; Members Boutique; and any other available positions.
- Quilt registration forms are available <u>here</u> and need to be given to Penny LaRochelle by March 1, 2023.
- Helen also reported that Dresden Plate challenge information is in the newsletter.

<u>Raffle Tickets</u>: Sharon Perry is still looking for items to sell at the Montgomery Craft Show on December 10 where she and Penny LaRochelle will be selling raffle tickets. She is willing to help arrange pick up of the items that anyone might want to donate. Sharon is hoping the items will draw shoppers to the raffle tickets.

Membership: Helen Short reported in Penny LaRochelle's absence that there were 29 members present plus two guests. Diane Comeau indicated that two members were online.

2023 Charity Quilt: JeanAnne Branch reported that 98 blocks have been completed by members. Members MUST return their blocks by the December meeting.

<u>Sugarhouse Gazette</u>: Sharon Perry indicated that submissions must reach her by November 30.

<u>New Business</u>: VQF is looking for a minimum of two quilts from each Vermont guild. Sharon Perry moved that the Covered Bridges Quilt (now housed at the St. Albans Museum) and the Bingo Quilt be put on display at the Vermont Quilt Festival. John Rouleau seconded the motion. The motion was carried. The Guild hopes the Bingo Quilt might be sold to benefit the Franklin County Quilters Guild.

At this point we adjourned the meeting to have the presentation by Lynn Carrier who organizes the Quilts of Valor program here in Vermont. It was a very informative presentation.

Members then played Left, Right, Center with the strips that members brought into the meeting. The final center player "won" the strips from each game.

This game was followed by Show and Tell.

John Rouleau won the door prize for comfort quilts. Cathy Carlson won the door prize for membership.

Sharon Perry moved to adjourn the meeting. Lucie Fortin seconded the motion. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm.

Franklin County Quilters Guild Sugarhouse Ga 4 MONTHS AND COUNTING... UNTIL THE <u>2023 QUILT SHOW</u>

The 2023 Quilt Show is 4 months away, and the planning and preparations continue behind the scenes. As the event draws near, we depend on all guild members to ensure the quilt show is a huge success. Continue reading to see how you can help.

- We need QUILTS! It's all about the quilts!!! Penny LaRochelle has volunteered as the Quilt Registration coordinator and she wants to have the quilts registered sooner rather than later. So let's help Penny out and get ALL the quilts registered well before the March 1st deadline. The quilt registration form can be found <u>here</u>. The quilt show chairs, along with Penny, challenge each guild member to enter at least one quilt in the show. But don't stop there; we need lots more quilts to fill up the auditorium at the City Hall. As a reminder, <u>all quilts, including those in the Small/Miniature category</u>, must have a sleeve sewn (not pinned) to the back. The sleeve must be at least 4" wide.

- We need volunteers!!! Jean Anne Branch is in charge of getting volunteers for the quilt show. She began signups at the October meeting. She will have the list at the December meetings as well. As an English proverb says, "Many hands make light work." There are many jobs from which to choose. Be sure to take a look at the volunteer list found <u>here</u>. Bring your calendar to the guild meeting and sign up for a time that fits your schedule. If you cannot make the December meeting and would like to volunteer, please contact Jean Anne.

- We need your raffle tickets!!! Denise Chase is the raffle ticket coordinator this year. Denise asks that each member return the raffle tickets and money for the tickets in an envelope with the member's name written on the outside. Denise wants to be sure to properly credit the returned tickets and money to the correct member and avoid spending time tracking down unreturned tickets. As a reminder, to remain a member in good standing and eligible to take guild workshops, each member must sell 2 packets of tickets. The tickets are 1 ticket for \$2 or 3 tickets for \$5. Once sold members can bring their sold tickets and money to a guild meeting OR send the tickets and money (check(s) payable to FCQG) to Denise Chase, 55 Barlow Street, St Albans, VT 05478. Be sure to include your return address on the envelope so Denise can properly credit the ticket sales to your name.

2023 CHALLENGE QUILT

The 2023 Challenge Quilt will feature the Dresden Plate. An entire plate is not required. However, you must have a minimum of 4 sections of the plate. Those 4 sections do not have to be sewn together into a unit. Your plate sections do not have to be the same size nor made out of the same fabrics. The perimeter of your Challenge Quilt must be no more than 96 inches. <u>A sleeve for hanging is required</u>. Let your imagination run wild!

DID YOU MAKE THE 2021-2022 SUGARHOUSE SAMPLER MYSTERY QUILT?

Or are you currently working on one? The Quilt Show committee plans to have a **special display of members' completed Sugarhouse Sampler Mystery Quilts at the April 2023 quilt show.** If you haven't finished yours yet, there's still time to complete your sampler quilt and have it be part of this special display. Don't forget to put a 4" sleeve on the back of your quilt so it can hang at the quilt show.

FEBRUARY MEETING AND WORKSHOP ON ZOOM

With the success of staying connected with Zoom meetings during the pandemic in 2020 and 2021, the guild's executive board decided to conduct future January and February meetings on Zoom. Part of the reasoning behind that decision was due to the consideration of members' driving safety in light of weather uncertainty in the dead of winter and to the availability of and ease of scheduling many quilt instructors to make presentations on the Zoom platform.

Ellen Lindner, the Adventure Quilter from Melbourne, Florida, will entertain us with her lecture, called *Confessions of a Fabric Whisperer*, on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>February 8th</u>, the <u>2nd Wednesday in February</u>. Ellen will also conduct a workshop, <u>Double Reversible</u> <u>Appliqué, on Saturday, February 11th</u>. MYSTERY QUILT PROJECT FOR 2022-2023 MEMBERSHIP YEAR

Diane Comeau and Lucie Fortin have been working together over the summer to bring guild members another fun and unique mystery quilt with blocks presented each month during the 2022-2023 membership year. It sounds like another stunning quilt. If you missed out on making the FCQG Sugarhouse Sampler this past year, you can join this year's mystery.

Diane plans to handle the distribution of the instructions for each month's block(s) a little different from last year's mystery quilt. She will still have the current month's BOM in paper version at each guild meeting and any past months where there are extras for those members who would prefer a paper copy.

In addition to the paper copy available at the meeting, Diane will also have a pattern available on her website for each month's instructions. Diane will provide a link each month for that month's

When you click on the link, it will direct you to Diane's business website. Even though there is a "price" for each month's pattern, guild members will have a coupon code to enter which will zero out the "price" for the pattern.

To access the pattern, click on the link in blue above. Once you access Diane's business page, click "Add to Cart." Now go to your cart and under the word Subtotal, click on Enter Coupon. Enter BOM2023 then click Apply as shown in Figure A below. Once you click Apply, the "price" for the pattern will be \$0.00. The coupon code (BOM2023) will be valid until July 31, 2023, so Diane encourages all 2022-2023 members to use the code upon the release of the pattern each month. If anyone missed out on a paper copy or would prefer a paper copy, please contact Diane at 802-310-1837.

You will be required to enter your email address so the system can send you a link to download your file. The file will be available for an unlimited number of downloads.

QUILT TIPS

- When doing stitch-in-the-ditch machine quilting, stitch as close to the seam as possible, so that your quilting stitch remains largely invisible.
- Using spray starch on the backing of your quilt is a popular trick to help the quilt move more easily through your machine when quilting by machine.
- Be sure to wipe the blade and clean your rotary cutter properly after each cutting session, otherwise lint will build up on it and affect its cutting performance.
- It is best to select a busy print for the backing if you want your quilting stitches to be less easily seen on the backing.
- Chocolate is a quilting notion!



CORNER

TEXAS SHEET CAKE COOKIES

For the cookies:

1/2 cup semisweet chocolate chips 1¹/₂ cups all-purpose flour 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon baking soda 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt 1 stick salted butter, at room temperature ⅓ cup granulated sugar 1/3 cup packed light brown sugar 1 large egg, at room temperature 1 teaspoon vanilla extract ¹/₃ cup buttermilk ³/₄ cup chopped toasted pecans For the glaze: 6 tablespoons salted butter ¹/₄ cup milk 2 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 cups powdered sugar, sifted

Preheat the oven to 350°. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. For the cookies: Put the chocolate chips in a microwave-safe bowl and microwave at 50 percent power in 15-second intervals, stirring between each, until melted and smooth. Let cool slightly.

Combine the flour, cocoa powder, baking powder, baking soda and salt in a medium bowl and whisk.

Combine the butter, granulated sugar and brown sugar in a large bowl and beat with a mixer on medium-high speed until smooth and light, about 2 minutes. Add the egg, vanilla and melted chocolate and beat until well combined, about 30 seconds. With the mixer on low speed, beat in half of the flour mixture, then the buttermilk, then the remaining flour mixture until smooth. Mix in the pecans.

Drop heaping tablespoonfuls of dough on the baking sheets about 2 inches apart. Bake, rotating the pans halfway through, until the tops of the cookies are puffed and the edges are set, 8 to 10 minutes. (Don't overbake; you want the centers to stay fudgy.) Let cool 5 minutes on the baking sheets, then remove to a rack set over a separate parchment-lined baking sheet.

For the glaze: Melt the butter in a small saucepan. Remove from the heat and whisk in the milk, cocoa powder and vanilla until smooth. Add the powdered sugar and whisk vigorously until smooth. Spoon the glaze over the cookies. Let the glaze set, about 1 hour.

OREO TRUFFLES

38 chocolate sandwich cookies, such as Oreos, broken into large pieces

 $1\ 8\text{-oz.}$ package cream cheese, at room temperature

8 oz. white chocolate, chopped

 ${\bf 8}$ oz. bittersweet chocolate, chopped

Sprinkles or nonpareils, for garnish

Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. Add the sandwich cookies to a food processor and pulse to make fine crumbs. Add the cream cheese and pulse until completely combined and almost pasty.

Scoop and roll the cookie mixture into 1-inch balls; you should have about 36. Refrigerate until chilled, about 30 minutes.

Melt the white and bittersweet chocolates separately in double-boilers set up over low heat, 3 to 4 minutes. Stir until smooth and let cool slightly. Using a fork, dip half of the balls in the bittersweet chocolate and place on a prepared baking sheet; repeat with the remaining balls and the white chocolate. Let set for a few minutes, then drizzle the tops with contrasting chocolate or top with sprinkles or nonpareils, if desired. Refrigerate until the chocolate is set, about 10 minutes. Store in a tightly sealed container in the refrigerator for up to 4 days.

CHOCOLATE COCONUT BALLS

1 cup toasted chopped Macadamia nuts 1 cup sweetened condensed milk

1½ teaspoons almond extract

8 ounces sweetened shredded coconut

One 12-ounce bag semisweet chocolate morsels, melted 1 tablespoon shortening

In a bowl mix together the nuts, condensed milk, almond extract and coconut. Using your fingers, press the mixture into balls about 3/4-inch round. Place onto sheet trays and let rest at room temperature for 4 hours or in the refrigerator for 1 hour.

After the balls have set up, melt the chocolate and shortening until smooth. Dip into the chocolate to coat evenly and lightly. Place onto a parchment or foil lined sheet pan to dry.
